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OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES OF THE CHARITY

OBJECTIVES & AIMS

Objects of the charity as stated in its declaration of Trust:

- The advancement of the Christian faith and the worship of God.
- The preaching and proclamation of the Christian Gospel.
- · The teaching of Christian doctrine and principles.
- · The pastoral care of Christian people.
- The printing and distribution of the Bible and Christian literature.
- · The relief of persons who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress, or who are aged or sick.
- The advancement of education on the basis of Christian principles.
- · Working closely with other Christian organisations.

These policies have remained unchanged since the last annual report of the Trustees.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The policies adopted to further the objects of the Charity for public benefit in accordance with section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties are:

- Conducting meetings
- Running community projects including a playgroup
- Organising activities and groups
- Raising money for overseas missions
- Working closely with other Christian organisations

These policies have remained unchanged since the last annual report of the Trustees.

VOLUNTEERS

The leadership and trustees recognise that the time, finance and skills given willingly by volunteers enable much of what the Fellowship aims to do to be effectively achieved and are very grateful for this generosity.

ACHIEVEMENT & PERFORMANCE

IN- HOUSE PROVISION

Teaching and training

Throughout the year our commitment to the teaching and discipling of the church members was maintained through formal and informal meetings including Sunday morning celebrations, mid-week meetings in members' homes, visiting speakers and seminars, conferences, and through children's and youth ministry.

Pastoral Care

The **Pastoral Oversight Team**, led by two of the leadership team, has continued to take responsibility for the provision of pastoral care throughout the Church.

Parenting courses, open to members of the church and the wider community, ran for **Parenting Children** aged birth -10 years and **Parenting Teenagers** aged 11-18 years.

Ministry groups

The fellowship operates ministry groups designed for members to develop their gifts and facilitate serving others in the church and local community. These cover pastoral work, worship, prophecy, healing, bible study, men's & ladies' groups, training for leadership and the Potting Shed: an informal setting for anyone with questions about the Christian faith.

Children's Work

PowerZone has continued to provide teaching and activities on Sundays for up to 30 children each week. About 60 local children took part in a holiday club in the first week of the school summer holidays.

Youth work

Our youth team, headed up by our Youth & Community Worker, enable young people to participate in varied activities through the year including mid-week youth cells, Ignite youth club, 5 aside football and Blaze youth events.

During 2018 groups of young people were taken to **Solid**, a Christian camping festival weekend at Stubbers Activity Centre in Upminster.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Daisy-Chain' Playgroup

The preschool had a successful year; meeting educational and social needs in a deprived area. During 2018 we continued our extended provision being available 32 hours a week. Sessions were full from the beginning of the academic year in September 2018. The Local Authority Early Years Team continue to provide updates and training, and the last Ofsted Inspection in February 2017 received a 'Good' overall assessment. Forty-two children attended Daisy-Chain and numbers continue to grow.

Community Café

This 'not for profit' enterprise is open from 9am till 2pm Monday to Friday providing drinks, meals and a listening ear to the local community. Natter Chatter Tables have proved popular, inviting strangers to table share and talk. The Café also provide hospitality to other groups visiting the Plaza Centre.

During the year we have provided work experience opportunities and training for those with additional learning needs between 18-25 years and a reintroduction to working life for more mature adults looking to return to a work environment.

The Plaza Café continues to be a 'safe place' when the more vulnerable feel comfortable to visit and spend time with friends and carers.

ACHIEVEMENT & PERFORMANCE

SERVING THE COMMUNITY (contd.)

Tots+

The ever-popular Tots+ club, run entirely by volunteer staff, provides a safe environment for pre-schoolers and their carers. The relaxed environment is a haven one morning a week (during term time) particularly for new parents struggling to get out or simply looking for friendships or support

Sozo / Healing of The Heart

Our team offer a safe environment to explore life's emotional hurts, challenges and wounds. There has been a growing interest in **Sozo** Appointments and although provided for free, donations of £695 were received in the year allowing £208.50 to be spent on further training in this ministry.

The Isaiah Project (Reg Charity no 1156428)

The Isaiah Project is a compassion based ministry which aims to assist the marginalised and who feel unable to move their life forward without help. It can offer support in a number of practical ways including housing, budgeting and befriending. At the end of 2018, 35 people including 27 children were being housed, with each adult receiving 2 hours per week support from a befriender. The Project trustees and most of the senior management and befrienders are members of the fellowship. They are supported by a large number of volunteers from the local community and operate 5 charity shops.

INTER-CHURCH COOPERATION

In pursuit of its aim of encouraging unity among churches and Christian charities, church leaders and members of the congregation have been active in promoting and attending numerous inter-church events, and areas of service to the community which included:

The Southend Foodbank (Reg Charity no 1163160)

Our Youth & Community worker and a number of volunteers from the Fellowship serve the foodbank in various roles on a weekly basis. One of the SCF senior leaders is a trustee of this charity along with representatives from a number of churches across the Borough. The foodbank continues to work in conjunction with the Trussell Trust.

Street Pastors

Street Pastors serve the night-time community in Southend. By interacting with the clubbers they are able to identify and assist the vulnerable. They often enable people to get home safely or to seek medical assistance. Street Pastors liaise closely with our local police and Southend's other church/council cooperative schemes. Three members serve as Street Pastors whilst nine others act as support prayer partners.

Blaze

Blaze events have continued to prove popular amongst the Youth and are attended by up to 80 young people from churches and youth groups across South East Essex. They are facilitated by a group of 8 -10 youth workers from local congregations. Activities include games, worship, a talk & prayer ministry.

Healing Rooms/Plaza Healing Centre

For many years the Fellowship worked with other local churches to provide opportunity for confidential healing prayer for any member of the community irrespective of their faith background. In 2018 this ministry came to a close, but Southend Christian Fellowship still continues to offer hope and ministry to the sick through Plaza Healing Centre.

Love Southend

Southend Christian Fellowship are widely involved in the activities of Love Southend providing sponsorship and volunteers for many and varied programmes.

Southend CAP (Christians Against Poverty). This is an effective debt advice team who are not only able to help clients escape debt, but also provide practical assistance on budgeting and building a stable financial future. A number of members volunteer their time and skills in partnership with CAP.

ACHIEVEMENT & PERFORMANCE

THE BOROUGH AND REGION

Our leaders meet regularly with other church leaders, collaborating in serving Southend, SE Essex and beyond and are part of the Southend Inter-faith Working Group, a communication channel between the Borough Council and faith communities. Over the last couple of years we have help shape a new relational grouping of Churches that together are looking to partner with others to help transform Essex with the love of God. This grouping "Transforming Essex" involved churches from across the county coming together with a common heart to love and serve our county.

OVERSEAS SUPPORT

Russia:

The pastor of Jesus is Lord Church, Kingisepp his wife and an interpreter visited Southend Christian Fellowship for the first time in February 2018. This was followed by a team visit from the Fellowship to Kingisepp. A small of three; a builder, a painter and a lab technician, went to carry out practical work on the Jesus is Lord Church building in April 18. The relationship between the two churches continues to develop and provide in important form of monthly financial support. A total of £2,312.44 was spent supporting the work in Russia. Additionally the cost to the fellowship for the Russian to visit was £695.06 and the team trip was £2,261.58.

Africa:

In early Spring a small team travelled to Nyendo Full Gospel Church (NFGC) in Masaka, Uganda to teach a School of Ministries module. In June the same year a much larger group travelled to Masaka to carry out practical work which included construction work.

£3,727.42 was spent supporting the work in Africa, which included the provision of schooling and medical training and £600 for the School of Ministries teaching programme. The cost of the two trips was an additional £2,341.58 and £10,006.50 respectively.

India:

The connections remain strong with the church and leadership in the Mumbai church and the leaders of Covenant Blessings Church and although no trips to India took place in 2018 the senior leadership were able to connect in the UK and the USA. We were able to continue our financial support for various projects. £15,389.03 was spent in total in support for the church in India, including £600 sent for the School of Ministries teaching programme.

EXTERNAL HIRE OF THE PLAZA CENTRE FACILITIES

The Trustees allow other organisations to hire the facilities providing the activity does not conflict with the ethos of the Fellowship. These include events, mainly musical, presented by the local Borough Arts Council. This policy has helped to promote high-quality entertainment for the community and has been extremely well received. Voluntary stewards from the Fellowship are responsible for Health and Safety requirements and provide refreshments for a charge.

Other groups hire the Main Hall or Small Hall for activities such as fitness and craft groups. We continue to accommodate services to the community provided by other agencies, including a toe nail cutting session for the elderly: We also continue to host regular meetings of the Southend Homeless Action Network which brings together the Council and a wide variety of voluntary agencies that engage with the needs of the homeless in the Borough.

The hiring policy has contributed £23,076.40 to the Trust's income. It is not however the policy of the Trustees to promote the hire of the building as a commercial profit-making enterprise, but to further its use as a resource to the local community and help to defray the costs of the Trust's property.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE PLAZA CENTRE FACILITIES

Having installed a passenger lift the previous year, giving access to the upstairs conference room, offices and meeting room to those with impaired mobility, work commenced on the reconfiguring of the upstairs conference room. A corridor and side room were created and the main conference room was decorated and carpeted. Construction and redevelopment are ongoing with the hope that wheelchair accessible toilets can be installed next year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The charity relies on voluntary donations from its members for its income. The Charity does not employ professional fund raising bodies

Investment policy and objectives

The charity has adopted a policy of investing in a low risk, high return investment account with COIF. **Reserves policy**

The trustees believe that it would be prudent to have as a reserve a minimum of £30,000 readily available to cover unforeseen eventualities. (£30,000 is approximately one month's unrestricted income/outgoings). Bank balances are reviewed daily and for the past several years a minimum daily balance of at least £30,000 has been maintained.

Discussions internally within the charity, and externally, lead the trustees to believe that sufficient funds equivalent to the reserve figure identified could be made available, if required, on a timely basis by way of loan finance.

FUTURE PLANS

Spiritual Growth

Having developed the six key values, which are set out at the beginning of this report, the leaders are looking to see them established across all areas of the life of the Fellowship. Training the members of the Fellowship to continually experience the presence of God will remain a priority as we look to see growth in their understanding and application of the Bible to their lives.

Training and Development

Training and development opportunities will continue to be promoted in 2019, ranging from marriage and parenting courses, safeguarding, worship development, discipleship and leadership development courses.

Building Development

Upgrading the structure and facilities of the Plaza Centre, and raising funds to undertake this work, remain important commitments of the Trust. It is anticipated that in 2019 this will include the redevelopment of the first floor offices and meeting rooms and the installation of upstairs accessible toilet facilities. The viability and cost of a ventilation system for the first floor conference room will also be explored.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust which is dated 5 October 1984 and amended by resolution on the 14 October 1992, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

The Fellowship's activities are overseen by the leadership team (eldership.) The trustees meet at least bimonthly to review strategy, performance, operating plans, budgets and building matters.

Risk management

The trustees have considered the key operational, financial, and strategic risks that have a bearing on the charity. Suitable management information is available to the trustees on a regular basis to monitor these risks, and allow any mitigating action to be taken to address them.

Leadership Team (Elders)

Christine Burgess, Peter Burgess, Anita Churchward, Mark Churchward, Colin Cooper. In October 2018 Nicola Goddard and Lindsey Nelson were added to the leadership Team.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 2% on cost
Plant and machinery - 20% on cost
Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost
Motor vehicles - 25% on cost
Computer equipment - 20% on cost

Freehold property is stated at market value, and is revalued by a suitably qualified person at least every five years.

Assets are capitalised where they can be used for more than one year and cost over £ 250.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are measured at fair value / amortised cost with movements recognised through statement of financial activities.

MAIN FUNDS

Included in general funds are £ 12,859 of designated funds b/fwd and c/fwd as at 31 December 2017.

Unrestricted savings is a designated fund for the purposes of financing building work, ministry activity and administrative support.

Overseas missions funds (Africa, India, Russia, general and mission) represent income received and spent on mission work in various countries overseas.

Foyer development and Isaiah project represent income received and expensed in helping the community. Note 15 has further details on Isaiah project following the year end.

Re-directed giving and Indian Pastoral Support represent donations given for a specific beneficiary or purpose, which are then passed onto the beneficiary or used in such a way as to fulfil its purpose in accordance with the wishes of the donors.

Playgroup and cafe are projects which are run from the Plaza Centre for the benefit of the local community in Southend.

Ministry support is the funding of costs of Churchward partnership services.

Nightshelter represents funds for the purposes of running winter nightshelter.

Christmas Meals are provided to vulnerable and lonely local residents.

Open plaza is funding for open plaza events.

Team trips - income is used to fund trips abroad for overseas mission work.

Indian pastoral support - Basil D'Souza - spiritual advisor for the leadership team.

Peter Stott - spiritual advisor for the leadership team.

16. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Upto 31 December 2014, the charity was acting as guarantor for 18 of its Isaiah Project tenants. On the 1st January 2015, the Isaiah project separated from the charity and all funds accumulated upto 31 December 2014 were transferred. however since 1 January 2015, the charity has been receiving income and incurring expenses on behalf of the project and these are disclosed within debtors. Also the fellowship are guarantors on the commercial leases transferred upto their expiry date.
