4. Financial Report

During the year to 31st January 2019 income received was £22,723 (2018 £27,291). Our spending on Restricted Funds was a little less than our income and the balance outstanding is all committed to pressing needs in our community. These funds were especially useful in supporting our efforts to alleviate fuel poverty, to improve economic cooking and the provision of family lunches. There is £4,072 of restricted Funds to be spent in 2019-20. mainly on our family lunch programme and self-help such as slow cooker courses and fuel poverty. Meeting these needs remains paramount for the foodbank.

There is deficit on the Income & Expenditure Account of £348 against a surplus of £919 in 2018. The 2018 figure was after moving £2,000 into the Reserve Account which, at £6,000, stands at the Charities Commission recommended level of three months expenditure.

Cash at bank and in hand at 31 January 2019 was virtually unchanged at £25,708 (2018 £25,777).

We are deeply indebted to the generosity of the people and organisations of the area, to the continuing care of Caritas and the strong support of Tesco Stores plc. We are also grateful to St. Teresa's Church which has provided us with a location and facilities as well as splendid help from its clergy and congregation.

5. Statement of Directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements directors are required to:-

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent

• prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business. The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

With these accounts we are implementing the accounting standard FRS 102 and the Charity SORP FRS 102. The implications of this are stated in our Accounting Policies.

6. Audit and Independent Review

The CIO is not required to have an audit but because income exceeded £25,000 in 2018 we were required to have an Independent Review. The Committee appointed Howard Browne FFA of Thornton Heath, Surrey as authorised by the last Annual General Meeting. The trustees consider that an independent review is beneficial although this year it is not a legal requirement. It is proposed that Howard Browne be asked to perform this task again.

This report was agreed by the Trustees on 7th May 2019 and is signed on their behalf.

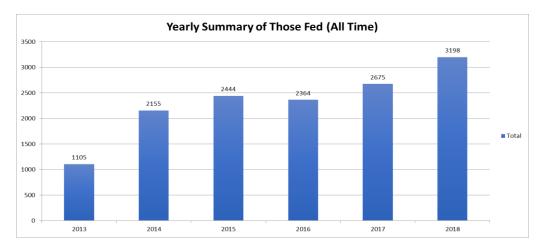
Report of the Chair of Trustees

Introduction

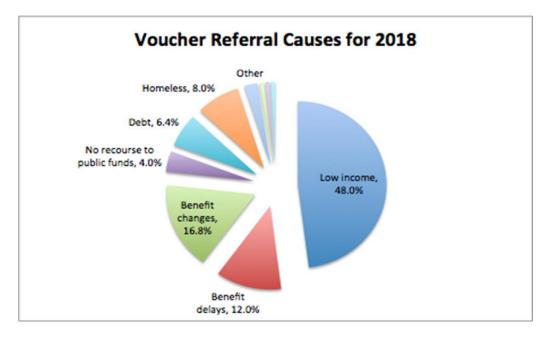
For another year Borehamwood Foodbank has remained an important part of our community – a welcome response for those who come to us for emergency food and support. Furthermore, the response to food poverty from our volunteers, supporters and everyone who donates food weaves together a wide section of our local community. In April 2019 we have been in operation for 6 years and feel that we have established ourselves as an integral part of Hertsmere.

Statistics

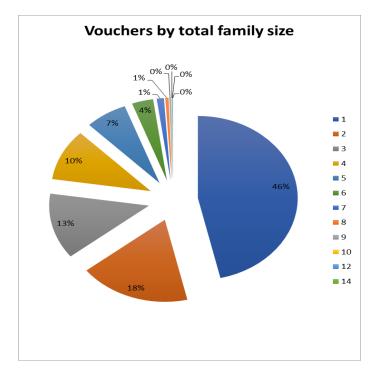
In 2018 we fed 3,198 people, which is a 20% increase on 2017. This was achieved by honouring 1320 vouchers, a 15% increase on 2017. In the previous year the increase in use was 13%, so we have witnessed a marked increase in demand.



In 2108 there was a shift in the reasons for clients coming to us as recorded from their vouchers. Previously, there has been a higher percentage of those facing benefit delays and benefit chances, in 2018 the emphasis shifted to low income:



Finally, we have noticed that the family size of those who have attended in the last year remained fairly consistent from previous years. Single people are the largest group we see.



In the last year we have been looking at our statistic in a bit more depth. The reporting system that we have as a member of the Trussell Trust network gives us the ability to build a reliable profile of our work and the group we are serving. We hope to share this in more detail in the coming year. It is not just an impression, but it can be borne out by fact, that the more vulnerable members of our community, those who have ill health, mental health issues, are homelessness, face job or income insecurity, or are living alone, are more likely to use our foodbank.

Since we opened in April 2013, and up until the end of January 2109, we have provided 14,258 people with 3 days emergency food. I would like to say, that with this number of people in Hertsmere presenting themselves as hungry or in need of food, the argument about the existence of food poverty is over, but it is not. Sadly hunger, the struggle to keep a household with food or to provide meals for children continues to be a day to day reality for a significant number of people in Borehamwood. As an organisation we feel that this cannot be acceptable in our community. We will continue to strive to provide food, find means of assisting people out of food poverty and challenge this hidden problem in our community.

Achievements

To meet the demand highlighted above we have collected, labelled and processed 20.7 tonnes of food. These are made into packs and for the same period we have distributed 16 tonnes of food and goods.

We have remained committed to tackling holiday hunger and we have held 6 family lunches – two at Easter, four over the summer holiday plus 3 half term cookery lunches. Unique brand to

our lunches is that we consider them to be family occasions when parent and children can take part in a craft activity or prepare food together, where we all eat together, and families go home with additional food for the week.

We have been fortunate to secure funding from Hertfordshire Community Foundation, Tesco Groundwork grant and private donations to support clients with fuel grants over the winter months. The demand for these is consistent. Without fuel to cook or heat a home, some of our clients cannot make the most of the food we provide or have the necessary warmth to cope with illness.

We have started a process of supporting the distribution team with more information and training. Over the year we have had input from DWP, Herts Help and local learning mentors. Both our distribution and warehouse teams have grown in strength and maturity and deal with challenges and issues in a happy, flexible and accommodating manner.

In autumn of 2018 we were aware that Universal Credit would be rolled out into full service in December 2018. As trustees we set ourselves the challenge to have three things in place: enough stock, fuel grants for the winter period and beginning of a partnership with Citizens Advice Hertsmere. We saw these as important elements of the safety net we aim to provide those who use our service. We are delighted that January 2019 saw the start of a Citizens Advice outreach worker attending one of our sessions a week. This will increase to two sessions a week in June 2019 as we have secured funding from ASDA / Trussell Trust to continue for the next three years. We strongly believe that welfare support embedded in the foodbank is the most effective way of supporting people to improve their situation.

Thank Yous!

We have an amazing team of approximately 35 volunteers who service our warehouse and distribution teams. They give their time freely, support each other and are joined in the aims of the foodbank. We feel privileged to have such strong volunteer base and would like to thank them for all their efforts.

We also have a team of approximately 18 volunteers who support the family lunches. Some of these volunteers also work in our distribution or warehouse teams. Penny Beral puts in many hours in the planning and preparation of the food for family lunches, and for that we are very grateful.

We have other volunteers who will join us for Tesco collections or for our monetary collection at Kings Cross. These are events that require a significant amount of effort, and we are so appreciative of all the support we receive.

We would like to give a huge acknowledgement to the unknown people who consistently and generously donate to our static box in Tesco Borehamwood. On a weekly basis we are touched by the simple acts of kindness demonstrated by the food left for us to distribute.

We have continued with a successful and generous relationship with Tesco's who host our twiceyearly food collections. Thank you to Marion Naylor for all your support.

The work of the foodbank would not be possible without the support of all the other community organisations that support us with regular donations – the local churches and synagogues, all the local primary schools and secondary schools such as Haberdashers Aske, Nicholas Breakspear and St Columba's. We have had offers of help and monetary support from local businesses and small groups of concerned people. We are happy to link with many local initiatives tackling food poverty and supporting local people.

Finally, this year we have improved our social media profile, and we are grateful for the work Oliver Coleman has put into this. We know that this is where the conversations are happening!

Next Year

We have challenges for the year ahead. We can never become complacent as we know that we need to steadily build on our successes to remain a reliable and respected part of the community. We need to strengthen our trustee team, and work towards more distinct governance. We are looking forward to strengthening our partnership with Citizens Advice Hertsmere and the work of the distribution team. We also aim to widen our access to family lunches. We look forward to working together with everyone in our community to address poverty and food shortages.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1 Accounting Policies

A Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and Companies Act 2006.

Borehamwood Foodbank CIO meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

B Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

Borehamwood Foodbank is mostly dependent upon volunteers and there is one parttime paid worker. The buildings used by the foodbank are owned and there are no commitments to pay rent or service charges to Saint Teresa's Roman Catholic Church where the foodbank is located. We do however make voluntary contributions to defray some costs incurred on our behalf by the church.

C Reserves Policy

In common with many charities the trustees have considered it prudent to set aside a part of the accumulated surplus to pay outstanding commitments particularly salaries, and to enable the closure of the foodbank in an orderly manner including clearing the site of concrete bases for our buildings. Thanks to the generosity of funders, the general public and our hard-working volunteers we do not see closure being forced upon us for financial reasons nor, regrettably any diminution in the needs for our services.

D Income recognition

All income is recognised when received.

E Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

F Volunteers and donated services and facilities

The value of the work performed by our volunteers without charge is not incorporated into these financial statements. Although the value is considerable it is excluded due to the difficulty of valuing it reliably.

G Stock

Stocks of food and other distributed items are not valued due to the difficulty of valuing them reliably and consistently. In addition these stocks are restricted to foodbank distribution and have no realisable value. At 31st January 2019 our stocks amounted to

9,005 Kg (2018 was 5,834 Kg) which, using the Trussell Trust calculator, is worth approximately £15,700 (2018 £9,800)

H Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing over £500 are capitalised at cost. Depreciation is charged at rates between 10% and 33.3% depending upon the likely life of the asset.

I Funds accounting

Restricted funds are monies where the donor requires that the donation must be spent on a particular purpose and is returnable if unspent in a set period of time.

J Key management

The key management functions are performed by the officers and other members of the committee.
