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TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2018

Policies and Objectives

Springwood Trust exists to support Capital Church Cardiff in its work as a local Christian congregation. The funding also facilitates work with other churches within South Wales and worldwide.

When planning our activities, meetings and funding for projects for the year, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

Capital Church has continued to provide open meetings in Llanedeyrn during 2018 and remains involved in the local communities through a variety of initiatives. The church seeks to express its faith through the practical benefits of these initiatives, and to explain this faith where interest is shown.

The Trust has continued to be very generously supported in all its work, including in support of other churches. It continues to maintain a satisfactory position financially thanks to prudent investment of funds and careful assessment of proposed expenditure.

Review of Activities

Regular Sunday morning meetings have been available to the community throughout 2018 in local premises, where promotion of the Christian faith through worship and teaching is provided.

The church is financially supporting a project to provide resources, advice and friendship to prostitutes in central Cardiff during evenings. The Caru Am Byth project (formerly known as Liberty) incorporates members of several churches and works with co-operation from the police. Benefits include monitoring of health, information on potential trafficking, and exit strategies where requested for those involved.

Another project in which members of the church take an active interest supports asylum seekers arriving in Cardiff. The Oasis centre provides resources, education and advice to assist applicants in their legal quest for asylum. The church has also provided financial support for events.

Funding is still allocated for the church's long-standing support for a church in Kenya. Members of the church have in the past visited Kenya and seen first-hand the orphanage for which funding has been raised.

A dedicated team of church members run a weekly community outreach group in Llanedeyrn, organising social activities such as quizzes, bingo and refreshments for local people who want time out from their home lives.

A new venue was used for the church's Sunday meetings at local council premises. Funding was used during the year for mobile PA equipment suitable for the venue and for secure storage for the necessary resources for these meetings. A badminton for beginners opportunity for the local community was started during 2018 using the same hall.
