#### 119th Annual Report of the Council of the London Topographical Society for 2018

Our 118<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting was held on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> June 2018 in the Beveridge Hall of Senate House of the University of London. It was well attended and after the formalities of the meeting there were two short talks – Rosemary Ashton spoke about Victorian Bloomsbury and the widening of education, and Ros Cranston, the BFI's Film and TV Non-Fiction Curator spoke about their London films digitisation project.

Council meetings were held in January, April and September to discuss the Society's publications programme, membership, finances and general administration.

The Society issued two publications for 2018 - A 'Connoisseur's Panorama', Thomas Girtin's Eidometropolis and Other London Views c.1796-1802, by Greg Smith (LTS 181) and The Stone Gallery Panorama: Laurence Wright's view of the City of London from St Paul's Cathedral c.1948-56, by Hubert Pragnell, Patricia Hardy & Elaine Harwood (LTS 180). Both were very well received by members. In addition, members received a copy of the Historic Towns Trust's A Map of Tudor London – England's Greatest City 1520.

The Society's total income for 2018 was £32,575 while expenditure came to £30,565.

The Society made a single grant this year of £8,000 to the Historic Towns' Trust towards the cartography work involved in producing their *Map of Tudor London*.

During the year 11 new members joined the Society: at the end of 2018 there were 1173 paid-up members and four honorary members.

Our *Newsletter* was published in May (No. 86) and November (No. 87) with articles ranging widely over London both past and present.

'A Place in the Sun': topography through insurance policies by Isobel Watson outlined the work of a group of volunteers who have spent 15 years creating an online index to a run of the insurance policy registers of the Sun Fire Office between 1782 and 1842. Parishes, Wards, Precincts and Liberties – solving a topographical puzzle by Ian Doolittle took a look at the City's internal divisions – with more to come on this complex subject. Preserving London's Film Heritage at the British Film Institute by Christopher Trowell, the BFI's Trusts and Foundations Coordinator provided an overview of the BFI's London on Film project which is a groundbreaking archival and preservation project digitising film material that captures the changes and hidden histories of capital. Lots Road awaits its reincarnation by David Crawford continued his exploration of the fate of London's industrial structures and explained the complicated history and debateable status of a prominent Thames-side landmark.

Francis Marshall took a look at Pierre Prévost's 1815 panorama London from the Tower of St Margaret's Church, Westminster. In The topography of London's early playhouses Julian Bowsher assessed the archaeological and documentary evidence of the character of London's early theatres, setting them in their topographical context. A Seventeenth-Century map of Whitechapel and Wapping by Geoffrey Tyack examined the character of this area to the east of the City and related it to what one can see today. London's almshouses, a living tradition by David Crawford took a look at the Charterhouse in Islington and several other almshouses including the restored Geffrye Museum. London Diaries of the Second World War by Professor Jerry White explored the variety of London diaries written during World War II and which are now available to read through the London Record Society.

Book reviews discussed a variety of subjects including the Port of London, the friaries of medieval London, the Survey of London, the gardens of Humphrey Repton and Gunnersbury Park.
