

Elstree and Borehamwood Museum Annual Report April 2018 – March 2019





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Review of the Year

Apart from experiencing the hottest summer in 40 years, this year has also been dominated by all things Railway related. In January, the hugely successful *All Change!* exhibition, celebrating 150 years of the railway's arrival in Borehamwood, enticed visitors from far and wide. It was so popular, the exhibition was extended to run until the beginning of October. In addition, many associated events and activities were held throughout the year.



On Monday 13th July 1868, the new Elstree Station opened its doors for the first time. 150 years later, on Sunday 15th July 2018, First Impressions, who worked in partnership with the Museum on the All *Change!* exhibition, hosted a gala event at the railway station in honour of this prestigious anniversary. Representatives from the Town Council, Hertsmere Borough Council, Elstree Screen

Heritage, Elstree and Borehamwood Museum and Hertfordshire County Council gathered to celebrate with music from Borehamwood Brass, presentations and a cream tea at Allum Hall. As part of the celebrations, a brand new heritage plaque was unveiled.

Much of the year was also spent in preparation for application for Full Accreditation for the Museum. Ruth Stratton, the Heritage and Museums Officer and the Museum's official Mentor, worked closely with the volunteers to prepare the policies and plans required for the application. This culminated in a visit by an Accreditation Assessor in February 2019 who inspected the Museum and the way the collection was looked after and catalogued. She also went through the policies and strategies to ensure they met with the Accreditation standard. At time of writing, the Museum is awaiting the Accreditation Board's final decision.

Following an application to the Tesco Bags for Life scheme, the Museum was awarded £4k towards a new display case dedicated to Paul Welsh and his extensive personal film and television collection. The display will be a changing one, highlighting the film and television heritage of the area and showing off Paul's large range of interesting items. The case was installed in October to coincide with the opening of the Save Our Studios exhibition.



In May 2018, the new General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) came into force. The early part of the year was spent writing privacy policies and other documentation which complied with the new rules.

Volunteer Simon Gee continued to be prolific with managing the Blog, the website, merchandise stock and sales and writing and producing the Museum's Newsletter.

To this list he added setting up a Trip Advisor account. Simon worked with Dave and Ruth to select a new range of merchandise for sale and these goodies were given their own illuminated display case for maximum eye catching.

The Reminiscence group meetings continued to be a great success with a regular, steady group of attendees.

In October, the new website was launched. Immediately there was a spike in visitor numbers to the site. The Museum was also voted number one on Trip Advisor for things to do in Borehamwood.

On Friday 16th November 2018, the Museum celebrated its 5th birthday with a party at Schopwick House. Everyone toasted the museum with wine and cake and Manager Dave Armitage gave food for thought in the way of some statistics since the Museum opened in November 2013.

Exhibitions

All Change! 150 Years of Railways in Borehamwood

January – October 2018

One of the most ambitious projects to date came to fruition in January 2018 with the opening of this exhibition. Much work had been going on behind the scenes for a year in advance with applying for Heritage Lottery Funding, appointing an Exhibition Co-ordinator in the form of designer Mike Rollins and a whole host of celebratory events planned by Bob Redman from Elstree Screen Heritage. It was certainly a



memorable year and the exhibition was so successful, its run had to be extended by 3 months.

The Museum volunteers did a sterling job, as ever, in creating a replica steam carriage, complete with hooter, and building the set of an old station together with a waiting room. Visits by children to this exhibition were up by 43%.

Save Our Studios!

October 2018 - April 2019

In 1988, the long campaign to Save Elstree Studios, drew to a successful close. To commemorate this event, the Museum staged an exhibition looking at what might have been if Paul Welsh and his campaigners had not worked tirelessly to ensure the Studios were saved. This exhibition nicely introduced the new display case showing some of Paul's personal film and television heritage collection.



Events

There were two Model Railway Days held this year. The first, in April 2018

encouraged local enthusiasts to bring their own model railways and gave them the opportunity to set these up in the hall at 96 Shenley Road. Then in July, another day was organised between Bob Redman of Elstree Screen Heritage and Bushey Model Railway group. Both events were a huge success.



In May, Bob Redman again teamed up with John Cartledge, of Teddy's Trails fame, to run the New Railway Trail. This tour was repeated in August, due to popular demand.

Families Day was also railway themed on 30th June. This event was organised by



Helen Stamp. The Museum had two stalls this time, one of which displayed local railway enthusiast Tony Deswarte's amazing model of Elstree Station in 1900. Also hugely popular were the free steam train rides.

The Annual History Walk on Sunday 1st July was completed in a sweltering heat wave. Dave Armitage was joined by John Cartledge as they led a group of 26 around

north Borehamwood.

In January 2019, Helen Stamp organised a Museum stand at



the **All Saints Coffee Morning**. This event was held to show people in Elstree and Borehamwood the many activities, clubs and entertainments that are available to get involved with. The Museum's contribution was A Year in Photographs.

Learning and Outreach

It has been an extremely busy year for school visits.

March 2018 – St Teresa's Primary School

A class of Year 3 pupils came to see the All Change! Exhibition.

The children had fun involving a range of differing activities, from following a museum trail, dressing up as passengers and railway staff, to exploring local maps and making their own steam powered wind turbines.

"The children had a fantastic time", said Ms K Ayres, the Year 3 class teacher.

June 2018 Woodlands School

Twenty-eight Year 5 children participated in a number of activities including, map reading, and looking at the growth of Borehamwood since the coming of the railway.



November 2018 Monksmead School



This time in conjunction with the SOS exhibition, the Museum welcomed 27 pupils from Year One of Monksmead School. With the help of Dave and Helen, the pupils engaged in three activities. Firstly they looked at 'Traditional Toys', from before the Ipad and tablet era. Amongst these were the Diablo, the Yo-Yo and the Skipping Rope. Then the pupils dressed up as characters from *The Railway Children* film, which was

made in Elstree. They did this against the background of a scene from the film, giving them the impression of being in the film itself.

Finally the students worked with Dave, to create 'flip books'. These were the traditional way of making animated cells before the advent of CGI. Dave allowed them to handle 8mm film, and showed them how 'still' pictures become a movie.

All of our young visitors thoroughly enjoyed their day. A number of them reported it was the 'best morning ever'!

November 2018 Monksmead School visit 2

The second visit by Monksmead pupils, this time Year Two, following much the same programme as previously with an additional talk by new Learning Officer Matt Caro, who explained how old-fashioned toys entertained 'pre-tablet' generations of children!

February 2019 Hertsmere Jewish Primary School

Dave and Matt spoke to students at Hertsmere Jewish Primary School about changes in Elstree and Borehamwood over the past eighty years. The talk was well received and met with some challenging, but fascinating questions.

March 2019 Haberdashers' Aske's Boys School

The Museum was delighted to welcome twenty-four Year Twelve students from the local Haberdashers' Aske's Boys' School. The boys listened to an excellent presentation by Dave Armitage, Museum Manager, and then had the opportunity to interview some of our local residents about the changes that they have seen during their time in Elstree and Borehamwood.

March 2019 St Teresa's Primary School

The class of Year 3 pupils had chance to explore old fashioned toys and to make their own animated flip books.

March 2019 Yavneh College

Museum Manager Dave Armitage gave a presentation to a class of Yavneh College Sixth Formers. He explained the history of Elstree and Borehamwood since the 1930s and discussed social changes. The talk was well received and prompted some excellent questions from the students.

Thanks must be noted to Dave Armitage for all the hours of hard work he has put into creating the flip books and developing interesting presentations for the schools.

November 2018 Talk to Shenley Fellowship

Dave Armitage gave one of his fascinating talks to the Shenley Fellowship, focussing on The History of North West Borehamwood, Dave expanded on his themes in the recent History Walk to explain the particular details of this area.



Friends and Volunteers

The Friends group met in April for a 'sell-out' talk by retired engine driver Bill Davies entitled '**On and Off the Footplate**'. Bill had been a driver along the 'Bed-Pan' line and entertained with stories of Dr Beeching, adventures in King's Cross, the demise of steam, confusing the public, and the occasional near mishap. A fascinating insight into life behind the driver's handle, accompanied by many photos for train lovers, and many amusing anecdotes. The group was then treated to a quiz by Tevi Corman based around films and trains, right back to 1903!



In August , the Friends of the Museum gathered for a tour of **Haberdashers' Aske's Boys' School** in Aldenham. The Friends split into three groups and were taken through the original house, the home of Lord Aldenham, and out to see the original courtyards, the old BBC building – so called because the BBC had requisitioned the house in the war – and then back via the splendid new Medburn

Centre for sports, and the large library and hall, followed by tea and cake.

December's Friends talk was an evening with **Paul Welsh**, in conjunction with the Save Our Studios exhibition. Paul recounted fascinating stories of how the campaign started and of all the stars he had met over the years.



In March 2019, the Friends were treated to a talk by **John Schooneraad** who worked for many years in the film industry creating body parts for special effects. John

related how he began work at Elstree Studios 40 years ago creating 'lifecasts' – or casts of limbs to be used in stunts. John brought a 'new born baby', which he had created with silicon, to pass around the group.

Volunteer meetings

These were held on six occasions during the year and gave the volunteers a chance to ask questions about museum operations and inform them of forthcoming events. As well as this it was a chance to celebrate the achievements carried out during the preceding two months. The total volunteer hours for the period covered by this report amount to: 4,610, a considerable amount for such a small museum

Visitors

This year saw the arrival of our 20,000th visitor

Total visitor figures for the period covered by this report are: 2,596

In addition, total outreach figures for the period are: 1,050

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, and with the Charities Act 2011.

Recognition of income

Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, it is more likely than not the trustees will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions received in the nature of a gift are recognised in Donations. Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income from charitable activities.

Income from interest

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Stocks

Goods provided as part of a charitable activity are measured at net realisable value based on the service potential provided by items of stock.

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date
