Objectives and activities

Stummary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

- To:promote-social inclusion for the public benefit by:preventing people from becoming:excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded (in particular but not limited to those with physical, mental, social or emotional disabilities or disadvantages) by providing equine assisted the rapeutic and educational activities that may also involve other animals in order to assist them to integrate into society.
- 2) To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection treatment and security for animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness;

maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill-usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty, and suffering among animals.

In 1) above, "emotional disabilities will encompass those beneficiaries who struggle with low self-esteem or self-confidence, or have difficulty; with communication and relationships or in regulating emotions (such as anger, anxiety and sadness) on lack emotional stability and resilience.

Animal Antiks operates on a working farm, Manor Farm, based in the village of North Marston, Buckinghamshire located between the towns of Aylesbury and Buckingham.

Oh'a daily basis (Monday to Friday) the farm supports children and adults facing various challenges in their likes bringing them together in a safe and unique non-segregated environment; promoting and enhancing key life; socialland functional skills through astivities involving the care and welfare of animals as well as other activities around the farm.

The Animal Antiks approach is both innovative and unconventional.

Teamwork is built by creating teams that mix young people and adults with a variety of needs and disabilities. Animal Antiks has had more than six years' experience providing practical, personal and emotional support to a growing number of clients with a range of disabilities (physical, sensory and learning) or behavioural, mental or emotional issues:

This support is provided in anworking farm environment, at Manori Farm in North Marston, offering work based agricultural, equine and animal care opportunities for clients. Over time ctients have shown an increased in confidence, displayed fewer anxieties and been more comfortable interacting in normal social situations.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main active ements of the charity during this year.

2018/19 has been a busy year as we settled into our new premises at!

Manor Flarm, North Manston, Bucks Ariot of work has been carried out onsite to improve our facilities; including the creation of a new barn which now Houses our temporary classroom, kitchen area and craft area as well as maintenance of other buildings around the farm and improvements to to keep the clients and animals safe.

The year started with two successful open days; one for a variety of different professionals who had links to the type of work we do and one for a wider audience to raise some funds and come and see our set up, what we were doing at the farm and our plans for the future. A number of the adults and children who attend sessions at the site during the week helped out during these events and helped make it a success.

Over the year we have welcomedian increasing number of individuals: who have given their time as volunteers on a regular basis or have come along for specific projects or events. This included support from a group of 80 RAF recruits and a number of groups throughout the year from Action 4 Youth, supporting both the National Citizenship Scheme and the Inspiration programme.

In the second half of the year we started to hold more regular fundraising events in the local village half including a fashion show, a quiz night and a special race night. All these events have helped to raise much needed funds for the charity and we have shown an increase in donations to the charity over the last year.

By December 2018 Sarah and Nicklifinally took control of the whole site and managed to move into the farm house. This has meant they now have improved controllof the site and the plans to expand the offer could be put into place...

In January 2019, working with training partner Haddon Training, two students started their education onsite which allowed them to access formal education after a long gap Both have worked extremely hard and feedback has been positive, so we hope to extend this offer to other students in September 2019.

February 2019 saw us involved with the book launch of Happiness for Beginners', written by Carole Matthews who had based the story on ideas from Animal Antiks after several visits to the farm. Various other events have taken place around this which has provided a wonderful opportunity to raise additional funds for the charity and spread the word about what we do. We also held aidrop-in session over the half terms which was well attended and has led to a number of new referrals.

We ended the year planning a further extension to our offer by pulting on a number of additional sessions over the Easter school holidays.

We currently have over 50 children and adults regularly attending each week, some for just a couple of hours whilst others attend everyday.

Over the year we have supported littly 80 individuals and added to this is the large number of additional people who benefited by attending as part of a supported group, such as Action 4 Children.
