IN THE MIX YOUTH PROJECT TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER 2108

OBJECTS OF THE CHARITY, ITS ACTIVITIES, ACHIEVEMENTS and PERFORMANCE

The Trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

The objects of the charity are

- 1. To act as a resource for young people up to the age of 25 living in the Taunton Deane Borough Council and West Somerset District Council areas, in particular those living in Wiveliscombe and outlying villages by providing support, advice, information and assistance.
- 2. Organising programmes of physical, educational, spiritual, developmental and other activities as a means of:
 - (1) Advancing of life and helping young people develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals;
 - (2) advancing education and understanding;
 - (3) relieving unemployment;
 - (4) providing recreational and leisure time activities in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons.

Report 2018 Financial Year

Overview

In The Mix Youth Project has had a busy year in terms of infrastructure in 2018 but a year of considerable transition

We've maintained our open access sessions at The Base Youth Centre and ITMYP have been able to access commissioned work due for through UK Youth which has been challenging but very satisfying for the youth workers and also developmental for the organisation.

I'm pleased to say also with the returning of a previous company director Nick Harvey we've been able to focus interested members of staff into a very tight business development team which is designed to completely overview the whole public purpose of In The Mix Youth Project with a view of making some significant changes in the next financial year this is making very positive progress and hopefully in 2019 will be able to recount the successes of these moves.

I'd like to thank Tony Armstrong and Nick Harvey this year for undertaking infrastructure work and also Jonathan Smith who has been able to oversee a number of the UK youth projects that we have undertaken.

Pleased to mention also the UK youth projects we have undertaken including a coding project for music and creative skills project and also project revolves around policy framework has all been very positive and has resulted in lots of outcomes for young people and staff.

Completing our future proofing the UK youth is enabled us to look completely at our policy framework and that's been very healthy and will build well for the future

We are very proud that we've managed to get 20 young people also through the use of Youth Achievement Awards as a result of partnership work with Taunton YMCA, Kingsmead School students and also through some of our other partners. This has been very rewarding work which we hope to be able to undertake in the future

Café Random Delivery

Alongside our Project Delivery, Café Random delivery on two lunchtimes and after School and a positive vibe from members that attend those sessions. Nick has been key to the redevelopment of the Café Sessions this year. The programme for Café Random has been very full on in the autumn and winter terms but as the summer comes on there is a need to develop something a little bit more relaxed so numbers were very significant in the early part of the year and little bit less towards the end, but over all our Café Random sessions have been delivered very successfully in line with all our service changes however we will be really looking at our youth café provision alongside all our other work for 2019.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to financial statements

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the Company's state of affairs at the end of the financial year and of its income and expenditure for that year. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to;

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply these consistently
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which

disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charitable Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Review of Financial Position

As I referred to last year the difficulty in accessing local funding, particularly since the establishment of Community Foundations has continued to be a restriction as well as the austerity issues in the UK economy reducing money for Charitable purposes putting a strain on what money is available for organisations such as ourselves. As I stated last year as well Community Foundations with much tighter eligibility constraints and expecting much more statistical analysis and consultation for very small pots of money make it very difficult for small charities to get the necessary funding for projects and core costs quickly and achievably.

Very sadly we had to say goodbye to Lewis Stevens this year because of work he wasn't able to stay involved with us which was a great shame so from April 2018 I was able to take on the reins as chair Whilst I am happy to do this it is important that we give as an organisation time in 2019 to recruit an additional board and use the opportunity to bring in some industry-based skills into the team which will keep the organisation fresh in terms of where it wants to progress. Nick Harvey and myself have been working very hard with a view to having the new development and business plan ready for 2019 and a launch in autumn of the year we will be in a position to report back in the 2019 AGM

During the year the Charity incurred total expenditure of \pounds 59,223 of which \pounds 56,601 was directly charitable.

Over the year the Charity received income of £54,247 leading to an overall deficit of £4,976. The Balance sheet shows total reserves at 31st December of £(3,608).

Reserves Policy and Risk Management

It is the intention of the Trustees that the freely available reserves of the charity should be sufficient to ensure the continuance of its activities, should there be an unexpected short-term adverse fluctuation in income. The Trustees consider that an appropriate level of free reserves is approximately three months' normal expenditure. This equates to approximately £5,000. At 31st December there was no funding freely available for general purposes. The Trustees are working towards long-term financial plans that generate sufficient free reserves to satisfy its reserves policy over the coming 12 months and beyond.

The Trustees have examined and addressed the financial risks to which the Charity is exposed and in association with its insurers, has mitigated those risks to the best of its ability

Going Concern

The Trustees noted the pressure on the finances at the end of 2018 and were confident with the plans that were being put in place for 2019 in order the charity is sustainable beyond 2019 alongside a detailed review of its working delivery its income streams and projected trading,

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE and MANAGEMENT

The Charity was incorporated on the 15th December 2011 as a Company Limited by Guarantee. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Charity registered with the Charity Commission on 29th April 2015.

The Directors of the charitable company ("the charity") are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the trustees. The Board meets monthly. The trustees retire every three years and may stand for re-election.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for determining the overall policy direction of the charity, for fixing and reviewing its annual budget, and for approving annual accounts.

New trustees are nominated by the Board, and will be asked to visit the charity before attending a trustee meeting as an observer. An induction pack is provided for trustees.
