REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 MAY 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 May 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity according to the Memorandum of Association are as follows:

- 1) To promote community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities for the playing of association football and other sports capable of improving health.
- 2) To provide and assist in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving conditions of life.
- 3) To advance the education of children and young people through such means as the trustees think fit in accordance with the law of the charity.

The charity seeks to achieve these objectives and provide public benefit by providing football coaching courses and events, and by working closely with local schools in the provision of after school and holiday club facilities at a cost which renders them accessible to the local community.

At Luton Town Football Club Community Trust the welfare and safety of our children is paramount. Luton Town Football Club Community Trust have a duty of care to safeguard all children involved in any activity provided by the Trust from harm and to achieve this through adherence to The Football Association's Safeguarding Children Policy and Procedure guidelines adopted by the Trust.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when setting their policies for the year in line with the charity's aims and objectives.

Public benefit

The charity is a public benefit entity.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

2018-19 proved to be another positive year of growth for the charity with increased turnover producing a cash surplus for the year. During this period the charity continued to invest in staff and run both football development, educational and community football courses, whilst still seeking new sources of income. The Trust also continues to deliver numerous social cohesion and inclusion projects locally.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 MAY 2019

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Activities and Achievements

The Trust continued to grow in terms of the number of employees both full-time, part-time, apprenticeships and volunteers maintaining on average over 3,500 individual engagements each week on all projects.

The Football Club gained a further promotion the EFL Championship affording the Trust added security in securing additional areas of funding and the opportunity to become involved in national programmes run by both the English Football League Trust (EFLT) and Professional Footballers Association (PFA) as well as the Premier League Charitable Fund PLCF).

The coaching and development centres continued to offer increased opportunities for young grass root footballers with the total number of recruited boys training at least once a week with the Club has now reaching over 550. In addition, 420 boys attended the annual residential week at Stowe School during Easter and an additional 320 went on overseas tours to Holland and Belgium. The Trust also continued to run a comprehensive games programme during school holidays against other local professional clubs. The football activities produced 16 boys who signed full-time into the Clubs schoolboy academy.

The number of after-school and evening skills training centres were maintained at just under 30 running on a weekly basis for children aged 4 to 13 but provided up to 700 spaces. The increased effects of economic austerity particularly on lower income household incomes meant no new school holiday centres added to the 12 existing venues throughout the county with provision for 300 spaces each half-term school holiday. The Trust continues to offer all paid for weekly activities at extremely competitive prices locally to ensure participation levels are maintained and access for low income households is possible. Some after school club activities in the more socially deprived parts of Luton continue to operate on a pay and play system of £1.00 per session.

The Trust's Free School Visit project, supported by easyjet, which provides free curriculum time PE lessons and football coaching to all schools in Luton and Bedfordshire enjoyed continued expansion as a result of continued funding from the PLCF Primary Stars programme. Overall, in the last financial year over 2,350 hours of free PE and school sport coaching reaching approximately 4,500 individual school children was delivered to schools by the Trust. The Trust continues to increase the support and development of PE delivery staff in school to enhance delivery and 20 school staff completed the PE staff mentoring programme.

The Trust also continued to deliver projects through the Primary Stars programme including literacy and numeracy double sports clubs to schools as well as mentoring programmes for pupils at risk of exclusion from full time education. The demand for these project remains strong amongst local primary schools.

As part of the Trust's commitment to continual professional development 3 additional members of staff completed the L2 NVQ Multi Sports Certificate and a further 2 completed their FA Level 3 Coaching Certificates and 2 apprentices completed their FA Level 1 Coaching Certificate and L2 Activity Leadership Certificate. In addition, 2 members of staff completed their L2 NVQ Youth Work module to assist with our cohesion offer.

The Trust again received additional funding from the PLCF to support female football development which seeks to increase participation among women and girls in the national game and during the year all high schools in Luton and Central Bedfordshire benefitted from free coaching reaching over 300 new female participants. The trust continues to run a Girls Player Development centre to enable pathways into the senior Ladies teams.

The Trust also continued to partner with Luton Borough Council to support adult disability football in Luton and now regularly coaches and manages 3 teams. In addition, the Trust continued to receive funding from the EFLT and Wembley National Stadium Trust to deliver sports activities to adults and children with disabilities. The Trust continues to visit the majority of special educational schools in Luton and Bedfordshire each week to deliver sports activities and runs several weekly adult sports sessions. Overall, in excess of 200 participants benefit from these projects each week and the Trust envisages continued demand for its' activities in this area.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Activities and Achievements

The Trust continues to receive funding from the PLCF to run 4 weekly community cohesion projects for young men defined as 'hard to reach' or 'disengaged' as part of the national PL KICKS project and included a tournament at the Club's main stadium for over 200 participants and games against various other professional club KICKS projects. The trust was also able to use PLCF KICKS funding to secure match funding from the European Social Fund via the local SEMLEP programme of Community Led Local Development in association with Luton Borough Council. The 4 year project has significantly increased the Trusts work in the areas of community cohesion and working with young disengaged young men aged 16-24 in particular with a further 10 weekly centres running in Luton offering a wider selection of sports, workshops and educational opportunities to over 300 young people aged 15-24.

The Trust's established two weekly activities for over 50's continued to prove popular with a weekly walking football centre in Luton and a Social Club at the stadium to help combat social isolation. Both activities are registered with Luton Borough Council's social prescription project. In addition, the Trust successfully partnered with LiveWell Luton to offer a football weight loss/health programme MANVFAT for over 60 participants and the Trust also held the EFLT Eastern Region walking football tournament which was attended by 12 other professional clubs.

A major project this year was funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and brought then Football Club's 135 year history into local classrooms as part of schools curriculms reaching over 300 primary school children. The project also developed 'reminiscence' resources for older supporters and also collected many oral memories for future use.

The Trust also organised the annual 'Hatters Cup' football tournament for over 1,500 young players at the Club's main stadium as part of the annual community week-end event at the stadium which overall attracted over 5,000 participants and spectators and this year was spread over 6 days and included a separate competition for over 50 of Bedfordshire's Beavers and Cubs Packs. In addition, the Trust organised regional competitions in the Girls Cup and Kids Cup on behalf of EFLT for over 40 local schools.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The charity made a surplus of £71,462 as at the year ended 31 May 2019 (2018: £5,892). The funds held by the charity as at the year ended 31 May 2019 are stated under reserves policy.

Principal funding sources

The charity is principally funded from coaching income, supplemented by grants and donations.

Reserves policy

The trustees review the reserves policy on a regular basis to ensure that reserves are maintained at a level that is consistent with the charity having sufficient funds to operate at its planned activity levels taking into account the various financial risk factors that have been identified.

It is intended that the charity will currently operate with reserves at a level that equates to the total of three months operating costs and a contingency fund has been set up to build towards this purpose. The balances in unrestricted funds and the restricted funds as at the year ended 31 May 2019 are £171,374 and £70,354 respectively (2018: £149,806 and £20,460).

Going concern

No material uncertainties exist.

FUTURE PLANS

Future plans include maintaining the number of pay & play coaching centres accessible to low income families, increased provision of our social cohesion and targeted integration projects targeted at specific groups, as well as continued expansion of school education and sports activities and football competitions.

The Trust will continue to raise its' profile within the local community through increased use of social media including a bi-monthly electronic newsletter and promotion of its' own dedicated website.

The Trust will continue to seek and secure funding and grant opportunities to fulfil its aim of providing inclusive sports activities at affordable prices to the local community, provide educational courses to help young people and unemployed adults to increase employment opportunity and to provide activities to both children and adults that have a positive impact on both health and community cohesion.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 7th January 2008 and registered as a charity on 5 March 2008. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10. This liability remains for one year after ceasing to be a member in respect of debts incurred whilst a member.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Trustees are responsible for the identification of potential new trustees and their subsequent nomination for appointment. They seek to ensure that the Board has representation from a broad range of interests and skills.

Organisational structure

The board of Trustees shall, according to the Articles of Association, be not less than three but shall not be subject to any maximum.

The Board meets quarterly on a formal basis, and has additional ad hoc meetings frequently to discuss specific areas for development and support. The day to day organisation and management is controlled through the manager Kevin Thoburn who calls on trustees for support as required. Formal agendas, papers and reports are supplied to trustees in a timely manner prior to meetings. Full minutes of all formal meetings are produced and circulated to trustees.

Induction and training of new trustees

The induction process for any newly appointed Trustee comprises of an initial meeting with the Board of Trustees for an understanding of the work of the Charity and the responsibilities of the Trustees. Each trustee is given a copy of the Charity Commission's guidance "The Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know".

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Trust is confident that major risks to which it may be exposed, as identified by the Trustees, have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 MAY 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Information for the period ended 31 May 2018 relate to a 14 month period and as a result will not be directly comparable with prior periods.

The presentational currency is pound sterling.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities

Charitable activities comprise the direct costs of providing education and coaching facilities to children and other groups, whether as part of the football development programme or community football programme, plus related support costs.

Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the Charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to the independent examination of the Charity and accountancy charges.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Overhead and support costs have been allocated between charitable activities based on an estimate of time spent or usage by the activity to which they relate. The allocation is analysed in the notes to the accounts.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Motor vehicles

- 25% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 33% on reducing balance

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Value added tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Premier League funding supports three projects, Primary Stars, girls football and KICKS cohesion projects.

Luton Youth Community & Laureus Sport

This income provides support for cohesion and integration projects for boys from Marsh Farm, Farley Hill and Lewsey Farm which forms an important part of our social projects on these estates.

Sport England

To support the qualification of 300 young primary school children as young sports leaders.

Luton Adult Learning

Luton Adult Learning are helping find and train 36 new community coaches to deliver our projects with two courses for both men and women.

StreetGames UK

The StreetGames restricted fund income is used in relation to the "Provision of Football" for young persons who are Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET).

The Princes Trust

The Princes Trust restricted fund income relates to the provision of the "Get Started Program" aiming to give students an NVQ coaching qualification.

Transfers between funds

A transfer was made from the unrestricted fund to the contingency fund in line with the reserves policy.
