TRUSTEES' REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the period 01 January 2018 to 31 December 2018.

Structure, governance and management

Generation Builders is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), registered with the Charity Commission and governed by its constitution, adopted January 2015.

The only voting members of the CIO are the charity trustees. Membership of the CIO cannot be transferred to anyone else. The members of the CIO have no liability to contribute to assets and no personal responsibility for settling debts and liabilities in the event of winding up.

The affairs of the charity are managed by the trustees, who may exercise all the powers of the charity.

The trustees who served during the year are shown on page 3 of this report.

Appointment of Trustees

The first charity trustees have been appointed for a term of four years (Andrew Murray) and three years (remaining trustees). Future trustees will be appointed by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees will regard skill, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

In accordance with the terms of the constitution, there must be at least three charity trustees. Each new trustee is given a copy of the constitution and the latest trustee's annual report and accounts, on or before appointment.

Charitable aims and objectives

The objects of the charity are:

To advance the Christian faith, both in Great Britain and overseas, for the benefit of the public in accordance with the beliefs found in the Christian Bible.

Activities undertaken for the public benefit & Achievements during the period

In shaping the objectives for the year, the trustees have paid due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

2018 was the fourth full year of ministry for Generation Builders and saw continued growth in our Influence and exposure. Once again almost every week of the year saw a Generation Builders activity take place somewhere around the world.

The majority of our time was spent in the United Kingdom where we spoke at 39 different churches or events. These included local church meetings, conferences, community outreach events and specialist events for youth and church leaders.

In January, Generation Builders spent two weeks in the USA speaking at a conference and at local churches. In February Generation Builders spoke at a conference in Spain. In April

we spent two weeks in the USA speaking at churches and in prisons. In June we spent two weeks in Mexico speaking at many different churches. In September we were back in the USA speaking at Churches. In October we spoke at a conference in Ireland. In November we took a team to Ghana to speak at various churches.

Our training college in partnerships with Revive Church continues to grow. Our ministry in print and on radio and the release of new products continues to expand. We released our first two books entitled "Seeing the Church" and "The Miracle Table".

We held our annual conference in Wakefield.

Plans for the Future

Our plans for 2019 include missions to the USA, Albanla, Spain and Mexico plus continued work around the UK and the release of another book.

The Charity's policy on reserves

The trustees recognise the need to keep reserves at a level which will give the charity stability to enable it to continue to operate in the future. The actual level of reserves at the year-end, represented by the unrestricted fund, was £9,029 (2017: £6,912) which the trustees consider to be satisfactory.

Related parties

Related party transactions are shown on page 9 of this report.

Trustees responsibilities for the financial statements

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the charity at any time and enable the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

Financial Position

The financial statements are set out in pages 7 to 9. The Receipts and Payments Account shows a surplus for the year of £2,117 (2017: a deficit of £23). The total funds of the charity at yearend stand at £9,029 (2017: £6,912). The reserves of the charity, represented by unrestricted funds, stand at £9,029 at the year-end (2017: £6,912).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

1. Accounting policies

Basis of the preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared on a Receipts & Payments basis which summarises the movement of cash in and out of the organisation. In this context 'cash' includes cash equivalents, such as bank accounts where cash can be readily available to pay debts as they fall due. This format of accounts is available to non-company charities with gross annual income of £250,000 or less.

<u>Classification of income & expenditure</u> Income and expenditure has been analysed in the accounts using natural classification.

Funds structure

The charity maintains an unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Unrestricted funds may arise from general donations, grants of a general nature, fees for service provision and payment for service delivery contracts.

Restricted funds may be provided to the charity for particular purposes and may only be spent for the purposes for which they were given. Any balance remaining outstanding on a restricted fund at the end of the year is carried forward as a balance on the fund, unless permission has been given by the funder to remove the restriction on the balance outstanding. Restricted funds will arise from grants and donations given to the charity for specific purposes.

2. Restricted funding

No restricted funding was received during the period.

3. Trustee payments, benefits and expenses

Total Fees of £24,000 were paid to Mr A Murray for speaking at events, running the Ministry School and providing admin services. Mr Murray also received reimbursement of travel expenses during the year to the total of $\pounds 2,572$.

Other than reimbursement for items purchased on behalf of the charlty, there were no further payments or benefits made to trustees during the accounting period.

4. Related Party payments

Mrs L Murray, the wife of Trustee A Murray, received payments amounting to $\pm 1,418$ for Website/marketing via her design consultancy Peanut Designs.

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
