# Trustees' report Year to 31 December 2018

The trustees and directors of the company present their annual report together with the financial statements for the year to 31 December 2018.

The trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015)" applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), effective 1 January 2015; and the Companies Act 2006.

#### Objectives and activities

The principle objects of the charity are to relieve the needs of children and young people with life threatening or terminal illnesses in such a way as the trustees see fit. The charity was founded in memory of Josie Grove in 2007 and her wish of supporting young cancer patients with limited time will remain at the core of the organisation's objectives and activities. The charity supports children and young people up to and including their 25<sup>th</sup> birthday. Support is given by way of Cash Gifts of up to £500 and by arranging unique and personal end of life wishes and experiences.

#### **Activities for achieving objectives**

The Cash Gifts and experiences provide a very personal opportunity for young patients to create special memories with their family, friends and loved ones at a time of extreme distress. The Cash Gifts we provide are empowering and a wonderful resource for young patients to use on pain free days for special treats, trips and events. The impact on the family is great and the service we provide support the needs of the patient at an extremely difficult time. On some occasions we are asked to arrange special experiences, this is done with the help of volunteers who work consistently to make sure the wish is fulfilled in a timely and sensitive manner. We continue to send out our consignments of Activity Boxes to hospitals, which are eagerly awaited by playworkers within busy cancer wards.

#### **Review of Activities and Financial Performance**

The Trust is working collaboratively with Clic Sargent, hospices and other health care professionals in an effort to increase our reach. The charity has been invited to apply to become an Associate Member of the Children and Young People's Cancer Coalition which is working to build better outcomes and experiences for children and young people with cancer.

## Trustees' report (continued) Year to 31 December 2018

Our professional relationships have strengthened following visits to Great Ormand Street Hospital, UCLH, Sheffield Children's Hospital, Royal Victoria Infirmary, Freeman Hospital and Children and Young People's Hospices.

Our move to Newcastle in June 2018 was the first action following our long-term evaluation of the charity. The initial move undoubtedly impacted on our fundraising activities for the year, but the charity is now building on new foundations we have created. In the short time of being in Newcastle we are delighted that we have been selected to be the chosen charity/benefactors of various businesses and organisations such as Jackson's Law, George Washington Hotel, Waitrose, The Big Give, All Season's Funeral Directors, Durham Community Foundation, Daisy Marr Foundation, Newcastle Building Society, Dewan Foundation, Freemason's Durham, Hawthorns Logistics, Durham Rotary Group, Lions Club of Morpeth, Hay's Travel, Alan and Thomas Insurance and the Royal Grammar School. We continue to receive support from local businesses and individuals who have climbed Kilimanjaro, attended collections, our annual successful ball and those who took part in the Great North Run.

The Trustee Board has now been reformed with new Trustees and a full long-term strategy plan is being worked on. Our relationship with Center Parcs continues to grow and we are delighted to say that for the fourth time we have been given complimentary stays to offer young patients and their families throughout the year.

Our volunteer base has grown and we are working with a large and diverse group of people within the region developing some exciting projects for 2019.

The introduction of GDPR presented an opportunity to work collaboratively with Clic Sargent and the Trust now receives referrals from social work teams using an encrypted referral process, Mimecast. There have been significant teething problems using the system however it was essential that a secure pathway was agreed, as the referral process encompasses processing highly sensitive information. This has now been resolved and there is a notable increase in referrals.

Demand for our support continues and in 2018 the Trust supported in excess of 200 young people through grant giving, supplying activity boxes and granting wishes. Our support is far reaching and has undoubtedly had a profound effect on the patients, family and loved ones. The impact of the services we provide at times are difficult to measure quantitively, however changes to our application forms has enabled the team to collate feedback for monitoring purposes.

The results for the year ended 31 December 2018 are summarized in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 9. During this period the Company reported a deficit of £28,903.

We would like to thank our many supporters who have remained with us during this transitional stage. We are incredibly grateful for your ongoing support and the hours you have generously given to the charity.

#### Reserves policy

#### **Our Beneficiaries**

Our beneficiaries are the young people who have successfully been awarded funding by the trustees, this being based on the criteria of making memories. When the application has been approved, awards are made within a very short period.

#### Rationale Behind the Reserves Policy

The charity currently employs two members of staff and rents premises, the half of the year being in Hexham and the second in Newcastle upon Tyne. Our fundraising income streams are not constant nor guaranteed. In order to ensure continuity and stability for the staff, volunteers and beneficiaries, it is necessary to hold enough reserves to mitigate a short-term fall in income and enable continued operation for a period of six months.

To ensure sound financial management, funds are set aside as an operating fund, to allow the continued operation of the organisation in the event of a serious deficit in funding.

#### **Establishing the Level of Reserves**

The trustees consider the highest risks to be associated with the generation of unrestricted income, from which the central core cost is paid. Core organizational costs are reasonably static, however payments to beneficiaries are not and it is difficult to predict surges in applications. Some element of flexibility needs to be built in to the reserves.

The lever of reserves held is therefore based on the level of "core" costs for a six-month period, together with an additional amount of 10% increase in the level of gifts awarded. The trustees have flexibility in the levels of gifts awarded to recipients and this can be adjusted where necessary.

## **Level of Operating Reserves**

After consideration of the above points the trustees consider the appropriate level of reserves to be £65,000.

#### Other Unrestricted Reserves

The capital reserve is adjusted annually to reflect the net book value of fixed assets, which cannot be easily realised, in the event of a cash shortfall.

#### Plans for the future

A new Board of Trustees now govern the organisation and have been working with staff and volunteers to affect some significant changes to strengthen the Trust. Our experienced trustees are working in subgroups to develop the long-term vision, mission and core values which will be the basis for growth and expansion within the next three years. Our Case for Support has been prepared and our vision, mission and values will be reflected within all case expressions. Plans to launch an online shop are in progress and funding has been secured to do this within the next six months.

We will increase our collaborative relationships with healthcare professionals across the country, to further strengthen our shared aim to give children and young people with cancer access to our services across the U.K. The trustees have identified the need for an additional fundraiser and plan to reshape the current organisational structure, allowing for growth and development of the staff and organisation.

#### Structure, governance and management

#### Structure and governing documents

The organisation was registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2016 and as a charity and on 20 May 2016. The company was established under Memorandum and Articles of Association and a Charitable Trust deed which governs its objects and powers. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.00.

#### Trustees

The Directors of the company are also charity trustees and the management of the organisation is their responsibility. They are appointed under the terms of the governing documents. Trustees are elected to serve for 2 years after which they are eligible for re-election at the next AGM.

## Organisation and structure

The day to day operation of the organisation are delegated to the Chief Executive Officer who manages one member of staff and volunteers.

#### **Risk Management**

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed using a comprehensive risk framework. Attention is drawn within this framework to the operations and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks. We seek guidance from the CCEW and ICO and work within their professional guidelines.

#### Year to 31 December 2018

#### 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been consistently applied.

#### (a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015)" applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), effective 1 January 2015; and the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011.

#### (b) Fund accounting

General Funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustess in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designed for other purposes.

Designated funds are general funds which have been set aside by the trustees for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements

#### (c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.

Gifts in kind are included in the statement of financial activities at a reasonable estimate of their value at the time they are utilised by the charity, with the equivalent amount recognised as charitable expenditure. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### Year to 31 December 2018

#### 1. Accounting policies (continued)

Donated services or facilities, which comprise donated services, are included in income at a valuation which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised where there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of donation.

#### (d) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs can not be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in the support of expenditure on the objects of the charity. They include governance costs, which are those incurred in connection with the administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### (e) Fixed assets

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Computer equipment - 15% reducing balance

#### (f) Going concern basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees consider this to be appropriate as they project the level of donations and event profits to be sufficient to exceed operating costs.
