TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

Review of the year and of charitable activities

The Society celebrated its Centenary in 2018 with a series of special events for members. The celebrations began in February with a Lunch at which the Guest of Honour was the Norwegian-speaking former Lord Mayor of London, Lord Mountevans, who formally launched our appeal for donations to the Centenary Scholarship Fund. In November, the Society welcomed its Patrons, HM Queen Elizabeth II and HM King Harald V, to a Centenary Reception at the Naval and Military Club, where Their Majesties signed an Almanac of memorabilia of the Society's history. The year concluded with a special service of thanksgiving at Christmas at the Norwegian Seamen's Church at Rotherhithe. In addition, several lecture meetings were held and visits to places of interest such as the Bank of England.

The Annual General Meeting was held in May at Rotherhithe at which the Society's Rules were updated and revised to include the Centenary Scholarship Fund among the activities in pursuit of its charitable purposes.

The Society also stepped up its activities in support of its educational objectives. Centenary Scholarships were awarded to a Norwegian postgraduate student at the Royal College of Music and to British students at NTNU in Trondheim and the Arctic University in Tromsø. This programme will expand to other Norwegian institutions when sufficient funds from the Centenary Appeal are received. The Dame Gillian Brown Scholarship was awarded to Miss Amy Jolly. Grants were also given to two other British recipients, one for study at the Oslo Academy of Arts and another towards a recording of Grieg songs.

The Society's Trustees wish to expand its educational activities and to put more emphasis, in its programme for members, on visits to special events and places.

Governing document

The charity is governed by the charity's Rules.

Appointment of new trustees

Upon a vacancy arising, current Trustees will discuss suitable candidates and then invite a member of the Society to become a Trustee. There is little formal training required, as the decision-making process of the Society is relatively simple.

Organisational structure

The Trustees are largely responsible for all decisions affecting the Society, with the day to day running of the Society delegated to Irene Garland.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT (CONT.)

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the Society to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the Society at a level which equates to approximately six months unrestricted expenditure. This provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs and to respond to emergency applications for grants that may arise from time to time. Unrestricted funds were maintained at this level throughout the year.

Investment performance

The Society holds investments primarily in low risk stocks, which provide a relatively stable stream of income throughout the year. The performance of these investments was in line with expectations.

Financial review

The charity is principally funded by subscriptions and income from low risk investments, which enables the charity to give bursaries to students and to maintain the day to day running of the charity.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER

THE ANGLO-NORSE SOCIETY IN LONDON

I report on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31st December 2018, which are set out on pages 4 to 8.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As trustees you are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records and the preparation of the accounts. Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised 2005) and in accordance with the accounting policies set out below.

b) Incoming resources

Investment income is accounted for in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt. Subscription income is included on an accruals basis.

c) Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis.

d) Fixed Asset Investments

Investments are included at closing mid-market value at the Balance Sheet date. Any gain or loss on revaluation is taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.
