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Our Work in Communities

Battersea

During 2018/19 we began a partnership with Wandsworth Mediation Service to collaborate on a process of transformative change in Battersea. This is intended to be a long term project. Community members are trained in the Dialogue Road Map basics for use in everyday life and as momentum builds a group, drawn from the community, will be intensively trained as DRM Facilitators to conduct Mediation, Restorative Justice and Dialogue Circles within the community. We ran 2 community trainings to a selected group who are now committed to engaging more community members.

Kalikalos

For the last 4 years, we have brought the power of dialogue to this holistic community in Greece. Every year people gather from May to October to live in Community and provide holistic education. At any one time the community is holding the space for Community leaders, volunteers, workshop leaders and workshop participants. Living in community can sometimes be intense and emotionally charged so, using the Dialogue Road Map we work on how to balance individual wellbeing with community wellbeing while managing the logistics and operational requirements of running 3 residential centres.



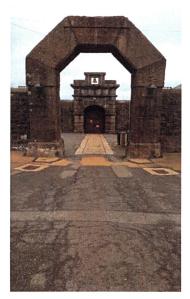


Malta

This year we began a partnership with Kopin, a refugee support charity, in Malta. As one of the southern most entry points to the EU and with a disproportionate amount of sea to patrol, Malta is often the landing point for migrants and asylum seekers. Our Work in Prisons

HMP Dartmoor



The work in HMP Dartmoor continues to grow as we develop the project based on feedback and casework delivered in the prison by prisoners, volunteers and Officers.

We have trained and put in place a team of 14 Dialogue Road Map Facilitators. These are prisoners who work full time on the project and who undertook 9 days of training and signed up to ongoing practice and supervision.

Their role is to work with other prisoners who are struggling. They do this in four ways described below. The results are showing themselves in lives turned around. The prisoners who work as DRM Facilitators provide a selfless service.

Four ways in which DRM Facilitators support their peers:

- 1. They use the Dialogue Road Map to work one to one with prisoners who are experiencing inner conflict. These may be multiple sessions aimed at providing compassionate listening and empathy in order to provoke change.
- 2. Where an issue arises that has the potential to be resolved through mediation, the DRM Facilitators will mediate. Examples of cases are informal, low-level disputes that are part of day to day prison life or could be more formal as part of an adjudication to see whether the parties can continue to live on the same wing.
- 3. They facilitate dialogue circles where topics can be aired as part of prevention. An example could be a problem with canteen or laundry. By addressing the issues as a group in a facilitated conversation, the participants can draw on the collective wisdom, including the officers' experience, to identify underlying problems and find solutions.
- 4. The Self Reflection Pack. Maria Arpa has designed a pack containing 21 facilitated exercises for prisoners with long term problems who have reached a point of requesting help to change. This is an intensive piece of work in which prison staff, DRM Facilitators and the prisoner collaborate in a supported process.

Our Work in Schools

Living and Learning in Harmony

This year we have embarked on a new project called 'Living and Learning in Harmony'. We have partnered locally with three primary schools – Byron Court, Ark Franklin and Salusbury. The schools are using the Dialogue Road Map and Peer Mediation, to reduce day to day, low level conflict between children. Managing these squabbles through peer mediation means that teachers can get on with teaching, and children accept that the classroom is for learning and conflict is dealt with compassionately in peer groups.

Statement of Public Benefit

In setting our objectives and planning our activities, our trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

CPS is committed to enabling as many people as possible to benefit through casework, participation in workshops, training and volunteering. This year our projects in Dartmoor Prison, a Social Housing Estate in Battersea, local primary schools and with ex-offenders have supported in excess of 100 direct beneficiaries and approximately 1000 indirect beneficiaries.

Financial Review

The main income for 2018/9 came from our charity shops which is consistent with our goal to become self sustainable. Peaceful Solutions Mediation Service has covered the costs of premises and equipment. Our aim is to ensure that our running costs can be sustained through our enterprise and that we only rely on grants for project based costs.

Reserves Policy

The charity can cover the running costs for three months. This will enable the charity to meet statutory and contractual responsibilities in the event of ceasing to trade.

Statement of the Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the association's financial activities during the period and of its financial position at the end of the period.

In preparing accounts giving a true and fair view, the management committee should follow best practice and:

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 20% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
