Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 December 2018

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2018. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Charities published on 16 July 2014.

Structure, governance and management

SarcoidosisUK is a registered charity, number 1063986, and is constituted under a trust deed dated 18 November 1996, as amended 29 May 1997 and 6th June 2014.

Trustee Appointment.

Trustees are appointed by member vote. All trustees are personally affected by sarcoidosis. The board of trustees regularly reviews the skills and experience of members to ensure that, as the legal and operational backbone of the charity, the board is as strong as possible.

Objectives and activities

SarcoidosisUK has four goals:

- 1. **Information**: We provide accurate and detailed information to people with sarcoidosis, their carers, healthcare professionals and anyone else personally or professionally affected by sarcoidosis.
- 2. **Support**: We provide emotional and confidential support for anyone affected by sarcoidosis in the UK.
- 3. **Research**: We raise funds and invests them into medical research focussed directly on finding a cure for sarcoidosis.
- 4. **Awareness:** We recognise the lack of understanding and awareness from both the medical profession and the general public regarding sarcoidosis. We aim to raise awareness though everything we do.

Achievements and performance

SarcoidosisUK Patient Council

We've always known that we have an incredible group of supporters who show unrivalled knowledge about sarcoidosis and passion for the charity. This year we have set up a Patient Council for patients to get further involved with the charity, particularly with research and awareness projects. The board currently has 31 members and has already contributed to a number of important projects.

Clinical Board

SarcoidosisUK has a formed and developed great relationships with many sarcoidosis specialists from across the UK over the past few years. Many consultants have helped the charity, for instance in writing our Patient Information Leaflets. In spring 2019 we formed a Clinical Board to help with SarcoidosisUK's clinically related outputs and services. The Board is currently 9 members and has a first meeting in September 2019.

Specialist Patient Days

Many patients have been calling for SarcoidosisUK to host patient conference days, particularly those who cannot reach our current support group locations and feel isolated. In June 2019 we held the first of these at the Royal Free – SarcoidosisUK Neurosarcoidosis Patient Day. Over 65 patients attended and hundreds watched via livestream as Dr Kidd,

Consultant Neurosarcoidosis Specialist, spoke about the condition.

• We have recorded an amazing 2,200% increase in website traffic over the past year

We now have around 20,000 unique visitors per month compared to an average of 8,000 per month a year ago. We think of every person who visits as someone we've helped so seeing this number go up so dramatically means a lot to us. We have invested in website security to ensure we can provide online support 100% of the time.

• We've funded another major research project

In 2018 we funded Dr Simon Hart at the University of Hull to analyse the effectiveness of the antibiotic Azithromycin in reducing mTOR activity in sarcoidosis patients. In addition we have conducted our own exciting research projects: digitalising the KSQ and conducting the SarcoidosisUK BIG Survey, a detailed collection of sarcoidosis patient demographic data. We've also continued our partnership with the British Lung Foundation and look forward to announcing the 2019 grant winner.

Our Support Services continue to go from strength to strength

The SarcoidosisUK Nurse Helpline has now spoken to over 700 callers, we have 14 active Support Groups and have just accepted our 3,000th member to the SarcoidosisUK Facebook Group.

• We've been continuing our national and international advocacy work

We are represented on the European Respiratory Society (ERS) Patient Advisory Committee, an ERS Taskforce writing new sarcoidosis treatment guidelines and the ERS Patient Priorities project where he is leading a working group writing a checklist tool to help consultations. Jack is also sitting on the BTS Sarcoidosis Registry Steering Group, the WASOG FSR Centres of Excellence Committee and the NHS England Infliximab Commissioning Policy Working Group. Jo Whight, Helpline Nurse, is a patient representative on the British Thoracic Society (BTS) Sarcoidosis Statement taskforce.

Plans for next year

We intend to build again on our success. To further enhance the information we give out, to build deeper partnerships within the medical community, provide even more support, improve awareness of this disease. And, of course, to fund another potentially ground-breaking piece of research towards a cure for sarcoidosis.

Financial review

The Charity has been almost entirely reliant on donations from the public. In 2018, voluntary income was £130,067 (2017 - £76,038), up 71%.

Just Giving has resulted in income of £51,298 (2017 – £39,582) against costs of £655 (2017 - £545) and was our largest source of income. In addition, personal donations resulted in income of £47,071. Donations 'in memory' produced income to the charity of £20,147.

Expenditure in 2018 has increased to £161,519 (2017 – £128,092), up 26%. The increase was mainly due to the increased costs we have invested in fundraising activities.

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately six months of unrestricted charitable expenditure. The trustees consider that this level will provide sufficient funds to respond to applications for grants and ensure that there are sufficient funds available to cover support and governance costs.

Notes to the accounts

1. Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic Of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

(b) Fund structure

The charity had up to 31 December 2014 a single unrestricted general fund. In 2015 it was decided that a designated fund of £180,000 be set up to fund research.

(c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are recognised once the charity has entitlement to the resources, it is certain that the resources will be received and the monetary value of incoming resources can be measured with sufficient reliability. Incoming resources comprise:

(d) Resources expended

(e) Allocation of overhead and support costs

Where relevant, any support costs have been allocated to an appropriate charitable activity in 2018.

(f) Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs are detailed in note 6.

(g) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives on the following basis:
