TheRockinR values, ethics, and motivation are what we as parents experienced and witnessed, not just throughout Reece's nine-month battle with cancer, but with many other families, we met who also were being treated for various illnesses and conditions.

TheRockinR Mobile Gaming Units help promote social interaction between young patients, whilst offering a sense of normality and distraction. Many siblings, parents and friends can also interact through the power of interactive gaming. As a family we can attest to how other families feel when plunged into these situations.

Introduction to TheRockinR

TheRockinR Gaming Charity was founded in memory of Reece 'TheRockinR' Miree. Reece was just 11 years old when he sadly lost his life to a DIPG brain tumour. Throughout Reece's hospital stays and visits, we identified there were specific ways interactive gaming and technology could help children and young people

The charity aims to help minimise the effects of stress and anxiety experienced by children & young people receiving treatments and procedures in hospitals.

TheRockinR Charity was officially registered as a CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation) with the Charity Commission in England and Wales, Reg No. 1178420 on 17th May 2018. The charity then proceeded to further its areas of operation and registered with the Scottish Charity Regulator on 8th August 2019, Reg No. SC049525

The charity is based in Wakefield, West Yorkshire. Approximately 10 miles from Leeds City Centre.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

TheRockinR was registered with the Charity Commission on 17 May 2018. The charity is controlled by its governing document, the constitution of TheRockinR as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered with the Charities Commission.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees are responsible for the appointment of new trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

Organisational structure

There must be at least 3 charity trustees. Members of the CIO shall be the charity trustees. Trustees meet regularly to discuss the activities of the charities and agree on suitable policies.

The day to day running of the charity is delegated to Jonny Miree.

Induction and training of new trustees

Any new trustees will be provided with an induction on the aims of the charity and training dependent on their current skill set.

Related parties

There are no related parties to disclosure in the financial statements.

Risk management

The trustees examine the major risks that face the charity each financial period. The charity is still in its infancy and going forward will look to develop systems to monitor and control these risks to mitigate any impact they may have on the charity in the future.

Objectives and aims

Our Goal is to provide a least one Mobile Gaming Unit to every paediatric ward throughout the United Kingdom, providing interactive mobile gaming solutions, technology and equipment to sick children and young people in hospitals.

The short term aim is to provide a gaming unit to each of the 21 principal cancer units in the UK. In the long term the charity would like to provide a unit to every paediatric ward throughout the UK, as well as exploring other beneficiaries that may gain from the use of the gaming units.

Future Charitable Projects

TheRockinR continues to install Mobile Gaming Units to hospitals throughout the UK, both children and adults spending time in hospitals are now benefitting from the charitable work we do. Moving forward into 2020, we endeavour to maintain the quality and integrity of this charity, with new initiatives and larger projects planned, we aim to continue Reece's legacy.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Period from 17 May 2018 to 30 April 2019

1. General information

The charity is a registered charity in England and Wales and is a charitable incorporated organisation. The address of the principal office is 16 Sunnyhill Crescent, Wrenthorpe, Wakefield, West Yorkshire, WF2 0PR.

2. Charitable Incorporated Organisation

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation is a corporate body with limited liability, formed under Charity law and registered with the Charities Commission in England and Wales. The charity is governed by its governing document, its constitution and its trustees.

3. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

4. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Disclosure exemptions

The charity qualifies as a small charity as defined in SORP FRS 102 and as such advantage has been taken to not include a cash flow within the financial statements.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the period. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. Details of these judgements are set out in the accounting policies.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

4. Accounting policies (continued)

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Equipment

33% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost includes all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.
