Vicar's Introduction

2018 saw a significant moment in the Diocese of London with the enthronement of the first female Bishop of London, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally DBE. Please pray for Bishop Sarah as she takes on one of the most senior and higher profile posts in the Church of England.

On a more local scale, we had our own significant moment when the PCC employed St Dunstan's first ever full-time children's worker. Sam Bailey had already been with us

for two years as a student children's worker. After completing his qualifications, Sam accepted a full-time role with us. Since then, Sam has been building relationships with our local schools - taking lessons and assemblies, offering lunchtime clubs and organising school visits to the church. A hugely successful project was the Remembrance Day workshops for local primary schools. Thank you to everyone who helped make the workshops possible.



With regards to St Dunstan's vision to Seek, Serve and Share our Lord Together:

- The Seek team organised and offered to the church one-to-one spiritual MOT's. Rachel Westall also started monthly prayer times to pray for the children in the church and David and Sharon Morgans began a new weekly home group.
- The Serve Team organised a Spiritual Gifts Course over Lent and started the Many Hands Campaign in the Autumn. A special thanks to Paul Bretherton and Helena Maitland for their work on the Many Hands project.
- The Share Team encouraged us to sign up and attend a course at Acton Baptist Church about Islam and how we might build relationships and friendships with our Muslim neighbours. Also, Jacqui Roberts organised and launched our new monthly Community Teas, which are going from strength to strength.

As a church family we had much to celebrate, including the wedding of Mark and Sony. We also shared in harder times. Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with the family and friends of Derek Thomas, Dennis Purvis, Luke Thullainayagau and Bob Heatley.

Just before Christmas we held a Family Memorial Service. Families came from near and far to take a moment before Christmas to remember before God and give thanks for loved ones who had died. It was a precious hour, which many appreciated.

There is so much to thank God for at St Dunstan's. Thank you to all of you who give so much of yourselves – your time, skill and energy - in your desire to serve God here.

2019 will see our 140th anniversary celebrations, the aforementioned Bishop Sarah will be coming to lead a special service on 19th May. The Autumn will see an opportunity for us to take the gospel out to the streets of Acton. Brace yourselves for an exciting year ahead. (Jon Westall)

Seek



Over the last year, the Seek group has looked at ways in which we can enable and encourage the St Dunstan's family to engage more deeply and more personally with the Word of God. Those who completed the Growing with God questionnaires and held follow-up conversations found them helpful.

We want to ensure that opportunities for prayer ministry and for further engagement with God's

Word are offered in Sunday services and small groups.

Recruiting Sam as our Children's Worker has been a catalyst towards greater inclusivity and creativity and we have been grateful to, and inspired by, Ros Yates for her use of art in worship. (James Riddiough)

Services of worship

The normal pattern of Sunday worship at St Dunstan's involves 2 services on a Sunday morning. Holy communion at 9:00 is in a fairly traditional style, with set liturgy and hymns led by our organist Sylvia Coutts and faithful choir of up to 6 people. There are usually 25-30 adults and 3-6 children attending this service.



The second service at 10:45 has communion once a month, and includes worship songs, bible readings, preaching, prayer and testimony. This has between 40 and 80 adults in regular attendance, with 20 to 30 children and teenagers who go out to Sunday Club and 4TL after the initial songs and reading, unless it is all-age worship. The music at 10:45 is led by a band made up from our pool of talented

musicians and singers, organised during 2018 in turn by Ros Yates, Elinor Rhys, Rachel Westall and Richard O'Conor.

The preaching focus is normally the same for both the services, so that the whole church is following a coherent programme together. At festivals and through the

summer, we have an all-age communion service at 10:00 with everyone together, and on Wednesdays at 10:00 is a short, said Communion service, with 6-10 people usually attending.

Sunday Club: worship with children

We have three age groups in the 10:45 Sunday Club, Bubbles (3-5 year olds), Splash (5-8 year olds) and Xstream (8-11 year olds). We usually have 15-25 children at the 10:45 service on a Sunday morning. During the year we've covered 'Christian Commitments' such as: Prayer, the Bible and Worship. We've also covered 'Christian Foundations' such as: Who is God? Who is Jesus? and Jesus' Mission. Other topics have included 'How to have different relationships?' for example; family, friends, how to treat enemies and more. Finally, we looked at 'Christian Character', such as: Trusting God, Love, Joy and Patience.

Along with the 10:45 Sunday Club, we also started a 9:00 Service Sunday Club. We



have on average 3-6 children attending. Some of the older children come along as helpers and we have seen their faith and trust in God grow through their help. In this Sunday Club, we have been able to cover the same 'Christian Foundations' topic as the 10:45 Sunday Club.

We have a superb team of volunteers who diligently give up their time to plan and teach our children about God's love for them and we want to thank all of them for their hard work. Over the year we saw

some volunteers leave, but we have had some new ones join the team. However, we are still currently short of volunteers for Splash and for the 9:00 Service Sunday Club. Please do not hesitate to let Sam know if you might be interested in helping out.

We would also value your continued support and prayer for the children and their leaders. (Sam Bailey)

4TL: Sunday worship with teenagers

4TL (For The Lord) is the Sunday club for those who attend high school and takes place in the Chapel upstairs during the 10:45 service.

Resource content comes from the 'Energise' section of the 'Urban Saints' website. This gives the leaders a structure for each subject which is broken down into segments: 'warming up', 'getting started', 'digging in' and 'response'. We have been studying various topics, including 'The 10 Commandments' and 'Apologetics. First though, we often start with a game or other participation activity to wake the young people up.

Yet again, this year has been challenging. We only have AJ, Sharon and myself leading, with Buzz and Shane assisting. 4TL is continuing without a much-needed youth worker, and there is quite an age gap between most of the leaders/assistants and the youngsters. So I make no apology for repeating my plea of previous Annual Reports - WE NEED SOME YOUNG BLOOD, in tune with the youngsters to get them enthused. Coming to 4TL needs to be more appealing than a lie-in, gaming or any sporting activity for youngsters to want to attend.

Dance & Discipleship

Dance & Discipleship with Faith, is held weekly in the church during term time and lasts for an hour. We usually talk about our goals and our dreams for the future or we do some basic bible study. Then we warm up and start on the street dance. Most of the time, Faith has choreography which she teaches us and we can then use, adapt, do some improv or try some other styles of dance. It's a small group which is nice, but it would be amazing if even more people would join the class to add more to the sessions. (Harriet Riddiough)

Kidzone: Fun worship and learning after school on Mondays

KidZone is a short, after-school church service for primary school children and their parents. Its aim is to provide space to learn more about the Bible. We start with refreshments and a game in the hall. We then move into the church for worship and the children act out a story from the Bible. We recap the stories we've been going through which have included stories about Solomon, Elijah, and John the Baptist. We end with a time of prayer followed by another game.



Very happily, we held our very first Baptism at a KidZone service in December.

KidZone from January to July was doing really well and had good numbers. However, since September attendance has dropped for various reasons, including a number of year 6's moving to year 7, competition with other after-school clubs and parents moving away. But, with our connections to East Acton

Primary School growing, we hope to be able to encourage and invite students from there to attend KidZone. We also hope that as our relationship with other schools is nurtured, we will be able to increase the numbers of primary school children in KidZone. (Sam Bailey)

New Wine – a view from the Riddiough family

I'm not sure that 11 years ago, I would have found the idea of a week in a tent very appealing. All I can say is that the fun, fellowship and teaching (not to mention barbecues) that we as a family have experienced at New Wine have completely changed my view. Celia and Harriet are now on team looking after different age groups as part of the excellent children's work.



For those of you who don't know, New Wine is an organisation that looks to encourage churches to communicate effectively the good news of God's promises in our culture. Each year it holds a celebration of God's work in our lives and this usually involves camping!

In 2019, New Wine will be held in Peterborough from 27th July to 3rd August and we hope that more people come along to join in the fun! If

Praying for our Children

In September 2018, I started offering mums at St Dunstan's the opportunity to meet together once a month to pray for our children. This coincided with the appointment of Sam Bailey as our Children's Worker and the idea was to pray for the wider work with children in the church, as well as needs within our own families. My hope was that mums who don't find it easy to commit to a weekly homegroup might feel able to join the group which usually meets on the first Thursday of the month at the Vicarage.

A small group has met each month and Sam Bailey has contributed prayer requests covering Sunday Club and other church-based activities as well as new initiatives in the local schools and the community. If everyone who has attended over the last 7 months all came at the same time there would be about 10 of us. There are usually 3 or 4 and it has been good to share and pray together.

The group is meant to be very accessible and all women in the church are welcome to join us, or to let me know of things we can pray for if you are not able to attend in person. (Rachel Westall)

Small groups for study and fellowship

There are regular home groups on Monday and Thursday evenings, as well as a Bible study group on a Thursday morning. The people who attend the Wednesday morning communion service also enjoy a Bible study or discussion after the service.

Monday evenings - About 10 of us meet regularly on a Monday evening at James and Sue Riddiough's home to study the Bible and pray together. We continue to share the joys and disappointments and challenges of our daily lives and encourage and support each other through prayer. This is more fun than it may initially sound and we seem to spend a good deal of the time eating, laughing and recounting all that has gone on in the past week as well as talking about what is coming up and getting to grips with God's word. We genuinely walk with each other through the highs and lows.

We are privileged to have Richard O'Conor lead us in worship and we look at the Bible, alternating between the Old and New Testaments and explore what God is saying to us. We then apply this to our lives and the world. In the last year, we particularly enjoyed looking at the book of Joshua, as it challenged us in our lives in the 21st century.

We would be delighted to welcome anyone else to join us.

<u>Thursday evenings</u> - This is held at Sharon and David Morgans, where we have looked at the book of Joshua in its entirety and enjoyed getting to grips with its scope and range of issues. So much so, that the group is now looking at Judges!!

Sharon and David would love to welcome more people along.

<u>Thursday mornings</u> - there is a Bible study group at Anthony and Bella Fowler's. This has about 9 people attending and has recently been looking at Judges and the subject of prophesy in the Bible. (James Riddiough)

Worshipping together with local Christians

Revive East Acton is a bi-monthly event for different denominations to meet to worship the Lord together and importantly to pray for each of our churches and the needs of East Acton. All members of St Dunstan's are welcome at the meetings, so come along and enjoy fellowship with our local Christian brothers and sisters.

Acton Churches Together continues to informally connect local churches and holds occasional joint events, as well as the annual Good Friday Walk of Witness and carols



in the Market Place. These events not only celebrate and declare Jesus but present a united witness to our local community.

The Good Friday March is always well attended by St Dunstan's and it is encouraging to join a large group of Christians as we walk together along

Acton High Street praying for the area and joining in the worship songs. We display further unity at Christmas, singing carols together.

Serve



1 Peter 4v10 'Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others....'

The main focus for the Serve team this year has been the set up and launch of the 'Many Hands Campaign' (from the phrase 'many hands make light work'). It is about opening up opportunities for all of us to help each other, the church or the wider community.

The theory is simple – the more of us who sign up, the more people we can help and the more we can get done in the church.

We are trying to be more organised and introduce a mechanism to put those in need together with those who want help. It also offers something to those who don't know how they might be involved, making different tasks and areas of interest more accessible with the ultimate aim of growing the St Dunstan's family of helpers.

St Dunstan's can provide a sense of local community that we may not necessarily experience from our neighbours or in our place of work. It's the knowledge that if something happened in our lives and we cannot call on our immediate family, there is a willing support network of people available with practical help and prayer.

We have created a database of the help that is needed and what needs doing in the life



of St Dunstan's. The aim is to match what and when people feel they can offer help with a genuine need and at the time it is needed.

We are still in the process of collecting this information for our database and Chantelle Adams, as the gate keeper, can then match what you can offer, either as a group or on your own, with any request for help that comes in. All information submitted is subject to data protection restrictions.

Going forward, we will monitor the scheme and review its strengths and weaknesses, adapting it and continually improving it, to make it work for St Dunstan's. (Paul Bretherton)

Pastoral care

Alison Wood has stood down from leading the pastoral care team. I'd like to thank Alison for helping to form a team and for the training sessions she also organised, as well as the many home and hospital visits she made throughout the year.

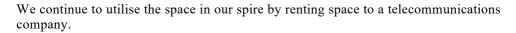


Our church building

Since last year's Annual Report, Chantelle has worked incredibly hard to build on the previous years' successes in raising the income from hiring our church buildings. Our calendar remains full most days of the week with regular weekly bookings, plus occasional bookings for training days and parties, and we have a caretaker to help manage the practical side of these events.

We continue to hire the building to, amongst others:

- The Angela Grant Ballet School.
- The Hammersmith Dog & Puppy club.
- A Zumba group.
- The Marley Watson School of Dance.
- Soundsteps.
- The Christian Mission who runs its services in Russian in the church every Sunday afternoon. This accounts for a sizable portion of our monthly rental income.

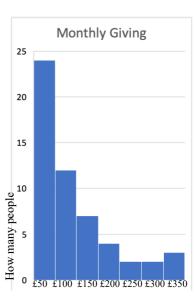


Running costs (utilities) have increased significantly, and our heating system needs upgrading, not least to improve efficiency and reduce the annual running costs, but it's mostly all good news. We continue to thank God for providing us with the extra income to help us run our church. (Chantelle Adams)

Stewardship and Fundraising

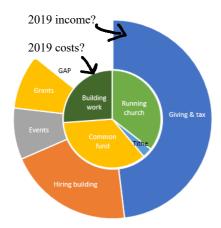
Our financial giving: As at the end of 2018, there were 57 households giving regularly to the church. 40 of these use the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) and 2 use others similar schemes. 4 have standing orders direct to our bank, and 11 give cash or cheques in regular giving envelopes.

Giving is confidential to the Stewardship Recorder, and obviously depends on each family's circumstances. This histogram shows how many people (or households) give different amounts. If this were unchanged throughout 2019, we would give a total of £66,576.



Other income: as well as our giving, we earn money from hiring out our building (including for the mobile phone mast in the tower). We also raise some funds through events like the Christmas Fair, and sometimes have been able to apply for grants.

Balancing the Books: In 2018, we didn't quite manage to balance our books (£3700 overspend). In 2019, costs will be higher. We will have our Children Worker, Sam, for the whole year, and there is some expensive building work needed (like replacing the boilers). We have a new fundraising group, looking at ideas for money-making events and applying for grants. We hope that the 140th anniversary will be an opportunity to raise some funds. However, we are unlikely to be able to bridge the financial gap this year.



New systems: During 2018, there were big financial changes for St Dunstan's as we moved our bank account to CAF, and signed up to PGS. It was a bit of an upheaval for everyone, but there have been considerable advantages.

We now have online banking with CAF so we can easily pay bills and accept payments electronically, and can view the state of our current account at any time. With PGS, Gift Aid is credited automatically every month, rather than having to make one big claim at the end of the year. There is also increased confidentiality as the bank account doesn't show the individual donors' names.

Share

Alpha

A small but dedicated Alpha Group ran during the first part of 2018. John Durston kindly led worship, whilst Ros and Jon led the course. One of the great riches of Alpha is the weekly group discussion — a varied group of people offering different perspectives on subjects as diverse as 'Is there a God?', Who is Jesus?', What is the purpose of life?' I have attended and run countless Alpha courses but still come away each week with food for thought.

TLG Early Intervention

The Transforming Lives for Good (TLG) Early Intervention project supports mentors from churches who work with primary school children who have emotional or behavioural issues which might lead them to be excluded from school. Mentors spend an hour a week in 1-to-1 sessions with the child for a year, working on fun projects and talking about the issues they face. We are currently working in partnership with East Acton Primary School.

In 2018, Jacqui Roberts coached a couple of children from East Acton Primary School. Sam attended the training day in September and is starting coaching in early 2019. The school is keen for us to continue with more pupils, and through contact with the Ealing Schools Counselling Partnership, we hope to expand to other local primary schools. In order to do this, we will need to recruit more coaches in the coming year, with the aim for new coaches to be trained at St Paul's Hammersmith in September. Little Acorns Toddlers



The Little Acorns Toddler group on Friday mornings continues to be hugely popular. 2018 saw us celebrate our 10 Year Anniversary with a weekend get-together where many past and present members attended over crafts, cake and a film.

The Friday session runs from 9:45 to 11:15 during term time, with toys, crafts, snacks, stories, and songs. On average, we have 15-20 toddlers, plus several babies, coming with their parents, nannies or grandparents.

Sam organises the admissions and activities, with the help of Ros, Alison, Esther, Janine, Deborah, and Natalie - including the faithful presence of Geoffrey and Josie in the kitchen. However, some of the volunteers have stepped down due to other commitments and so we are constantly looking for additional helpers. The parents/carers also willingly help out with crafts, refreshments, clearing away toys etc. We even have former parents who come back to visit - they miss being there!

Some have started coming to church, and many come along to special events like the summer barbecue, seasonal crafts, Christingle and Mothering Sunday services. It is wonderful to see friendships flourishing among the adults as the children play. We have many opportunities to give support and advice to each other. Some ask for prayer and there is interest in child baptism.

We always pray before the group at about 9:30 and we would welcome anyone who wishes to join us in prayer, or practical support. Do drop in!

As we say goodbye to Ros in 2019, we would especially like to thank her for her originality, artistry, cheerfulness and generous commitment over the years. We will miss you! (Sam Bailey)

Boys' Club

The Boys' Club is for boys in school years 3-6. It runs every Wednesday during term time. We play a lot of different board and card games and group activities that involve lots of running around. Twice a term, we hold a hotly-anticipated nerf war.

Peter Westall has now been helping me for a couple years and he has been amazing - he engages with the boys really well and has their respect as a leader.



The Boys' Club is currently low on numbers as we have seen a lot of the Year 6 boys moving on to Year 7. However, I am building strong relationships with the boys who are now coming along and they are developing good friendships amongst themselves.

The ultimate aim of Boys' Club is to be able to invite those who do not regularly come to Church on Sundays. We hope it will be a stepping stone to

regular attendance at KidZone, so please pray for opportunities to invite pupils from the local primary schools.

We would also like to expand Boys' Club into a Board Games Club for both Boys and Girls. To do this we will need a female helper. Please pray for someone to step forward to fill this role. (Sam Bailey)

Dads and Toddlers

We ran one Dads and Toddlers session in the Autumn Term of 2018. We will be running two a term throughout 2019. We had 10 toddlers and 8 dads at the first one. We are looking to invite dads of toddlers from Little Acorns. Our Autumn session coincided with the Love St Dunstan's Day and so some of the helpers doubled up! Our key helpers were James, Jon, Josie, Geoffrey, and Sam. We are looking to increase our helpers so if you are a male and would like to know more, do contact Sam. (Sam Bailey)

Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter

St Dunstan's opened its doors for its ninth season providing emergency accommodation over what transpired to be a bitterly cold six-week period at the beginning of the year. We

hosted 14 guests on Tuesday nights - those who are sleeping on the streets, are at immediate risk of rough sleeping locally or are the 'hidden homeless' who don't have a permanent place to stay. We offer them overnight shelter, a comfortable bed, and an evening meal and breakfast, as well as friendship and fellowship.

This year we welcomed 11 men and 3 women. Most of our guests spoke very good English so we heard many of their stories. We learnt about the difficulties



many of their stories. We learnt about the difficulties and frustrations they faced and witnessed, in most cases, their brave determination to move forward. It was heartwarming to see our guests support one another and to see our volunteers come alongside them with understanding and compassion.

As we reflect on the people we have met and their stories, we pray that their brief respite in the ECWNS's programme has given them the space, time, help, confidence, and support - whatever they needed - to move forward with their lives. We thank God for the conversations, the laughter and the tears we shared and for the friendships made. We especially remember our friend Dino who died suddenly in his sleep on 19 February. He was a lovely man with a cheeky sense of humour, always willing to give a helping hand. He was a kindly, wise role model for some of the younger guests. It was a reminder to us all how fragile life can be.

Again, this year we were helped by a handful of friends from our neighbourhood and the Ealing Youth Justice Service. We must give a special 'thank you' to those on the cooking rota for preparing such delicious meals, to those brave souls who volunteered for the overnight shift and for those who cleaned the toilets!!

Everyone I have spoken to who is involved with the night shelter has felt that the project is a great blessing to St Dunstan's and is so worthwhile. The project has allowed us to work as a team, make new friends or deepen existing friendships and most importantly, it has enabled us to show God's love to the poor and vulnerable in our community.

A huge THANK YOU to all our wonderful volunteers – your willingness certainly makes the job of completing the rota for the various tasks so much easier. (Jacqui Roberts)

Oasis Girls' Home, Guatemala

2018 saw the 5th short-term mission trip to the Oasis from St Dunstan's. There were 9 people in total on the team this time and we were able to see the completed prayer garden on which our teams have worked for the previous 3 years.



This year we refurbished the (very large) front and rear steel gates, converted a flat to offices, dug a soakaway and fitted suspended ceilings for the new floor at Casa Ester – the semi independence home for older girls. We also cooked the now customary lunch for 120, this time in the form of chicken tikka masala to bring a touch of English cuisine to Central America....

Of course, the most memorable times once again were spent with the girls on a visit to the water park, doing craft activities, playing games and enjoying the movie and pizza night.

We were entertained by the residents and staff of Casa Ester one evening and heard more about how their programme is expanding to care for young mums leaving the Oasis with their toddlers and for older girls who will need to stay in supported accommodation due to learning difficulties. The way that the programme adapts to meet the needs of girls in so many different situations is an incredible example of God's love being reflected in a family situation.

Our visit to the Source of Hope School in Zapote this year meant that we saw first-

hand the devastation caused by the eruption of the Fuego Volcano a few months beforehand. The lava hit the next village along from Zapote and killed possibly thousands. This and continuing social. emotional and economic consequences for this area is heart-breaking to see but the strength of faith and community among the people there is also humbling. Our St Dunstan's family generously participated in an appeal for those affected and the money went towards providing a therapeutic art camp for local people.



The overwhelming impressions from the trip this year were:

- the impact that sending teams regularly has on the local staff and girls who thanked us all (on team and back in London) for our continuing support and prayer for them.
- the impact that the trip had on team members, especially the non-Christians with us, who once again talked about the way their lives had been changed by the experience.
- The realisation once again that this is a ministry that is leading the way for the standard of care it provides and the reach of its influence not just within Guatemala but also to other ministries throughout Latin America.

Hope for Kids International is evolving to become closer still to Kids Alive International in the US. Tony is very involved in this process and will now be joined by David Morgans who has accepted an invitation to join as another trustee. We are very keen to build the link with St Dunstan's still further and any additional interest from members of our church family would be warmly welcomed.

We will be taking a break from running a trip in 2019 but already have plans for a trip in August 2020, so let Tony know if you would like to join the trip. Start saving! (Tony Bailey)

The Pain Exchange

The Pain Exchange (PEX) is St Dunstan's own charity, caring for those in chronic pain. It meets on Mondays in the Goldsmiths Room.

Participant attendance for the classes for 2018 totalled 628, with 83 additional one-to-one sessions for advice and treatment. The PEX saw 26 new patients which is 2 more patients than the target. The current number of participants on the books is 36 and 15 patients were discharged in 2018.



Of the 15 patients who were discharged, 9 met the objectives of the PEX, which include returning to work or a more active involvement in the local community or family life. These outcomes compare better to those reported in chronic pain research.

The PEX also provides education covering topics such as fears, anxieties, beliefs, stress, focus and attention. Patients have an opportunity to discuss the impact of these on their pain and management strategies are suggested. In 2018, the education days included themes such as "myth busters" and "it's never too late to exercise". These were campaigns run by the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy and so we were able to use their information sheets for the patients. The PEX also offers one-to-one sessions where patients have the opportunity to discuss their fears and anxieties.

Nutrition, art therapy, discussion and meditation are key components of what the PEX offers. We record our thanks to Ros Yates for her time, effort, enthusiasm and for the unending encouragement and love she displays to the participants. She will be most missed.

Sharon Morgans would welcome some more support, so if you know any local physiotherapists or if you would like to assist in any other capacity, please let her know. (James Riddiough)

Social Events

The social team had a relatively quiet year in 2018 due to a combination of illness, bereavement and other commitments. Despite this, the church family and the wider community still came together to enjoy some great social events and raise some valuable funds!

The first main event of the year was a fish and chip quiz night in February. It was hosted by the wonderful Nigel Middlemiss. Everyone had a fun and informative night and we raised around £150.

In June, we held a joint fundraising event for Christian Aid and the Oasis project. We sold cakes and home produce made and donated by the congregation. We also had a very successful plant stall. Outside, the young folk washed our cars for a fee.

Our annual BBQ was held in a very hot and sunny July, and was well attended.

Our biggest fundraiser was the Christmas Fair, which was a huge success once again. The Fair is happily now a firm fixture in our local community's calendar, and we raised nearly £3,500. A huge amount of work from a dedicated few, weeks in





advance, is put into the organisation of the Fair and we would urge you to get involved in this fun and satisfying service.

We rounded off the year with a new project, the Community Tea, to reach out to people in the local area. The inaugural event was in December and featured light bites and Prosecco. This was well attended. We intend this to be a regular event, scheduled on the second Monday of every month.

We have a number of plans for 2019 including a stall on Easter Sunday selling Easter crafts, cakes and plants, various cake sales throughout the year, as well as a night out/dinner for the ladies. Whilst we won't be holding a BBQ this year, due to our

140th celebration in May, we will be having a share and socialise event on 14th September.

Parochial Church Council

The PCC comprises the Clergy, Churchwardens, Representatives of the Deanery Synod and up to 12 elected plus up to 2 co-opted members of the congregation. The job of the PCC is to co-operate with the vicar in promoting the mission of the Church in the parish. Those who have served on the PCC since January 2018 are:

- ex-officio: Jon Westall (vicar), Ros Yates (deacon), Sue Bolton (Deanery Synod representative), Camilla Slade Viles (Deanery Synod representative), Innocent Annaba-Jones (church warden) and David Morgans (church warden).
- elected: James Riddiough (lay chair), Paul Bretherton, Julie Gordon, San-San Haddoub, Martin Haenlein, Helena Maitland (PCC secretary), Lesley Moszoro, Carlyon Viles, Alison Wood (treasurer) and Neil Yates with Chantelle Adams, Emma King and Grace Quansah until April 2017.

The PCC met 6 times in 2018.

The Standing and Finance committee, which met 5 times in 2018, comprises the vicar Jon Westall, church wardens David Morgans and Innocent Annaba-Jones, secretary Helena Maitland, treasurer Alison Wood (until April 2018), Sue Bolton (from April 2018) and PCC lay chair James Riddiough. This committee carries out PCC business, as directed by the PCC, in between its meetings.

Electoral Roll

The Electoral Roll stands at 126. 3 people were removed from the roll since 2017 and 5 added. (Mark Moszoro)

Fabric (the church buildings)

At the end of the 2017 it was discovered that part of the north-east corner of the building (the single storey kitchen extension) had suffered subsidence and as a result of the continuing movement, it was agreed with the church architect to underpin the affected area before repairing the damage. This work has now been completed and the PCC wishes to record its gratitude to Tony Bailey who led the procurement and oversaw the work of the contractors at no cost to the church. To prevent further problems, a number of large trees along the north-east boundary with Prideaux Place were cut down and as a result we will need to replace the fence along this boundary. The total cost of the remediation and associated works was a little under £20,000 although we did receive a grant of £7,500 from the Diocese for which the PCC was extremely grateful.

A more welcome change was the arrival of the sofas that have allowed us to create a relaxed seating area next to the crèche. Thanks to Paul Bretherton for organising this – again at no cost to the church.

During 2018, the church architect undertook our Quinquenniel inspection. We have not yet received his written report but expect that in the short term we will need to consider updating or replacing parts or all of the central heating system and the fire alarm system. We will also need to repair the church path, which is uneven in some parts.

Many thanks to all those members of the congregation who give of their time to keep the church building and its grounds looking beautiful. We are always looking for more helpers so if you would like to be involved, please speak to David Morgans. (David Morgans)

Deanery Synod Report

The Ealing Deanery Synod met 4 times in 2018. It brings together representatives from all the churches in the Deanery and all the meetings are open to any church member. Our PCC representatives on the Deanery Synod are Sue Bolton and Camilla Slade Viles.

Synod meetings include talks by inspiring speakers, case studies of good practice from the Deanery, and formal processes such as voting on issues related to the wider Church of England. The Synod also distributes the Mission Fund in the summer each year.

We started the year at St Mary's Church, Acton where we experienced worship in the Benedictine Tradition of peace, stillness and thankfulness. Revd Steve Morris, Vicar at St Cuthbert's North Wembley, then gave a wonderful presentation of the weekly Memory Cafe set up at his church. Although intended for those with dementia and their carers, others come to enjoy the company. A paid trainer leads chair exercise and memory quizzes. Speakers on topics such as the latest scams are invited in.

School governors were also elected

In May, we attended the Deanery Celebration and Archdeacon's Visitation at Holy Cross, Greenford and in July, we met to deal with important admin matters - the Annual Accounts, the Mission Fund and the election of Deanery Synod officers and standing committee members.

In October, we met at Christ the Saviour, Ealing Broadway and welcomed the new Bishop of London, The Rt Revd & Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally who celebrated Deanery Eucharist. We then enjoyed a question and answer session with her and learned that Bishop Sarah felt a key challenge facing London in the next 5 years was bringing Jesus to the wider community, especially 'millennials' who don't see the relevance of God. We should be listening to what God wants us to do in sharing the hope we have found and encouraged us to look at Nathanial in John's Gospel, who at first showed resistance! Her words inspire us to be creative and bold! (Sue Bolton)

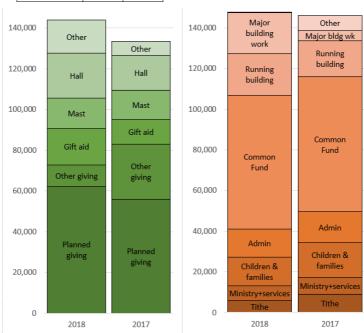
