#### Structure, governance and management

#### Governing document

Community Albums is a company Limited by guarantee and is a registered charity. The company was incorporated on 1st November 2010.

#### Governance and management

Community Albums is led by a team of trustees who are responsible for all required duties of the charity, including legal compliance, finances, human resources and any property requirements.

#### Risk management

Appropriate steps have been taken to ensure that all necessary DBS checks are made on those with any paid or volunteer responsibilities, where they might be required. All required insurance cover is in place. An ongoing review of the other major risks to which the charity could be exposed is being undertaken and systems are implemented to mitigate those risks where possible. Both the risks and systems will be regularly reviewed.

#### Objectives and activities

Community Albums has a vision to see communities all over the world using music and media, giving them a voice and building relationships with each other through collaboration. Using music and media technology we aim to encourage networks of communities across developed and developing countries to share opinions and collaborate together on shared objectives, enabling them to explore their creative potential and to inspire, influence and bring about positive change.

Community Albums aims for people's voice to be heard. Through our programmes, participants explore the messages they would like their audience to hear. From which we aim to create positive change not only in their lives but across communities.

#### Achievements and performance

Community Albums, starting in February 2011, has now completed eight financial years. This report reflects the last 12 months and shows the ongoing development of our programmes.

We started a partnership with the National Citizenship Service. Over the summer, a series of workshops with young people commenced. NCS have the vision of 'bringing our country together by building stronger, more integrated communities and fostering understanding between young people from different communities'. We worked with 780 young people from diverse backgrounds to explore how they could use music and media for unity. The results were very exciting!

In November 2018, we marked 100 years since the signing of the Armistice in 1918 by leading an exhibition on peacebuilding in central London. 'Choose peace' aimed to commemorate, celebrate and continue peace. We brought together seven peacebuilding organisations to highlight peace achievement in recent years, highlighting why work towards peace is still needed and encouraging more people to 'Choose Peace' in their lives. Photographs and films were shown, including 100 people from 100 countries saying what peace meant to them. Fitting in with our key strategic theme of 'building peace', the work was also promoted on social media.

Our international work also saw us work with our partners Viva and The Children at Risk Action Network (CRANE) in Kampala, Uganda, in March 2019. We were able to give specific support in song writing to their Music Producer, who is creating high quality pieces of music that gain national television and radio coverage and contain positive messages from the children at risk involved with the project. Our UK work reflects a diverse range of support given to many people who need to feel the inspirational hope and encouragement that music can bring. As reported last year, we've continued to work with JR Hospital's children's ward in Oxford to support young children who are fighting serious illness. Community projects in The Hub, Banbury, The Hill Community Choir and Banbury Housing Youth Project (BHYP) all continue. These projects have supported work that is combatting the affects of homelessness and mental health difficulties.

Lastly, we've launched a new strategic plan with key focus areas in 'building hope', 'building peace' and 'building empowered lives' — with the continued overall aim of 'building better communities through music and media'. This strategic direction, alongside the hard work of the team, has resulted in an exciting momentum as we close this financial year. We are encouraged that we are financially growing, but also that we have growing support from partner organisations and individuals who have shown their commitment to sharing our vision.

We look forward with excitement and great anticipation for what 2019/2020 holds.

#### Financial review

Income has continued to generate a surplus. It is intended that this increase will continue, enabling a greater impact in the future.

#### Investment policy

The charity has no need for a specific investment policy at this time, however the trustees will keep this under review, should surplus funds become available.

#### Reserves policy

The trustees have agreed that a 3 month working capital reserve is suitable. There are sufficient funds to cover this.

#### Plans for future periods

The charity aims to continue the development of partnerships locally and nationally in the UK, to continue to give people a voice and build better communities through music and media. Community Albums will continue to develop partnerships, working alongside agencies seeking to bring about peace, justice and sustainable livelihoods by seeking to bring about local and national policy change to enhance the safety and well-being of individuals and communities. Much of the focus of the next year will be strengthening work in Uganda – both in continuing work with CRANE and Viva in Kampala, and extending our reach to a new partnership with the Salesians in eastern Uganda. In the UK, our main focus continues to lie in Oxfordshire and we cannot wait for a new community centre in Banbury to open in September – complete with a music and media studio. We have exciting plans to support organisations addressing knife crime and gang cultures in London.

In regards to the charity's management, we continue to employ an Operations Manager and last year appointed a CEO. Together they work with project staff and volunteers to ensure both the daily management of finances, plans and reports are delivered alongside scoping and planning for the future. Within the last six months of the financial year, they were able to support the team in fundraising over £70,000 (some listed in these accounts, some donated after the financial year end) as well as continuing to meet targets within governance, human resource, safeguarding and accountability. Community Albums is in a strong place because of this.

#### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Rockliffe, 112 Halse Road, Nothants, NN13 6EG.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
  activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
  support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
  activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### **Financial instruments**

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument. Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

#### 4. Limited by guarantee

The company is Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital.
