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## <u>REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES</u> FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2018

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2018.

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objectives and aims**

The objects of the Charity are as follows:

1. The improvement of economic methods of production and utilisation of grass and forage crops for the promotion of profitable agriculture.

2. The advancement of education and research in grass and forage crop production and utilisation. Publication of the results of relevant research to an international audience via a quarterly Journal and academic symposia.

3. Interpretation of research and active communication of improved methods of production and utilisation to the farming community.

4. Promotion of grassland farming as an example of sustainable agriculture, which is environmentally benign and visually attractive, for the public benefit.

5. Its Research and Development Committee represents members' interests to Government by responding to consultations and identifying priorities for research.

#### Public benefit

The Trustees have considered the Public Benefit provided to the general public and relevant sector of the public which it serves and are satisfied that it meets the requirements of the Charity Commission. In line with its objects the society aims to support sustainable grassland management and protection of the environment for future farming generations and the general public. For the relevant sector of the public, benefits include:

a) Providing information on the website and through interaction with the Press, open membership, membership fees which are subsidised by other activities and reduced rates for students and retired members;

b) By holding some open events each year;

- c) By seeking sponsorship to subsidise conference and workshop fees;
- d) Through a bursary award scheme open to members and non-members;
- e) Contributing to government consultations on behalf of members;
- f) Offering publications below the cost of their production;

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Recorded membership of the society at the end of 2018 totalled 472 compared with 488 on record in 2017. There were 44 resignations, including a number written off because of continued non-payment. New members in 2018 totalled 30, similar to the increase of 37 in 2017. Payments by Direct Debit continue to increase, with a number of standing order and invoice payees and new members moving to this method. Corporate membership remained at its maximum of 15 companies during the year. There were 59 affiliated local societies recorded at the end of 2018. Together with full members the network in total is estimated at a little under 5,000.

In 2018, continued careful financial management saw the Society return an overall decrease in funds of  $\pounds 15,975$  compared to a surplus of  $\pounds 99,567$  in 2017. The decrease was due to a fall in the investment values by  $\pounds 39,676$ . If we exclude this then the society made a surplus of  $\pounds 23,701$  in 2018, compared to  $\pounds 24,501$  in 2017.

Technical Project Manager Nia Cowcher resigned effective the end of 2018, finding the writing aspects of the job difficult. The post was advertised with an adjusted job description and new title of Knowledge Exchange officer, and a successful appointment was made, with Sandra Pattinson joining the Society at the start of 2019. This maintains the staffing level at approximately 2.2 FTE.

The Society organised a number of meetings, conferences and other events in 2018:

a) A new collaboration with LIC and AHDB Dairy allowed us to hold two Spring Farm Walks, in Derbyshire and Devon. This arrangement worked well with each partner offering capabilities in the organisation and execution. Trade stand sponsorship covered the costs of the event and returned a small surplus to BGS.

b) BGS collaborated with the Bath and West show society to establish a seminar series for the Grassland UK event in May. The seminars were strongly supported by corporate members, with six members offering talks and a financial contribution to the costs of the series. Ten talks were offered through the show sponsors and quasi non-governmental organisations offering talks on important management, legislative and animal health topics.

c) The annual Summer Meeting was held over three days in County Durham, based at the Holiday Inn, Scotch Corner. Around 41 full delegates, plus up to 50 day delegates each day enjoyed a varied programme of farm visits, including an unusual visit to grouse moorland managed in a careful balance of cooperation with the landowner and adhering to environmental scheme requirements. Falling numbers mean that in 2019 a two-day event, visiting five farms, is being piloted.

d) 2018 was the fifth year of the BGS UK Grassland Farmer of the Year (GFotY, formerly the National Grassland Management Competition), which was again well supported by the Local Grassland Societies. Mr Steve Brandon, winner of the NGMC in 2010, continued his role as head judge for a second year. The GFotY award was presented to Mr Richard Rogers, and manager Gethin Roberts, of Tre Ifan, Bryniscelyn, Anglesey. We owe great thanks to our national sponsors Yara and DLF, the head judge and other sponsors and volunteer judges at the regional and local levels.

e) The 2017 GFotY winner, Rhys James, kindly hosted a farm walk in June. This was well-attended and offered many opportunities for discussion. He also offered an informal walk for the 2018 finalists on the morning after the presentation evening.

f) The society also attended the Holstein UK Dairy Day, with a space allocated in the knowledge transfer and education area. This was offered free by the organisers to help promote charitable and educational activities in the industry.

The journal Grass and Forage Science, is now wholly online, with full BGS members offered log-in access. The co-editorial partnership of Dr Anjp Elgersma and Dr Kevin Smith is working well; Dr Elgersma has, with some financial assistance from the Society and Wiley, attended two European conferences and promoted the journal. This has been beneficial, with a special issue of the journal comprising papers form the International Silage conference, whilst a keynote paper from the Cork EGF meeting is in its final stages and will be published later.

The Prince's Countryside Fund worked with the Society to find a way to bring the Grazing Mentors project to fruition. Working with AHDB, four new mentors were identified and trained in autumn 2018, and in spring 2019 have begun mentoring a range of livestock and dairy farmers. The project is extended until the end of 2019.

The Society's profile continues to rise, both from publicity from its events, specific activity at third-party events and through projects. BGS has actively embraced social media as an additional means of communicating with members and a means of advertising our events and activities, and at the end of 2018 we had 2263 followers on Twitter. The BGS Facebook profile has a smaller impact but can provide a greater level of interaction at times.

Working with the Herbage Grass and Clover Recommended List Project Board, the Society continues to promote the Recommended Grass and Clover Lists for England and Wales. Our profile continues to be raised by committee activity with the Professional Nutrient Management Group and the Campaign for the Farmed Environment, whilst the Director is co-opted onto the Agricultural Industries Confederation's Agriculture and Environment committee as a grassland specialist. The Society is involved in several in-kind project, including the large-scale SUREROOT project, which maintains a strong link with grass breeding and agronomic research. New, smaller projects are coming on-stream, which, whilst they generate little income, do maintain our presence in the scientific arena and ability to provide information to our membership and beyond.

The Society seeks to work in partnership with many like-minded industry organisations, such as its corporate members, as well as not for profit organisations such as agricultural levy boards. Corporate membership remains important and the society continues to seek to interact and engage more actively with our existing members, as well as attracting potential new ones.

The society continued to use SAGE accounts to record financial activities and Sage ACT! for our membership records throughout 2018. The HMRC requirement for Making Tax Digital (MTD) meant that a new accounts system was necessary; after investigating the options and seeking advice the Society moved to use a cloud-based system, Xero, in early 2019. Use of the system is now well-established.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The Society receives untiring support from all segments of the membership and grassland community - scientists, farmers, industry and advisors. Many give their time for free and the BGS team work with dedication to achieve success. We are continually grateful for their efforts.

The R&D Committee remained inactive during 2018 primarily because attention continued to be focused on streamlining administration and maintaining the main society activities.

The written policies for the running of the Society have all been reviewed by Trustees during the year. Management of the Society's finances, including reduced reliance on investment income and royalties from the scientific journal means the Society continues to be in a strong position to continue operating and to consider investment in activities, such as bursary awards, for long-term growth of the Society. The Trustees have begun reviewing how the investments are held, potentially using an advisor to more actively manage the portfolio.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### **Financial position**

In 2018 the total funds of the Society decreased by  $\pounds 15,975$ . This is arrived at by a surplus of  $\pounds 23,701$  in the Society's general operations, publication activities and organisation of meetings and events.

Investments produced an unrealised loss of £39,676, reflecting a decline in performance in global investment markets in late 2018. At 31 December 2018 total investment funds were £445,316 compared with £484,992 at 31 December 2017.

Total Fund

The Total Account relating to management and administration produced a deficit of  $\pounds 15,975$  compared with a surplus of  $\pounds 99,567$  in 2017.

Total income increased by £8,244 compared with 2017. This resulted from an increase in income from Demos of £3,825 subscriptions and fees of £2,320, Publications of £413, Other income of £339 and an increase in Meetings and events of £1,781. Investment income increased by £434 in the year.

Total expenditure increased by £9,044 compared with 2017, as a result of increased overheads and direct costs.

The production of Society publications in various forms produced an income of  $\pounds 89,734$  compared with  $\pounds 89,321$  in 2017.

(i) Net income from Grass and Forage Science totalled £72,917 compared with £69,851 in 2017. The publishers, Wiley, continue to explore and develop further extension of the publication via online facilities and expand into developing areas such as China and Brazil. The journal was co-edited by Dr Kevin Smith and replaced by Dr Anjo Elgersma. The editing policy of Grass and Forage Science remains under the complete control of the Society.

Bursary award fund

No BGS bursary award was made this year; however, Trustees are exploring ways to utilise the surplus funds the Society now holds in the form of academic and non-academic awards.

#### Investment policy and objectives

It is the policy of the Trustees to invest any surplus of resources available in order to achieve a level of return as considered acceptable by the Trustees. The investments held by the Society have been acquired in accordance with the powers of the Trustees.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### **Reserves policy**

The Trustees have considered the requirement for reserves held by the society and believe the optimum level of free reserves (those not invested in Tangible Fixed Assets) should be 18 months expenditure, with an absolute minimum of 1 year's expenditure, to cover the risks of the society relating to events, publications and obligations to staff and creditors.

At 31st December 2018 reserves held total £679,613. The Trustees consider that total funds are sufficient to meet future financial obligations of the Society. A written policy on reserves has been agreed by the Trustees and is reviewed annually.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Charity is organised and run by an elected Council who during their period in office are recognised as Trustees of the Charity. The Trustees operate under the incorporated title of "The Trustees of the British Grassland Society" but the granting of this incorporated status by the Charity Commissioners does not alter the powers or liabilities of the individual Trustees to comply with the Charities Act 1993 as set out at the end of this report, and the Society remains an unincorporated association that is governed by its Constitution. Other societies with objectives in accordance with the British Grassland Society can become affiliated societies, and this should be encouraged for the benefit of the Society, its objectives and agriculture in general.

The Council is supported by regional advisers to Council, other Committees formed for specific functions as and when the Trustees determine and affiliated local grassland societies in the UK. These committees comprise Trustees and members of the Society co-opted in relation to the particular expertise required on these committees. Chairmen of committees report to Council with recommendations. Election of Trustees to Council is by nomination and then, if necessary, by vote at the annual general meeting. The Trustees are unpaid for services rendered to the Society. A new constitution was agreed in 2006, amended in 2009, and is approved by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## **BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

## INCOME

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### EXPENDITURE

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

## TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

- 25% on reducing balance

## TAXATION

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.
