FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The main objective of The Sporting Chance Clinic is to provide confidential access to therapeutic services for sportsmen and women seeking emotional support. This includes a residential service for addictive disorders treating individuals who present with alcoholism, drug dependency or compulsive gambling issues. This service combines a recognised model of treatment for addictions with an intense episode of psychotherapy and a physical wellbeing program.

The Sporting Chance Clinic also provides a pathway to a national network of counsellors and therapists for individuals presenting with other emotional and mental health issues as well as addictive disorders.

The Sporting Chance Clinic has an education department that offers seminars and workshops to participants in sport and stakeholders addressing emotional welfare issues,

Public Benefit

The Charity's ethos of a holistic recovery of mind, body and soul is achieved by providing treatment, support and mentoring for men and women from all standards of sport experiencing some form of addictive disorder, mental health or emotional wellbeing issue.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commissions's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The main areas of charitable activity are one-to-one counselling and therapy offered either through Sporting Chance Clinic's in-house team of therapists or via its national network of associates. All individuals providing these services have been vetted as appropriate and qualified by Sporting Chance Clinic. The charity also offers residential treatment for addictive disorders; the programme offers a twenty-six day episode of residential treatment. All clients who attend residential treatment are offered ongoing support through one-to-one counselling.

The charity provides educational seminars and workshops to professional sports clubs and sporting bodies across all age groups on topics of emotional well-being, lifestyle and addiction.

Outreach

The outreach work of the Charity is largely based on the premise of "attraction rather than promotion" and therefore do not actively seek clients through any adverts or media coverage. One of the principle aims of the Charity is to provide education, where individuals relay their own stories of addiction and allowing attendees of this seminar to identify with the actions and behaviours. Often as a result of these seminars we receive calls asking for support and help.

The charity works with professional clubs, stakeholders and associations to create pathways to support using the internal structures of these organisations.

Educational Seminars

The Sporting Chance Clinic Education Department offers a range of seminars and workshops that are tailored to the audience. The Charity holds contracts in football with The Premier League and League Football Education and in Rugby League with the Super League and Darts. We are currently endeavouring to expand the number of sports that are presented to.

Education seminars cover the main themes of the Charity's work covering topics such as drinking, use of substances, gambling and emotional well-being. Most seminars delivered include a high level of information appropriate to the age of the participants, a self-reflective process for the audience and a "Player's Story". The player's story is told by a retired or current sports person that has experienced issues discussed in the main presentation and has now found a solution.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees are satisfied with the performance and state of the Charity. Total funds increased by £144,888 (2017: £126,358) with the charity once again making a healthy surplus for the year. Total reserves at the end of the year were £522,047 (2017: £377,159). Total funds are represented by unrestricted funds. Strenuous efforts have been made to increase funding so that additional skills can be employed to broaden and deepen the scope of the work carried out. A major aim has been to create surpluses that allow a reserve to be created against future working capital requirements but also expand on the support and help provided to clients.

The Trustees regularly examine the Charity's requirements and the need to maintain a reserve to fund both expansion and any change to the timing and size of income. To date, the funds arising have only been sufficient to leave as a revenue reserve. If in the future an excess arises over and above the short term funding requirements the trustees will consider appropriating this to a separately designated fund.

Principal funding sources

The principle funding source for The Sporting Chance Clinic Charity is The Professional Footballers Association that provided annual core funding in 2018 of £400,000 (2017: £400,000). This includes an element of funding for their members and ex-members to be supplied with one to one therapy, mentoring and support, or residential rehabilitation treatment.

During the year the Football Association provided core funding of £125,000 (2017: £92,500) and the Rugby Football League provided core funding of £105,000 (2017: £105,000).

The Trustees considers the above core funding to represent unrestricted donations for use by the Charity in its charitable activities.

investment policy and objectives

Up until now there have been insufficient funds to allow for long term investment so surplus funds have been kept in a bank deposit account. The Trustees have discussed the level of reserves required and aim to have 6 months of operating costs be covered by the level of reserves and cash held.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Charity will continue to develop and expand relationships with existing stakeholders with a view to offering services to more individuals within the existing sports we serve. It will also offer existing services and structures to other sporting bodies with a view to increasing its breadth of funding bodies and sports worked with.

The education department will expand its product range to offer seminars that will serve staff members of clubs and sporting bodies. This will include themes that look after those individuals personal needs as well as increasing their ability to recognise issues and signpost sportsmen and women that they work with.

The Charity will offer advice and consultation to its existing stakeholders in developing the mental health agenda and strategies in said organisations and those which they serve.

1 Accounting policies

Charity Information

The Sporting Chance Clinic is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Belgrave House, 39 - 43 Monument Hill, Weybridge, Surrey, KT13 8RN.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the The Sporting Chance Clinic's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Sporting Chance Clinic is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of The Sporting Chance Clinic. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that The Sporting Chance Clinic has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the Charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. The Charity had no restricted funds at 31 December 2018 and 31 December 2017.

1.4 Incoming resources

All income is recognised when The Sporting Chance Clinic is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Donations are accounted for on a received for basis.

Legacles are recognised on receipt or otherwise if The Sporting Chance Clinic has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Core funding is accounted for on a receivables basis when the Charity has entitlement to the funds.

Interest on funds held is included when receivable.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is an obligation to make a payment to a third party. Expenditure has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Expenditure represents amounts invoiced, including irrecoverable value added tax which is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

1.6 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures and Fittings

25% on cost

Leasehold Improvements

10% on cost

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when The Sporting Chance Clinic is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.9 Retirement benefits

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities. Payments are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1.10 Leases

Rentals applicable under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against the income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over over the term of the relevant lease.

1.11 Taxation

The Charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.
