

REVIEW OF THE YEAR 2018

THE VICAR'S REPORT - APRIL 2019

It has been my privilege to serve you all as Vicar of St Paul's for the last three and a half years. I am truly thankful to God for bringing me here.

I am also thankful to everyone here who is working with me to help us, as a Church, in any way. So, to all of you who serve - thank you; to all of you who give financially - thank you; to all of you who enable this Church community to become more fully what God calls us to be - thank you. As Romans 12 teaches us, we are the Body of Christ and we all have a role to play here; and it is only as we each serve and give that Christ's body really functions as God intended. So, to all of you who fulfil your function as part of this body, thank you.

But of course, that is also a challenge to us. There are, roughly, 120 regular members of the Church here at St Paul's. However, as with most Churches, not all of us are giving or serving. So, could I ask you to prayerfully consider what you give to the Church financially, and how you serve the Church practically, and to ask God: "Should I be giving more?" and, "Should I be serving more?" we really do need new people to 'step up' and to give regularly to the Church, and to serve practically. Only then will we be able to fulfil God's calling here in Hook.

This is, perhaps, particularly important for us because we are, as you know, a relatively small Church. As such we really do need everyone to pull together and to play their part, both financially and in terms of offering themselves in service.

Thank you's

Of course, as with every Church, there comes a time when people either leave or step down from a significant role. So, I would like to take this opportunity to particularly thank two people.

Sue Russell has served as our Church Warden here for five years. She is incredibly reliable, organised, efficient and hard-working and has given so much to God and to this Church over that time. I am truly grateful to her. She steps down as warden at this APCM but, of course, will continue to serve God here but in a different role.

Sue Liptrot is another who does so much. She is a SPA (Pastoral Worker), heading up our pastoral team, visiting those in need, taking people

Communion at home, organising our prayer-ministry each Sunday, serving as a Street-Pastor, and co-ordinating our prayer-chain. She is, sadly, moving away from Hook and has given so much here. She will be greatly missed and I truly appreciate all she has given.

The Electrical Project

Of course, one of the key 'projects' of the past year has been our 'electricallighting-sound and AV' project. Graham Cocks our Church Warden is taking the lead on this, amongst everything else he does for God and his Church. Once



again, I am immensely grateful to him. The total cost of this project will be, I suspect about £70,000 (£64,000 for the electrical and lighting works, plus extra costs for the sound and PA). we have so far raised over £50,000 and I thank all of you who have given to the project so far. May I ask anyone who has not done so already to consider giving to this important project? There are giving packs at the back of the Church.

Looking ahead

And so, lastly, may I remind each and every one of us that our calling is to shine the light of Christ to Hook and beyond. As our mission statement reminds us, this means:

We are called to worship God; to grow as disciples; to love and care for all; and to reach out with the good news of Jesus Christ.

May God lead us forward as we seek to work together to fulfil this mission.

THIS Team Matters

Statistics, as we all know, can be misleading. If I told you that THiS Team had grown by 100% during 2018 you would, I am guessing, be rightly suspicious. But in one measure that is correct. For at the beginning of 2018 THiS Team had two ordained clergy and by half way through (and continuing) our forces had doubled! Unfortunately, I can't report the same level of growth in our congregations overall – now *that* would be news! But in each of our Annual Reports this year across THiS Team it is right that we welcome the new faces.

After nearly two years without a member of clergy, St George's were rightly excited to welcome Rev David Nyirongo along with his wife Safiya and children Kamran, Judah and Seraphine to St George's who were re-locating from Wales. The strength and commitment of the home team at St George's meant that they had been very active in worship and in their local area prior to David's arrival but his coming to join them has brought a new depth and focus to



ministry. David is available to the parish for just 20 hours a week so he has to pack a lot into that time. His appointment is for a fixed period of three years and we pray that in that time St George's will flourish under his care and we can look forward to exciting times as Tolworth itself is set for wide-scale development and population increase.



The appointment of Rev Carolyn Lucas as 'Minister across the Team' has further strengthened our resources. Carolyn came from much closer by, New Malden, and was already known with the Team; she had been particularly valuable in supporting St George's in their vacancy. Her presence means that we can all breathe a bit of a sigh of relief as we have more resource to cover holidays and sickness but she

also brings many strengths in ministry from which the whole Team will benefit. Carolyn's four daughters are grown up but we are delighted to welcome her husband, Tim, to THiS Team too.

THIS Clergy Team meets once a month for prayer, support and to organise Team worship and to discuss all matters relevant to the Team. We are grateful to each other and to God for that support, knowing that it can be easy to become isolated in ministry and the existence of THIS Team relieves some of that burden.

As a Team, we took the opportunity across the year to worship and share in social times together. Our annual Team All-Age service was at St George's and was enriched by the presence of the Brownies. Our Pentecost Praise Service was hugely uplifting, with a full St Matthew's welcoming Carolyn into the Team and we have shared other services too. We have enjoyed a pulpit swap and in the coming years will aim to do this twice a year so that each church sees someone from the other two churches at least once a year.

THIS Team Parish walks continue to introduce members from across the Team to one another while enjoying the fresh air and some local history. Thanks to Dave and Jackie Farris for organising these. We were also indebted to Dave and Jackie for being quizmasters at our Team Quiz Night in November at St Paul's which raised over £220 for KCAH.

Can I finish by thanking all the clergy and the many, many members of our three congregations who work so hard for the Lord in their church. We couldn't do it without you

CHRISTIAN AID



This year's Christian Aid week collection was £1,025.63 including gift aid. This continued the trend of reducing collections due to many factors; "no cold calling" rules, fewer collectors and householders

increasingly not wishing to give cash at the door. I really thank the St Paul's collectors. I had already stated that this would be my last year for organising Christian Aid and I notice that ALL of the current collectors were there on my first Christian Aid Week too. I'm sure they had even been doing it for eons before that ③. There have been many more collectors over the years that did so until they physically could do so no more.

Derek Chambers, in particular, has carried on the magnificent efforts that he & Sue used to do together, in collecting from all the 600 plus houses around the King's Centre. To put this into context, waiting for one householder to answer the door can take ages let alone 600 plus. Derek does this every year and the Guides (with Madeline) have faithfully delivered lots of leaflets every year for him to do this.

Over the years since 2003, in the years I have been organising, we have raised over £35,000 together. If you ever gave anything, came to one of our fun counting-up evenings, delivered envelopes or faced the daunting task of knocking on the doors I am so grateful. Our church members always gave very generously. If anyone takes on the organising, (no-one has yet but 'could it be you?') they may well end up following other local churches with alternative fund-raising for Christian Aid Week. Even our Christian Aid Week collections are only a fraction of the money given to needy people or causes by the people of St Paul's, with KCAH, Umoja Trust, World Vision, Children's Society just a few of the diverse causes we root for. In the years that I have been banging the Christian Aid drum I would also like to apologise for any occasions when I became a bit task-orientated. I hope that you know how much I appreciated your help.

When Paul caught up with the Apostles, he wrote in Galatians 2:10 "All they asked was that we should continue to remember the poor, the very thing I had been eager to do all along." May this be for us too.

CHURCHWARDENS

The only major work that was carried out in 2018 was the re-pointing of the south wall of the church during the summer. Our main focus through the year was the plans to replace the electrical wiring and lighting at St. Paul's. We concluded these plans with our designers, C.E.S. Ltd., in the autumn and had the Faculty (planning approval) granted by the Diocese at the end of the year. As you know, this coincided with a Gift Day on Advent Sunday, which together with previous fundraising efforts and an injection from our reserves, now means that most of the cost has been raised. Thanks to everyone for their generosity in making this a success.

We still have some more to money to raise, but the P.C.C. agreed in January that we should move ahead to complete the project, hopefully during the summer. Our plans to replace the audio and visual equipment will now form part of a separate Faculty application, once we have completed the current project and assessed our financial position.

Finally, our thanks to all who have helped with the maintenance and decoration of the church and the churchyard over the last year. It is wonderful that St. Paul's can rely on willing volunteers to keep our church and churchyard looking so beautiful, but more volunteers are always needed. This year we will probably need to do some redecorating after the rewiring is complete, whilst churchyard workdays are a certainty!

ELECTORAL ROLL

HOOK & SOUTHBOROUTH PARISH HALL



The Parish Hall is located 300 metres up the road from St Paul's Church. It is a large hall that is widely used during the week by many different groups within our community – Hook Pre-School, Pilates, Rainbows, Guides, Kumon, Line Dancing, Women's Institute, Tai Chi, Games Club and St Paul's

Players. At the weekends it is used mainly by families for children's parties and also for fundraising events by both St Paul's Church and other charities. We allow these charities to use the hall for free in our attempt to give something back to the community.

With regards to the upkeep of the hall, we re-invest the funds from the hire of the hall into maintaining and improving the facilities. In February we had to replace the heating system as it failed during the cold snow spell! The old boiler could not have failed at a worse time and we thank our users for their understanding during this period. We did purchase a number of electric radiators to assist in keeping the cold out. The cost for this was met by the savings in the hall accounts and should now secure this element for a number of years - in addition we have put in place an annual maintenance plan for the heating.

Kitchen works are still ongoing with the intention to install a larger cooker and a dishwasher to allow more varied functions to be held in the hall.

We have a programme of improvements lined up for future years which include:

- new front doors
- outside signage display
- replacing windows not already replaced
- new flooring (long term goal)

the list goes on..... If you have any ideas you would like us to consider, please let the Parish Hall Committee know.

The committee gives its time for free and we still urgently require help to spread the workload, so if you would like to come and join the Parish Hall Committee please contact: Ian Reid, Izzy Burton, Sue Russell or Steve Griffiths. We could also do with the help of a handy man to assist with the small jobs that we would pay for. As we are hiring out to external users, we have to keep the hall in good working order — can you help here or recommend anyone?

We plan to have a workday this year – date to be confirmed. We did not do this last year and we missed it!! Please attend if you are able - for the day or just an hour or two. It all helps no matter how small – it is a good day

SAFEGUARDING

SERVERS / SACRISTAN

Servers

Our small team of regular servers of just five have been kept busy with all of the various services that require serving support. Most of the time the majority of services have two servers on the rota to serve at Sunday Eucharist services, however the 10.30 all age communion services do currently only have one on the rota. These arrangements usually give sufficient serving opportunities to support not only clergy and congregation but also to serve each other. Each and every server on our team will of course first and foremost, serve Christ through our individual serving ministries, it matters not what our particular role is on the day, we're ALL equal.

Like most things in life, we are all constantly learning — even though this might just be one very small piece of information or learning, and yes this can and does come through serving when we encounter situations and experiences. A lot of the time these encounters and experiences take us completely by surprise, and a lot of the time we have to take a 'step back' in order to absorb what it is that's happening. Thereafter we need to respond in an appropriate way to support and care for each other in all of our actions.

It has been an interesting and varied year with different services to provide servers for, and I'm most grateful to all who have served this past year. This has not been just for the 'ordinary' services but also for those 'different' services when things have had to be 'worked out' beforehand in order for the service to run smoothly. Thank you all for your help and support, but also for your patience when things have been difficult.

I'm well aware that there have been many times during the year when I've been missing for one reason or another, and some of the services I've either had to pull out of at the last minute or even just failed to turn up. I'm grateful therefore to all of those who stepped in to help, sometimes at very short notice. I did really miss attending any of the Christmas services, but unfortunately personal commitments didn't allow for me to attend.

I'd like to thank my fellow servers, Claire, Bill, Susan and Jane for **all** of their hard work and support throughout the year.

Sacristan

As in previous years, I can report that sacristan activities have continued throughout the year. Most of these happen over the weekend, with minor tasks such as re-filling oil candles prior to Sunday. Sundays are of course the busiest times not only with getting everything ready prior to services, but also clearing things away afterwards. I'm most grateful for all of the help and assistance in changing altar frontals and other liturgical fabrics to the appropriate liturgical seasonal colour, but also at other times such as for Weddings and Funerals. During 'Ordinary Time' (all the Sundays during the season of TRINITY) last summer, the Green Altar frontal was left off the altar in order to reveal the beautiful wood carving on the altar itself. Therefore, TRINITY last year was far from 'ordinary'.

Chalice Training

Most of those involved in administering the Chalice at Eucharistic services have attended training, not only to show how to administer the Chalice but also to try and understand some of the reasons why we do it the way we do. Administering the Chalice is very much another way of 'Serving' and for those involved is an opportunity to serve those around us. It is always a privilege to do so and therefore we all need to carry out our Chalice ministry with reverence and meaning. There will be further training sessions in the near future, mainly to cover situations that have evolved since we last held training, but also to come and put some practical work together. Please can I therefore ask all current Chalice Assistants to look out for when training sessions are to take place - Thank You

TREASURER'S REPORT 2018

You will see from the accounts that we had a satisfactory surplus for 2018, largely due to the amazing response to the lighting appeal in December. This boosted our fund for replacing the electrics and lighting and hopefully the work will be underway in 2019. We have invested the major part of the amount raised so far, on which we should earn a small amount of interest. Repointing the church wall was a major expense during the year and coming up in 2019 there is important work to be done in our churchyard: We were recently charged a large amount for the repair of the heating system and we have also been asked to increase our Parish Pledge to the Diocese by 3%, bringing it up to £55,262.

The comfortable balances in our bank accounts are mostly designated for the lighting and rewiring, so for the upkeep of St Paul's we rely on the regular giving of church members and we need this to be a stable income. If you do not already give regularly, please consider doing so this year and if you pay Income Tax and are able to sign a Gift Aid Form, the church will gain an extra 25% at no extra cost to you.

The electrics and lighting fund box is in constant use and will remain at the back of the church for your donations. We are grateful to Marion Bone, for it was her idea to put it there.

WORSHIP AT ST PAULS

I wonder how often we notice the words from Psalm 122 that welcome us into Church each Sunday?

'I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord.' (Psalm 122V1)



It is a joy to gather together and to worship God, to declare his 'worth' and to meet with Him and with each other. And there is nothing that we do that is more important.

It is worth remembering that Jesus summarised 'all the law and the prophets' into two 'great' commandments: 'To love the Lord Your God ... and to love your neighbour as yourself.' (Matthew 22v37-40). The first of these (To love God) is fulfilled to a significant degree in our worship in Church each week.

Indeed, I remember some years ago, when I was a vicar in Milton Keynes, and the husband of a Church member said to me, "I leave going to Church to my wife." I responded by saying to him, "God deserves better than that." And he does. He is 'worth' more than that. Indeed, he is surely 'worth' at least one hour of our week. Isn't he? Let's be honest with ourselves, we find time every week for work, for TV, for leisure, for a social life; but all too often people fail to make time for God.

So, may I encourage you to make worship a higher priority in your life? May we come to Church more regularly, every Sunday if at all possible, and let's come with a hearts' desire to worship.

You know, I've had people say to me in previous churches, "But Luke ...I don't like these modern worship songs," or, "I don't like these old hymns,", or, "I find the sermons too long." It's as if we sometimes forget why we are there. We don't come to be entertained, do we? And we don't come to sing our favourite songs. We come because God deserves it; He is worthy of our praise.

So, whether you come to the 9am or the 10.30am on Sunday's, or to our weekly 10am Thursday Eucharist, let us make worship a priority in our lives.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF ST. PAUL'S HOOK

This report on the accounts of the Parochial Church Council for the year ended 31st December 2017, which are set out on pages two to six, is in respect of an examination carried out under the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 and S.145 of the Charities Act 2011.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES AND EXAMINERS

As the members of the Parochial Church Council you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts; you consider that the audit requirement of the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 and section 14(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the Act) do not apply and that an independent examination is needed.

It is our responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity commissioners section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to our attention.

BASIS OF INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

Our examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. That examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Parochial Church Council and a comparison of the accounts with those records. It also includes considering any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently we do not express an audit opinion on the view given by these accounts.
