## REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

## STRUCTURE AND OBJECTS

The Association, which is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), was established under a constitution adopted on 22 October 2017 and registered as a charity number 1176277, and at Companies House, on 14 December 2017, The registered address of the association is 2 Dignum Street London N1 0FJ.

The objects of the Association are to maintain and manage an open space in the Borough of Islington for the benefits of its members and local residents.

In planning our activities for the year we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our Management Committee meetings.

## ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Seen as a model of good practice for many years, Culpeper Community Garden, established in 1982, continues to be a source of inspiration, pleasure and relaxation for members, volunteers and visitors alike. Our relatively small open space in inner London is run by members and volunteers on sustainable, organic principles. It includes 54 plots cared for by local people without their own gardens, plots for supported community groups, and communal areas, including a pond, a wildlife area, lawns, Dry Garden, and rose pergola; and a 'tea hut' for members. We have a small community building used regularly as a classroom, a meeting room for community groups, and available for rent to our members for birthday parties and weddings.

The day-to-day management of the Garden is run by 2 part-time members of staff, Mandy Graham & Paul Formosa.

## Highlights of 2018/2019

Special events in 2018/19 included:

- Culpeper Garden hosted radio 4's popular programme Gardeners Question Time. Our neighbours at the Half-Moon Tenants Hall lent us their building for the evening, and we served Pimms and Mocktails to our guests.
- We became a Wedding venue for the first time; with a stretch tent built across the Lawn for our members Tais & Eoin to celebrate with friends & family.
- Over the year our Tuesday & Friday Open Volunteer sessions numbered 101;
   with 704 participants.
- We delivered 218 supported sessions enabling people with learning difficulties, mental illness, lonely, isolated or elderly, and refugees or asylum seekers to learn basic horticulture skills and benefit from the therapeutic effect of the Garden.
- We held only 1 Plant sale this year in May as our new Greenhouse was under construction in the Autumn. (19 volunteers and 80 visitors).

- At the Open Garden Squares Weekend in June we staffed the Garden on the Sunday for more than 150 visitors and provided 15 guided tours and home-made refreshments and plants for sale.
- Our Pensioners Strawberry Tea (120 pensioners from Islington) was supported again in 2018 by a corporate group of volunteers (15) from the Welcome Foundation who augmented our own volunteer members (15) and also thankfully provided the scones from their kitchen.
- We celebrated Spring, Summer & Winter Solstices with barbeques and bonfires in 2018. We also held a tea-party to celebrate Equaliteas in partnership with Stuart Low Trust. (12 guests).
- We organised 5 members' trips our spring and autumn visits to Kew Gardens which are open to all; we travel by train and our members accompany members of our supported groups. (44 adults & 8 children). These trips provide an important learning opportunity, and help to build cohesion between people at Culpeper from different groups.
- We also arranged 2 trips for our Southwood Smith Group; a day on the Canal (thanks to the Angel Community Canal Boat Trust) and Tate Modern. (12 adults; 9 from the group plus 3 volunteers).
- The annual Farms & Gardens Show relocated to Woodberry Farm in Greenwich in 2018. We travelled by mini-bus and collected disabled members en route (15).

Environmental Education this year has seen the continued expansion of our work with Primary Schools. In partnership with the peripatetic Science Teacher based at Vittoria School, we repeated the frog Project with Year 5 students from 6 Islington Primary Schools to raise tadpoles in the classroom. The project was again a success, as 50% of tadpoles grew into froglets; a much better rate than in the wild.

We provided structured activities in the Garden for 35 classes in 2018 (over 1,000 children) and enabled both Vittoria and Thornhill Primary to use the Garden as an outdoor classroom for their own curriculum requirements. The Family School (who work with excluded primary-aged children and their families) visited on a daily basis with their young students to explore seasonal changes, hunt for bugs and benefit from the calm environment we have created.

3 Local nurseries bring their children to visit on an ad hoc basis. (12 visits in 2018).

We have introduced 'Plants of the Week' where we display specimens from the Garden in our Garden Room; labelled with both Latin and common names so all our visitors can learn by observation.

Our newsletter is now sent electronically to members & supporters- printed copies are available.

#### GOVERNANCE

During this busy year a committed Management Committee directed the work of the Garden and staff. The Committee is elected annually by the members and are responsible for the governance and management of the Garden. The site is held on a 50 year lease at a peppercorn rent from the London Borough of Islington.

#### **FINANCES**

On 1 April 2018, with the agreement of the Membership, the Registered Charity no. 291156 "The Culpeper Community Garden Association" was formally wound up and its assets and membership transferred to this organisation, a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) (Registered Charity no. 1176277), registered at Companies House.

We maintain reserves equivalent to approximately six months of our running costs. In the event of reduced income in the future this would enable us to run a basic service n the garden while we sought future funding. It would also mean that we could meet our responsibilities ro our staff if we needed to terminate their contracts.

Our main charitable trust funding came from the Cripplegate Foundation, the Newby Trust, the Axis Foundation and the 29 May Charitable Foundation. Funding for a specific project came from the Cripplegate Community Chest. Other income came from members' subscriptions, generous individual donations and plant sales and lettings of the Resource Centre and Garden.

# INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF CULPEPER COMMUNITY GARDEN ASSOCIATION
