Annual Report of the Trustees for 2018

1. Governance and Administration

The business of the Furness Railway Trust, a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), is managed by Trustees in accordance with a constitution approved by the Charity Commission. The Chairman is responsible for coordinating the day to day management of the affairs of the Trust. One third of the Trustees retire at each Annual General Meeting, in accordance with the constitution. A briefing document is given to new Trustees, which outlines the history of the Trust and its current obligations. The document also details the responsibilities of Trustees as defined by the Charity Commission.

The Trustees meet on a number of occasions throughout the year in order to manage the Trust's affairs and to agree required courses of action.

The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued on the 14th July 2014, Financial Reporting Standard 102, and with the Charities Act 2011.

3. Objectives and Activities

A summary of the Object and Powers of the Furness Railway Trust is attached as Appendix A at the end of this report.

The principal activities of the Furness Railway Trust (FRT) during 2018 were the acquisition, restoration and operation of historic items of rolling stock. The Trustees worked to address the long term objective of the establishment of a railway museum, with appropriate facilities for the display, storage and restoration of railway rolling stock and associated equipment.

In shaping the Trust's objectives, the Trustees gave due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit with the object of advancing education through its work, both in the short and longer term. The Trustees also took into account the need to maximise public accessibility to its assets, some of which are unique and of major historical importance, including affordability wherever possible.

4. Achievements and Performance

All three of the Trust's operational steam locomotives were hired out in 2018, initially extending arrangements that had been made in 2017.

Furness Railway locomotive *No. 20*, Britain's oldest working standard gauge steam locomotive, continued its loan to Locomotion, the National Railway Museum at Shildon until May. With its ten year boiler certificate due to end on the 8th July, it then returned to its base at Preston where it operated its last trains on the Ribble Steam Railway (RSR) before withdrawal for a major overhaul. It is planned that the locomotive, whose initial restoration was principally funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, will return to operation in 2020.

Former Great Western Railway 0-6-2T locomotive *No. 5643* continued its hire at the Embsay & Bolton Abbey Steam Railway, a registered charity, although it spent the first eight months of the year sidelined because of work to re-tube the boiler before returning to operational service in September.

The Trust's Hunslet 'Austerity' 0-6-0ST locomotive *Cumbria* started the year at The Battlefield Line in Leicestershire before joining *5643* at the Embsay & Bolton Abbey Steam Railway in April. It is planned that both locomotives will continue to operate there in 2019.

The former Royal Saloon coach, Great Eastern Railway *No. 5* returned to the Trust's Preston base in February after eight years on hire to the Beamish Open Air Museum. The vehicle was replaced at Beamish by the Trust's second class North London Railway coach to help make up a fitting vintage train there for operation in 2018. An overhaul of the Royal Saloon commenced at Preston which will continue as and when resources permit.

Attendance of the Trust's volunteers at its Preston base continued to be encouraging during 2018 where again a number of different projects were ongoing as well as those described above. The cosmetic restoration of a Travelling Post Office vehicle by Trust members for the RSR's museum was successfully completed in April and was the subject of very positive media attention. The overhaul of Peckett locomotive 0-4-0ST *Caliban* continued with the frames being jacked up to enable the wheelsets to be sent away for machining.

The long term restoration of former Great Western Railway 4-6-0 'Hall' class locomotive *No. 4979 Wootton Hall* made further good progress with the re-building of the tender frames almost complete and the purchase of a second-hand replacement 4,000 gallon tank for the tender. The restoration of the Trust's diesel shunter 0-4-0DM *Fluff*, although not a priority project, has again moved forward with considerable input from regular volunteers.

All known components of the former Furness Railway locomotive No. 25 of 1865, which was kindly donated to the Trust during 2017 by the executors of the estate of

the late Bert Hitchen, have been located and gathered together at Preston. With Trust members already engaged in other projects during 2018, no physical progress on the restoration of this locomotive was possible. It is hoped to be able to put together a plan for its conservation in the not too distant future.

The second hand portable building which was purchased in 2017 was successfully fitted out at Preston and brought into use as a high quality mess room for the Trust's volunteers in the first half of 2018.

The Trustees conduct an annual Risks and Vulnerabilities Review. The new shed at Preston has been built to allay the concerns of the Trustees in being able to provide the necessary long term protection and maintenance facilities for its rolling stock. The new shed development has now been completed the sub-lease was subsequently executed on the 25th March 2019.

All activities of the Furness Railway Trust are undertaken by volunteers and the Trustees wish to thank all the hard working members once again for their support over the year. There are no paid staff employed by the Trust.

5. Financial Position

Total income rose to £130,080 compared with £103,615 in 2017, principally as a result of a single bequest of £85,000 from a former Trustee who sadly passed away during the year. Rolling Stock Hire, at £28,849, was £12,232 less than in 2017 reflecting the fact that locomotive *No.* 5643 was undergoing a re-tube of its boiler for the first eight months of the year.

Expenditure on Locomotive Restoration increased to £37,083, compared with £10,235 in 2017, the majority of which was in respect of the purchase of a second hand tender tank and key new fittings for 'Hall' Class 4-6-0 locomotive *No. 4979 Wootton Hall*. The generous bequest referred to above has enabled the Trustees to accelerate restoration work on this and other projects. Repairs and Maintenance to operational locomotives rose to £17,620, a rise of £12,621 on that incurred in 2017, and included the cost of re-tubing locomotive *No. 5643*. Travelling Expenses, £1,897, incurred by three Trustees in attending to on-hire locomotives, was in line with that of 2017 (£1,849) and was kindly gift aided back to the Trust. Overall expenditure, at £64,993 was nearly three times higher than in 2017 as a result of the increased expenditure on Locomotive Restoration and Repairs/Maintenance.

Fund raising activities were carried out in the form of a sales stand and also from the Trust's folk group, *Live Steam*, which again brought in some welcome income. Sales income was reduced as a result of fewer events available at which to sell and net Sales income was affected by a write off of old stock.

6. Reserves Policy

The Trustees believe that the Furness Railway Trust's current finances are satisfactory and that they will be adequate to enable it to complete the purchase of the sub-lease for the new shed.

There is an ongoing need to maintain an appropriate level of reserve to provide for future overhauls of the Trust's operational locomotives and coaches. Fundraising will continue primarily for this purpose and also to fund the longer term restoration projects.

The Trustees declare that they have approved the Trustees' Report above.

Appendix A

SUMMARY OF OBJECT AND POWERS

The object of the CIO is to establish a railway museum for the benefit of the public and the CIO has power to do anything to further its object, in particular, the power to:

- (a) acquire and preserve railway locomotives, railway carriages and other items of rolling stock and associated equipment.
- (b) restore and maintain such items, house them and put them on display; loan or hire them so that they may be used, if practicable, and make suitable arrangements for their continued preservation as far as is possible.
- (c) sponsor the publication of books, articles etc. containing information about these items and rolling stock and railways generally, and otherwise to promote interest in these subjects.
- (d) Procure contributions to the CIO by personal or written appeals, public meetings or otherwise.
- (e) employ and remunerate such staff as are necessary for carrying out the work of the CIO.
- (e) buy, take on lease or in exchange, hire or otherwise acquire any property and to maintain and equip it for use.
- (g) sell, lease or otherwise dispose of all or any part of the property belonging to the CIO.
- (h) borrow money and to charge the whole or any part of its property as security for the repayment of the money borrowed.

Notes to the Accounts -12 Months Ended 31st December 2018

Note 1 Basis of Accounting

The accounts are for the third full year of operation of the new Charitable Incorporated Organisation Furness Railway Trust 1163073 which took over the assets and operations of the unincorporated Furness Railway Trust Registered Charity 1005211 from the 1st December 2015.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16th July 2014, Financial Reporting Standard 102, and with the Charities Act 2011.

The accounts have been prepared on the basis that the unincorporated and CIO charities have merged, as defined in the Statement of Recommended Practice.

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or tranaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes(s) to these accounts.

The Furness Railway Trust constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102

These accounts have been prepared on the basis that the Furness Railway Trust is a going concern after taking into account the current and anticipated levels of activity,

Note 2 Accounting Policy

Income

Incoming Resources, including grants, are accounted for on a receivable basis.

One legacy was notified and the estimated full amount receivable was included in the accounts.

The value of donated goods is recognised only on sale because of the practicalities of measuring the value of such goods.

Goods donated for ongoing use by the charity are recognised as tangible assets and included in the Statement of Financial Activities as incoming resouces when receivable.

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' Annual Report.

Expenditure

Resources Expended are accounted for on an accruals basis and include recognition of liabilities arising from legal or constructive obligation which commits the organisation to expenditure.

Certain support costs (Insurance and Printing, Stationery, Postage) are apportioned between activities based, where possible, on known cost drivers.

Governance Costs are shown separately for the purpose of clarity and, contrary to the SORP, not spread across activities because they are difficult to allocate and are not material in size.

Assets

Tangible and fixed assets for use by the charity

Plant and Equipment assets purchased which can be used for more than one year are capitalised and depreciated on a straight line basis at a rate of 25% per annum.

The portable building purchased in 2017 is being depreciated on a straight line basis over 15 years.. Assets purchased after 1st December 2015 are only capitalised if they cost £200 or more.

Heritage Assets

Heritage Assets are shown on the balance sheet at cost or, in the case of donated items, a realistic value estimated at the time of donation. An exception has been made for Furness Railway No. 20, built 1863. This historic locomotive is unique, difficult to value and is not included; there has been approximately £148,000 spent on it. The Trust's Collection and Disposal Policy states that there "should be a presumption against disposal." Grants received of £111,000 would potentially be repayable if this item was sold.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lesser of cost or recoverable value.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts. Subsequently they are measured at the cash or other other consideration expected to be received.

Creditors

Creditors are measured at transaction price.

The restricted funds of £33,073.50 are for a new shed development at Preston. This has been completed by the Ribble Steam Railway at its leased site at Preston.

A Heads of Agreement has been drawn up whereby the Furness Railway Trust will take out a sub-lease on its share of the development. A short term loan of £190,000 has been made to the Ribble Steam Railway in order to part fund the building work pending the purchase of the sub-lease. The sub-lease was subsequently executed on the 25th March 2019
