Structure, governance and management

Communities Together Durham is a company limited by guarantee (no 08860961) and a registered charity (no 1157214). The company was incorporated on 24th January 2014. It was registered as a charity on 28th May 2014. The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Directors are nominated by the members, being five nominated by the Church Urban Fund (CUF) and four nominated by the Durham Diocesan Board of Finance (DBF). Directors are appointed for a term of five years. There are currently three vacancies for trustees, all of which are CUF nominations, and the directors are keeping this under review. The appointments of four directors were reviewed and extended for a further term during the first quarter of 2019.

Objectives and activities: the objects of Communities Together Durham are, for the benefit of the public:-

- 1.1 to promote the efficiency and effectiveness of Christian based charities in the furtherance of their objects or any one of them, mainly but not exclusively, by the provision of information, advice, support and infrastructure provision; and
- 1.2 the relief of financial hardship, either generally or individually, through the provision of grants, goods or services.

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Achievements and performance

This has been an exciting year. We have supported a range of church projects, undertaken a number of speaking engagements, and walked alongside a number of individuals and groups at different stages in their 'community engagement' journey. We have taken opportunities to 'celebrate the small', and provide encouragement, often coffee and sometimes capacity to look beyond the immediate horizon. And our work has been recognised by our Diocese in an important new partnership. Highlights and areas of specific focus include:

<u>Church Based Social Enterprise</u>: the research project started in September 2017, and during the year, a seminar was held in Gateshead exploring the theological background to and history of social enterprise, and a seven week introductory training course for clergy and laity has been held. From this project proposals are being explored that will form the basis for the action research to take place over the next 12-15 months. The research project includes regular blogs for the William Temple Foundation.

<u>Delivery of the Diocesan Poverty Strategy:</u> CTD and the Diocese of Durham have entered into a Management Agreement for the delivery of the Diocesan Poverty Strategy until the end of 2020. This includes a contribution towards CTD costs, and the secondment of 4 half-time staff to form a 'community development team'. The strategy builds on an asset based approach, rather than an initiative based approach, responding to locally identified needs. The full team will begin work in February 2019, and we anticipate a busy year! The CTD business plan will now be reviewed to incorporate this development.

<u>Places of Welcome</u>: the number of places of welcome has grown to 8, with three more in the pipeline. We are aware of others doing similar outreach into the community without joining the network, but the encouragement projects receive from the 'light touch' structure is welcomed by the churches, and we plan to develop this further, encouraged by the 'good news' stories from everyone involved.

<u>Holiday clubs</u>: many churches are now running their own projects, and we have supported them individually to secure funding. The emphasis now is on the provision of activities, and we are exploring links with external partners able to provide experiences and activities to broaden experience and provide fun a bit further afield!

<u>The Clewer Initiative 'We see you'</u> – responding to modern day slavery: during the year we have supported the Diocesan co-ordinator of this initiative to hold 6 awareness raising events across the Diocese. We will be seeking to extend this support during the coming year.

<u>Refugee Support</u>: we have been working with local councils to provide support, particularly through the resettlement schemes. It is particularly encouraging to see some of our local councils realising that the churches have something positive to offer in local communities, and pro-actively seeking support. Our work complements the work of North East Churches Acting Together, providing added capacity (there are seven local authority areas in our Diocese).

<u>Explore during vacancy</u>: following a successful pilot scheme, we have gained agreement for a programme to help congregations without an incumbent explore their focus and mission in a region with many complex social challenges. This will begin during 2019, when the extended team is in place, and all parishes will be expected to take part in customised workshops that support the preparation of a parish profile.

<u>Tyne and Wear Citizens</u>: during the year, the Development Worker has chaired the Leadership Group, and we continue to work in partnership with Citizens across the northern part of the Diocese. Significant activity includes support for the Living Wage campaign (overall the number of Living Wage employers increased from 30 to 90 in the year, and we have taken a lead on the negotiations with some of our local authorities), and support for the free school meals, mental health commission and safer cities work. We continue to encourage parishes and individuals to take part in Citizens activity, and a number of women clergy supported the launch of a hate crime charter by local public transport providers, an initiative led by Muslim women for the partnership. The Chair is a trustee of Citizens UK.

Financial review: the trustees' policy in relation to reserves is to establish sufficient financial reserves to support the charity for a three month period. The Church Urban Fund is tapering over the period to 2020, with £30,000 available in 2019. A grant of 50% of the costs of employing the Development Worker has been secured from April 2018 to December 2020, linked to the delivery of the Diocese of Durham's 'Poverty Strategy'. As a result, reserves have increased during the year, and will be used to facilitate further development of the Charity.

Trustees' responsibilities in respect of the financial statements: company law requires the trustees, who are the directors under company law, to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company at the year end and of the net incoming/outgoing resources of the company for the year then ending. In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent examiner: the trustees have taken advantage of the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 in respect of the audit requirements for small companies and opted to have an independent examination in accordance with the Charities Act.

Small company special provisions: the above report has been prepared in accordanc<u>e</u> with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies' regime as set out in Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2018

Note 1: Basis of preparation

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historic cost (except that investments are shown at market value) in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS102) as applicable to Charities (effective January 2016) comprising the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities ("SORP 2015").

- 1.2 Change in basis of accounting
 There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.
- 1.3 Changes to previous accounts No changes have been made to accounts for previous years.

Note 2: Accounting policies

2.1 Incoming resources

2.1.1 Recognition of incoming resources These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- The charity becomes entitled to the resource
- The trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

2.1.2 Incoming resources with related expenditure Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

2.1.3 Grants and donations Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

- 2.1.4 Tax reclaims on donations and gifts Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.
- 2.1.5 Contractual income and performance related grants This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2018

2.1.6 Gifts in kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

2.1.7 Donated services and facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measureable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

2.1.8 Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

2.1.9 Investment income This is included in the accounts when receivable.

2.2 Expenditure and liabilities

2.2.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

2.2.2 Governance costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and costs of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

2.2.3 Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

2.3 Assets

2.3.1 Tangible fixed assets for use by charity These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.
