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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

Objectives and activities

The objects are to advance the Orthodox Christian Faith in accordance with the principles of church government accepted by the Deanery in Great Britain and Ireland.

The Orthodox Christian Faith is defined by the governing document to mean the faith of the One Holy Orthodox-Catholic and Apostolic Church, rooted in the Holy Tradition, and taught by the Holy Scriptures, the Seven Ecumenical Councils and the Local and Provincial Councils, and by the Holy Fathers, and as preserved and taught by the Churches of the four ancient patriarchates of Constantinople, Jerusalem, Antioch and Alexandria, and by the Churches now in communion with any or all of them.

The "principles of church government" are set out in the Statutes of the Deanery, which themselves accord with the Statutes of the Archdiocese of Orthodox Parishes of Russian Tradition in Western Europe – Exarchate of the Ecumenical Patriarchate. These principles enshrine the decisions of the Council of Moscow of 1917-18. The Statutes provide a formal structure for the presbytery, and for the Clergy/Laity Meeting and the Deanery Executive.

The status of Exarchate was withdrawn by a decision of the Holy Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate on 27 November 2018, with proposals for a new organisation. Since then the Archdiocese has been going through various processes of consultation and decision making, in accordance with the laws of the countries where it has a presence, with a view to reaching an appropriate re-organisation.

The Deanery is a group of parishes within the Archdiocese of Western Europe, with the same status as the other twelve deaneries of the Archdiocese.

The Deanery is committed to developing a locally-based Orthodox Church which is open to all who wish to come and learn more about the Orthodox Christian Faith, without regard to nationality, language, racial or cultural background. The Deanery is strongly committed to the view, expressed by the late Metropolitan Anthony of Sourozh, of blessed memory (1914-2003), that the Orthodox Faith must be rooted in the culture of the place where its people live. Accordingly, the communities of the Deanery now use English as the principal language of liturgical prayer.

Members of the Deanery work, wherever possible, with other Christian groups and seek to develop good relationships with representatives of other faiths and, indeed, with those who do not profess any religious faith, in a spirit of tolerance and peace whilst holding firm to the fullness of the Orthodox Faith they have received as their inheritance.

The Deanery is likely to play a more significant role in wider society than the number of its Parishes and Eucharistic Communities would suggest, precisely because its members are fully incorporated with the local community, and do not see themselves as representing a foreign faith.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake and in particular the specific guidance for charities for the advancement of religion.

Achievements and performance

Parishes and Communities

There are now eleven Parishes and seven Eucharistic Communities. In addition there are a few small monastic houses, known as *sketes* in the Orthodox tradition, where members of the Deanery carry on a more or less secluded life of prayer, and places where occasional services take place. Some parishes are now twinned with parishes from other deaneries in Western Europe, and children's exchanges have taken place on an informal basis.

Pastoral Care and Oversight

For the year 2018 the Deanery was under the pastoral care of His Eminence Archbishop John of Charioupolis, who is also Patriarchal Exarch. He led one of the residential clergy meetings but was unable to attend the meeting in January 2018. He visited the parishes in Northampton and in London (Clapham). He was able to attend and take a full part in the Annual Conference and Festival from 25th to 28th May 2018. He chaired the Clergy/Laity Meeting held in November, which followed directly after the meeting of monastics and the second clergy meeting.

Ordinations and Clergy Formation

The clergy continue to hold regular meetings twice a year, to develop their theological knowledge and pastoral work. On the Sunday after the Clergy/Laity Meeting in November there was an Episcopal Liturgy at London (Clapham) during which Deacon Stefan Strekopytov was ordained priest to serve in that parish.

Youth Work

The main work in our Deanery with youth is the annual children's summer camp.

The summer camps, which are held every year – now in their forty fifth year, have for the past fifteen years been held in a field belonging to the Beale family, not far from the small town of Crickhowell in the foothills of the Brecon Beacons in Powys, Wales. Last year, 2018, was no exception. During the last week in July and the first week in August, just over thirty children spent two weeks in the camp. To look after them there was a team of six leaders, together with eight adult helpers.

A daily programme included morning and evening prayers as well as the celebration of the Divine Liturgy for the Feast of the Transfiguration, regular religious instruction and a variety of craft and sports. Major events were the Olympics Day, entertainment and camp fires, a Theme Day (Creation, a Celebration of Life) and a long hike.

Financially the camp is self-sufficient. Even though the fees are very low, no child is unable to attend due to financial difficulties and only a very few bursaries were needed in 2018. The person responsible for the running of the children's camp, appointed by the Archbishop, is Archpriest Alexander Fostiropoulos, the rector of the parish of St Peter and St Paul in London, assisted by Alexis Martinowsky, Naomi Schubert and Patricia Fostiropoulos.

Annual Conference and Festival

The Annual Conference and Festival continues to be held at the High Leigh Conference Centre in Hoddesdon, Hertforshire this year from 25th to 28th May 2018. There was a good attendance of children with an exciting and imaginative programme provided for them, and a good attendance by adults. Bursaries were available to help all who needed financial assistance; again the children under sixteen years old were given a subsidised rate of £50; and there was no charge for young children.

The theme of the Conference was "In peace, let us pray: our encounter with God in Orthodox Life and Worship". Deacon Ian Thompson spoke on the subject of 'Material for Prayer; Dr Elizabeth Theokritoff explored how 'Liturgy teaches us to pray the Scripture; Metropolitan Kallistos spoke about 'Attentiveness in Orthodox prayer and worship'; Rev Dr Gabrielle Thomas gave a talk on 'Praying with St Gregory the Theologian; and Dr Elena Sadovnikova gave a presentation with the title, 'Surprised by prayer'.

There was good participation from across the Deanery with members present providing a happy and mutually encouraging atmosphere enjoyed by all. The Plenary programme was supplemented by small groups and workshops pursuing the theme of the Conference: including how to pray and singing prayer and various others, including a forum for parents that had the theme, 'Children and Church'

At the Sunday evening social gathering, the musical talent of younger members was amazing and to be commended.

Unfortunately, Archbishop John was unable to attend. As usual the event was surrounded by morning and evening services, with the Sunday morning Liturgy the highlight.

Publications, Journal and Website

The website, located at www.exarchate.org.uk, has continued to be the principal means of communication with the members of the Deanery and the wider public and for obtaining news from the rest of the Archdiocese. A number of liturgical booklets published by the Deanery have been updated and reprinted.

Ecumenical and Inter-Faith Relationships

The Deanery is a member of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) and of Churches Together in England (CTE), and of the Religious Education Council for England (REC). The Dean has been able to take part in the CTE Enabling Group on two occasions, and he and two others took part in the triennial CTE Forum. Wherever possible members of the Deanery play a full part in the Standing Advisory Committees for Religious Education (SACREs) as well as other local ecumenical and inter-faith projects.

Financial review

Outstanding loans have been fully repaid.

The finances of the Deanery have operated so far on the principle of income and expenditure broadly matching. Many members and friends have made monthly contributions and every parish has to pay a percentage of its income to the Deanery.

The Deanery makes a percentage contribution to the Archdiocese on behalf of the parishes to avoid the multiple international transfer into euros of their required subscriptions.

Reserves Policy

Policy is for there to be a minimum general reserve of £4000, which would keep the Deanery running for six months.

Risk Management

The Deanery is dependent solely on the generosity of its supporters and could not continue that work if its regular income, and the contributions from parishes, ever failed.

Plans for the Future

The Deanery is a member of the Archdiocese of Orthodox Parishes of Russian Tradition in Western Europe. The Archdiocese is currently in an uncertain position following a communique from the Ecumenical Patriarchate in Constantinople adjudging that the Exarchate status has been withdrawn by them.

The Deanery will be considering its position over the coming months and consulting with its parishes before making a decision as to how to proceed. Any decision runs the risk that some parishes will decide to leave the Deanery.

Structure, governance and management

The Deanery is governed by a Trust Deed made on 20th May 2008. The original Statutes were adopted on 23rd June 2007, when the organisation was an Episcopal Vicariate, and new Statutes as a Deanery were approved on 10th November 2012.

The Clergy/Laity Meeting of 23rd November 2013 voted to amend the new Statutes.

The Deanery is now officially the 'Association of Parishes of the Archdiocese within Britain and Ireland', hereinafter the 'Exarchate UK Deanery Association' or the 'Deanery'. The Charity Commission registered the Deanery as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) with the title 'The Exarchate UK Deanery' on 23rd December 2015. The charity number of the new body is 1164976. The accounts were transferred with effect from 1st January 2016 and the old charity was closed.

Further refinements may be necessary in due course, and model Parish Statutes have been developed, and in many cases adopted by parishes.

Deanery Services

The Deanery is an association of member parishes, and provides services to the parishes including the following: Safeguarding, organising DBS disclosures for clergy and others, supporting with model constitutions, advising on establishing and safeguarding parish property, financial support and advice and participating in ecumenical bodies at a national level. The Deanery also provides trustee services to parishes and communities on request.

Members of the Executive of the Deanery from time to time are the charity trustees for the purposes of the Charities Act.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Exarchate UK Deanery is a charitable incorporated organisation registered with the Charity Commission on 23 December 2015.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

All income is included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income, any performance conditions attached to the items of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue grants', is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Gifts in kind donated are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

All capital grants received in respect of any depreciated assets are credited to deferred income and amortised to the profit and loss account over the useful economic life of the assets to which they relate.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- · Costs of raising funds comprise the promotional costs to the charity
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs, including costs of governance

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

25% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Foreign exchange

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange prevailing at the accounting date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the date of the transactions. All differences are taken to the statement of financial activities.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Clergy Support - To provide training or financial support to members of the clergy that are faced with financial difficulties. The reserve will be supported by contributions from the General Fund if necessary.

Monastic Communities - To provide financial support to monks and nuns from monastic communities

Bursary/Children Conference - The annual conference aims to pass on the cost of accommodation to attendees. Attendees with financial difficulties may apply for a reduced fee and therefore receive a bursary. Similarly all child places are charged at a reduced rate. This reserve is used to finance the cost of:

- · bursaries for those attending the annual conference
- the discounted price for children's places
- · accommodation for those involved in the children's programme

16 Events after the reporting date

The Deanery is obliged to make an annual contribution to the Archdiocese of Orthodox Parishes of Russian Tradition in Western Europe. For 2018 this has been assessed as £7,257 and is included as creditor in the Balance Sheet.

The Archbishop of the Archdiocese, of which the Deanery and its parishes are members, has moved from the Ecumenical Patriarchate to the Moscow Patriarchate. It is uncertain how many of the parishes currently covered by the Deanery will follow the Archbishop. The Deanery will be considering its position over the coming months and consulting with its remaining member parishes before making a decision as to how to proceed.

As a result there are a number of possible outcomes, which may or may not give rise to a crystallisation of the liability that is included in the balance sheet.
