TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The trustees, who are also Directors for the purposes of the Companies Act, have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

. . .

To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of Erewash and the surrounding areas the provision of facilities, items and services to enable the public at large to engage in the creative arts and education in the arts and to do so in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life for the said inhabitants.

This is in accordance with the Charity's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, incorporated on 6th February 2010.

SUMMARY OF THE MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT IN RELATION TO THESE OBJECTS

To achieve this object we will provide:

- An open studio facility with regular opening hours, located in the Borough of Erewash, providing a safe and inviting environment with equipment and materials for a wide range of creative arts.
- Workshops with tuition from practicing artists, in our own studio or in community facilities elsewhere in the Borough of Erewash.
- An exhibition space for display of work by individual artists, groups and schools.
- Individual artist studio spaces for rent to practising artists.
- Work experience and volunteer opportunities for individuals to improve their confidence, assertiveness and communication skills.

In delivering these facilities we aim to benefit the following sections of the public:

- The general public (of all ages from children to senior citizens), without any restriction on previous artistic education or experience, both individually and through community organisations such as societies and schools.
- Artists, who wish to develop their skills through use of our facilities, and promote their work through exhibitions and workshops.
- Socially excluded groups and individuals, by providing an opportunity to participate more fully with society and improve self-esteem through creative activity.

Open studio sessions are open for anyone to drop-in at a small fee for a 3-hour session, or by monthly subscription. Workshops are priced to recover direct costs and contribute to overheads. Exhibitions are open to the public to view without charge. We work with caring and supporting organisations to obtain funding for participation by disadvantaged individuals.

The Trustees believe that in undertaking these activities they have taken due regard of the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission.

Achievements and Performance

The main achievements of the Charity for the year from 1 April 2018 to 31 March 2019 are as follows:

- 1. Our core community activity, the regular public drop-in open studio facility continues to be popular, with 5600 sessions attended in the year. We estimate that approximately 75% of these attendances are from disadvantaged groups within the general populous. Taking into account special events and hire of our spaces to other organisations, we estimate there have been approximately 8450 attendances to our facilities, the majority of which involve active participation in art or craft activities.
- 2. We organised creative activity workshops for children and young people during school holidays, and at two very successful Have a Go Days in April and October.
- 3. We continued to provide free craft sessions on Friday morning focusing on social inclusion, under the name of Feel Good Fridays. Funding for this came from our local Co-Op Community Fund. The sessions are provided totally free with the option to donate money towards materials where people are able. These have been popular drop in sessions and we have received many referrals from mental health specialists. All participants have fed back positive reports of improved mental wellbeing and feeling less isolated.
- 4. We also provided facilities for regular evening classes and day workshops in a wide range of media, including botanical drawing, ceramics, knitting, papercrafts, card making, collage, printing, felting, textiles, batik, machine embroidery, glass fusing, life drawing, stained glass, pastels, water colour painting, sewing, dressmaking and more. Regular users include the East Midland Polymer Art group and our local U3A (University of the Third Age) art groups.
- 5. In May we provided free room hire in conjunction with our local Dementia support group to host a free drop in day. The local community were invited to drop in throughout the day to decorate 'rocks' as part of dementia action week using forget me nots or in memory of someone who has been affected by dementia. The 'rocks were then hidden around the local area to be found during the dementia action week. This was hugely successful and much discussed in local pebble painting groups.
- 6. We attended a carers Event for Umbrella Derbyshire, providing two artists and a range of crafts activities at a reduced rate.
- 7. Provided crafts activities at our local Erewash Community Action event promoting Mental Health Awareness.

- 8. We provided kiln firing services for many local artists both amateur and professional and local creative groups and schools.
- 9. In November we held an Open Studios Events for our resident artists to showcase their own work, alongside a Christmas Craft Fair for visiting artists and designer makers to exhibit and sell their work.
- 10. During the year we maintained a high level of occupancy of our individual artist studio spaces that we rent to artists working in a wide range of media. The regular income that this provides is sufficient to cover all our overhead costs so that we are not dependent on grant income for day to day expenses.
- 11. Our financial position has allowed a modest increase in expenditure on staff. We now employ two staff on a job-share basis, and pay a monthly retainer to our manager who previously worked on an entirely voluntary basis.
- 12. The major capital expenditure of the year was renewal of the flat roof covering of the former office block building used for artist's studios. We were able to fund this from our financial reserve built up over recent years.
- 13. We received £500 from East Midlands Airport Community Fund towards creating a Garden Globe utilising free plans designed by IKEA to create a globe shaped wooden structure. We will then encourage our studio users to create small artworks to decorate the globe alongside plants. Visitors will be able to sit inside the globe, which will be a colourful and calming space. All the materials for this have been purchased but assembly has been delayed to ensure the location fits in with future building works.
- 14. Local Arts Erewash group meet every two months in various venues throughout Erewash for information and working meetings in the area. We provided free room hire for two of those meetings this year in support of local artists.
- 15. Over the year we raised over £5000 from fundraising activities during our Open Studio Events and Have a Go Days, and from sales of surplus fabric we received as donations from local businesses. We also received a substantial donation from money collected at the funeral of our former Chairman, Tony Pointer, who sadly passed away during the year. All of this, together with other donations and associated Gift Aid, is being earmarked for the next phase of renovations to our Victorian lace factory building to provide an additional room to focus on textile-related activities.
- 16. We continue to provide volunteering opportunities and mentoring for our volunteers, and mentoring support for artists with studio spaces here at the Art Room. We also supported one of our artists financially by commissioning artwork in lieu of rent, and another using funds we received from Health Educators Network, a local charity that was winding up its activities.

The reserves policy is to aim to maintain a cash reserve of a minimum of 3 months typical expenditure (currently £3000/month).

Long Eaton Art Room is based at 29-31 Lime Grove, Long Eaton, which is the company's registered office and the principal address of the charity. Long Eaton Art Room is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital (company registration No. 07148936) and Registered Charity (No. 1136196). The Charity's governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Trustee selection methods

The charity elects trustees at the Annual General Meeting. When the need arises, a skills audit to determine the requirements of the trustee body is carried out. People are approached to put themselves forward for election meet the skills required

Risk management policy

The trustees examine the major risks that the charity faces each financial year when preparing and updating the strategic plan. The charity has developed systems to monitor and control these risks to mitigate any impact that they may have on the charity in the future.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Company information

Long Eaton Art Room is a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital. The company's registered office is, 29-31 Lime Grove, Long Eaton. At the end of the year there were 5 Trustees, each of whom, under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, had undertaken to contribute the sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding up of the company.

1.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it apples from 1 January 2015. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in Sterling which is the functional currency of the company Monetary amounts in these financial statements to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared on historical cost convention apart from freehold property that is carried at market value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These are accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019 prepared in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 April 2015.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Gifts in kind have been included at market value of gifts received and in assets acquired. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs relating to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in the support of the charitable activities.

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling with section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

1.12 Depreciation

Individual fixed assets are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a reducing balance basis as follows:-
