The PCC operates through a number of committees, which meet between full meetings of the PCC. A description of the committees follows in the PCC annual report.

In addition to these committees there are Ministry team and strategic planning groups.

Structure, Governance and Management.

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation rules. All church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

Objectives and Activities.

Parkstone Saint Peter and Saint Osmund with Branksea Saint Mary has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, the Revd Michael Camp, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for the Parish Centre in Chapel Road, Parkstone.

Church Attendance.

There were 215 Parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll at the end of 2018. 80 of these do not reside in the parish. 3 names were added during the year and 2 were removed through death.

The average attendance (3 services) on a Sunday was 113 but these numbers increased considerably at Festivals and Christmas Carol Services.

Annual Report for 2018 of the Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Parkstone, St Peter with St Osmund and Branksea, St Mary

During 2018 the PCC has continued with the new committee structure, delegating most of its day to day work to one or other of the committees. Comprising both PCC members and non-members, the committees allow the PCC to spend more time on strategy and mission: Focused on God; Speaking of Jesus; Caring about people. Other major items which were discussed by the PCC during the year included re-ordering of the Church, finance and safeguarding. The PCC has decided that **it** will, itself, fulfil the role of a Mission and Outreach Committee.

The PCC's accounts for the year ending December 2018 show an overall trading loss of -£8,647 of which -£7,264 is attributable to St Peter's. The deficit mainly came about through diminishing Planned Giving and maintenance spending over the original budget (including £2,250 on urgent roof repairs for the Parish Centre). St Peter's financial position at year end shows available cash £97,380 and restricted funds of £337,790 which can only be used for capital expenditure. The 'Centre' building is included in the accounts at cost namely £39,775.

Usually meeting between full meetings of the PCC, the **committees** are:

<u>Standing and Finance Committee</u> – this combined committee meets between PCC meetings to deal with urgent business and prepare the PCC agenda. It also deals with financial matters such as monitoring expenditure and preparing the budget. The Standing Committee is the only one required by law.

<u>Nurture Committee</u> – relates to the Christian nurture of members of the congregation. It has also been working on safeguarding to ensure that as a Church we are fully aware of this important issue and are fully compliant with the law. The PCC is complying with new guidelines introduced by Salisbury Diocese on the safeguarding of children, young people and adults at risk.

<u>Fabric and Maintenance Committee</u> – deals with care of our buildings, contents and land. After Quinquennial Inspections in 2016, there is much to be done to improve the condition of our buildings at St Peter's and St Mary's. The St Peter's churchyard is well maintained by Suzanne Winklhofer, assisted by monthly visits of the PayBack team.

<u>World Mission Committee</u> – raises our awareness of our part in the worldwide Church. Typically, it does this through literature in the Information Area, articles in the Magazine, a regularly updated page on the website, and by the mission prayer on the weekly notice sheet. It also supports overseas giving to missionary and charitable causes.

<u>Communications Committee</u> – attends to matters of communication both within the congregation and with the local community. It has co-ordinated the delivery of over 3000 Christmas cards to homes within the parish, discussed the content of the web site and reviewed the external notice boards. New boards have been erected in the North and South porches A start has been made on creating a database providing a contact list of all who worship at St Peter's

<u>Church Centre Management Committee</u> – St Peter's Centre has been well maintained throughout the year. It is self-supporting and contributes to church funds. It is well used by uniformed groups during weekday evenings with some daytime lettings to dance and slimming groups. There is further letting availability.

<u>Social Committee</u> – organises social events to deepen our fellowship with each other. It has provided meals and refreshments associated with Carols by Candlelight, Candlemas, Patronal Festival, Harvest Festival and an Autumn Quiz Night with a fish and chip supper.

<u>Fayre Committee</u> – organises the Summer Fayre which is held on Parkstone Green on the second Saturday in June. The 2018 event was blessed with good weather, raising about £3000 after expenses. A great variety of stalls, activities including a dog show, and music. Always a popular event allowing the church to reach out into the community. Many people work very hard to make the day both memorable and successful. It is good to have the support and involvements of local services and clubs. Thanks to Clive Deakin for masterminding this event.

<u>Friends of St Peter's Parkstone</u> This is a separate charity and as part of our three-year strategic plan for St. Peter's, it was agreed to set up 'The Friends of St. Peter's Church, Parkstone', membership of which would be aimed at the wider community of Parkstone, as well as those for whom St. Peter's has personal memories, maybe they were married here, or their child was baptised here, or even for those for whom St. Peter's was there when they needed a place to sit quietly.

Fund-raising activities are now being planned with a Flower Festival in 2019. We also plan to update and republish the Guidebook/History of the Church and possibly devise a children's quiz about the building. Our hope is that we will get more people, locally and from further afield, inside the beautiful building and also supporting its maintenance with donations.

<u>The Flower Group</u> is pleased to report that thanks to the kind generosity of our congregation, they were again able to finance the flowers in St Peter's without support from Church funds. The flowers are all paid for by memorial donations, and annual Easter and Christmas collections The Group welcome suggestions and any offers of help

<u>St Peter's Choir</u> had a busy year. With an age range from nine to over ninety, the Choir meets on Friday evenings to practise between 6.30pm and 8pm. It sings at 10.00am every Sunday, at Choral Evensong once a month and at weddings, funerals and various extra services at festivals. Thanks to Richard McLester (Director of Music), to Beverley Manning (Organist), and to all the choristers for their commitment and to their parents who consistently support them.

<u>St Peter's Lay Pastoral Assistants</u>. Lay Pastoral Assistants continue to visit the sick, the housebound and the bereaved. They have taken Holy Communion to individuals and led services in Care Homes, as well as supporting the local Refuge, the Lunch Club, and Breakfast Worship. Some are also Baptism sponsors. LPAs will also be supporting the work of 'Hope in the Community' which is a joint initiative of the local churches to reach out to isolated people.

<u>St Peter's Lunch Club</u> continues to meet fortnightly in the café area of the Church. About twenty people attend to enjoy good food, friendship and share news of members and helpers. Members' ages range from 65 to over 100 and there is a mix of people from our own and other churches and from the local Parkstone area. A three-course meal is served by a team of volunteers followed by tea or coffee. About 50 people enjoyed a Christmas lunch including members of our congregation. Our thanks go to all who organise and help with this work.

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<u>Knit and Natter</u> meet fortnightly and have been busy during the year knitting hats and blankets for the hospital as well as Easter Chicks and Christmas Angels for The Refuge and Breakfast Worship.

<u>Pray 4 the Week Group</u> meets each Monday morning to offer prayers both for anyone named on the Weekly Sheet and for events during the following week.

There is also a *Prayer and Fasting Group* which meets at noon on the first day of every month to pray for Climate Justice.

<u>Friday concerts</u> are held from June to September in St Peter's Church. They provide an opportunity for people to listen to a half hour music recital and enjoy fellowship over a light lunch. The proceeds from refreshments is distributed between various missions and the retiring collections go to church funds.

<u>Our Outreach</u> continues with the Refuge, Routes to Roots and Robert Gabriel House, local schools and care homes. Our congregation always respond to any appeal and we have been able to distribute Easter Eggs and Christmas presents for the residents of the Refuge and Robert Gabriel House. Routes to Roots supports rough sleepers helping them into sustainable accommodation.

<u>St Peter's Youth Group</u> St Peter's Youth has gone from strength to strength. 14 different young folk attended over 2018, with a core regular group of 8.

<u>The Mothers' Union</u> branch continues to flourish with Janet Everett co-ordinating the committee. A full programme of events has taken place. Members support Breakfast Worship, Marriage Preparation, Lunch Club and wedding couples. They also offer pastoral care to the elderly.

<u>Breakfast Worship</u> continues in the Parish Centre at 9am on the last Sunday of every month. Ably led by Sarah, Andy, Mae, Melissa and Kay, it attracts over 60 people of all ages and the links between this congregation and the wider Church family seems to be increasing. Several families enjoyed hosting one of the four travelling Nativity Sets during Advent.

<u>The Circle Dancing group</u> meets monthly in St Peter's Church.

All our groups welcome new members.

Christian Education. Many opportunities for adults to learn have been offered during the year. Home groups and the 'Wednesday Wisdom' study group have met regularly. Foundations meets on two Sundays a month for children in years Reception to Year 6.

St Mary's, Brownsea had another successful season. The Island is open at weekends in February and March then daily until November with regular services in Church from Easter until September. Services are attended by scout and guide groups camping on the Island and by residents and visitors. The Blessing of the Sea and Harvest services are highlights of the Brownsea programme. The Church was open in the evening and lit by candles during the Island's popular Open Air Theatre season. There was a candle lit Carol Service for the Royal Motor Yacht Club but the Carol Service for islanders and volunteers had to be cancelled because of bad weather. Thanks to Janet Mellors for her deep sense of commitment to St Mary's and her hard work. Thanks also to the John Lewis Partnership for use of the Castle, the boatmen on Castello, the Organists, Pumper and Bell Ringers for all the work they undertake.

The clergy who assist Fr Michael contribute enormously to the worship, outreach and pastoral care at St Peter's: Jonny Scott, Pat Southgate, Sally Bedborough, Michael Beesley, Diana Newman, Hilary Wright, Keith Hugo, and Iris Pearce. They each bring distinctive gifts for which we are deeply thankful to God.

Adam Bullivant who is exploring his vocation with a view to becoming a priest extended his stay at St Peter's for the coming year.

We express our thanks to all the members of our congregations who have helped so much over the past year.

We record special thanks to our Vergers, Brian Cook and Dot Cornish. We also thank our Churchwardens, PCC Secretary, our Honorary Treasurer as well as Caroline Wehlau our Parish Administrator. Thanks to Choir members, Servers, Eucharistic Ministers, Intercessors, Lesson Readers, Welcomers and Coffee Servers, and many others too numerous to mention by name who so generously give their time, talents and resources to enrich the life of our Parish.

Independent examiner's report to the PCC of Parkstone Saint Peter and Saint Osmund with Branksea Saint Mary

This report on the financial statements of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2018 which are set out on pages 1 and 2, is in respect of an examination carried out in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 ('the Regulations') and s.43 of the Charities Act 1993 ('the Act')

Respective responsibilities of the PCC and the examiner

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 31 December 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 together with applicable accounting standards and the SORP 2005.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

Funds

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be maintained; only income arising from investment of the endowment may be used either as restricted or unrestricted funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established.

Restricted funds represent (a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, and (b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The PCC does not usually invest separately for each fund. Where there is no separate investment, interest is apportioned to individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

Incoming Resources

Planned giving, collections and donations are recognised when received. Tax refunds are recognised when the incoming resource to which they relate is received. Grants and legacies are accounted for when the PCC is legally entitled to the amounts due. Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued. All other income is recognisable when it is receivable. All incoming resources are accounted for gross.

Resources expended

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC. The diocesan parish share is accounted for and paid quarterly. Amounts received specifically for mission are dealt with as restricted funds. All other expenditure is generally recognised when it is incurred and is accounted for gross. Church insurance is paid monthly.

Fixed assets

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the accounts in accordance with s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993.

Movable church furnishings held by the Rector and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the church's inventory, which can be inspected (at any reasonable time). For anything acquired prior to 2006 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore such assets are not valued in the financial statements.
