### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JANUARY 2019

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 January 2019.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with Lady Garden Foundation's constitution dated 25 September 2013, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)".

#### Objectives and activities

The objects of the Foundation are to promote charitable causes which benefit women. The Trustees agreed that the first cause to be supported is the research work carried out by The Royal Marsden into gynaecological cancer. In September 2018 the charity's name was changed to The Lady Garden Foundation and this was duly registered with The Charities Commission.

At bi-monthly meetings the trustees agree broad strategy and areas of activity for the Foundation. This includes the consideration of grant making, reserves and risk management policies as well as performance and targets.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission General Guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting donation policies for future years.

#### Structure and governance

Under the terms of the Constitution the power of appointing new charity trustees lies with the current Trustees. New Trustees must be appointed by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity Trustees. On 12th February 2018, Jennifer Halpern Prince was appointed as a further Trustee and agreed to become Chairman of the Trustees. After 4 years of service Timothy Evans, Kate Percival and Bridget Barker resigned as Trustees. The new Trustees appointed during the year would like to thank them for the services to the Charity since its inception and raising a significant amount of funds for Gynaecological cancer.

New trustees were appointed as follows: John Butler Gwen Barry Jenniffer Emanuel

By a resolution, the Trustees resolved with effect from 1st April 2018, to devolve powers to Jennifer Halpern Prince. It was agreed that all expenditure should be approved by the Committee and that Ellacotts be appointed to take over bookkeeping services.

#### Achievements and performance

The Trustees are encouraged by the continuing success of the Foundation over its fifth accounting period. In particular there have been a number of events that raised funds during the accounting period which included:

- Fortnum & Mason Ladies Lunch in September 2018
   A fifth lunch was held, including an auction, which raised £105,469.
- 5K and 10K Fun Run in May 2018 LGF organised a fun run in Hyde Park for around 500 people with both men and women participating. It was very well supported and the event raised £87,368.
- Carols by Candlelight in December 2018
   An inaugural carol concert was held which raised £22,577.

#### Financial review

Reserves policy

The Foundation aims to maintain a minimum of £70,000 available reserves. At the accounting date the Foundation has sufficient reserves to meet this policy.

#### Funding to The Royal Marsden

During the accounting period the Foundation was able to donate a further £100,000 to The Royal Marsden Cancer Charity. This makes a total of £850,000 over the last five years.

#### Risk Management

The Trustees regularly review the major risks to which the Foundation is exposed and take steps to mitigate these risks, particularly in the area of financial management.

#### Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources are voluntary donations together with monies raised by the various fundraising events as set out in our achievements and performance. The Trustees are delighted that a number of programmes have been put in place to raise money and raise awareness of gynaecological cancer in the future.

#### Website and Branding

During the year the Foundation has worked further on establishing the website for Lady Garden Foundation. A new URL is in pace alongside revamped social media channels. The Foundation has invested in branding to produce new collateral.

#### Consultant and other support

During the accounting period, the Foundation employed one full time employee, Antonia Paterson as administrative assistant. Part time consultant support was also provided from Jen Burner and Emily McDonnell. Both consultants provided their service on a part pro bono rate. The Trustees are planning to maintain a similar structure for the next financial year and have budgeted accordingly.

#### Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of Lady Garden Foundation and of the incoming resources and application of resources of Lady Garden Foundation for that year.

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts; and
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping sufficient accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of Lady Garden Foundation and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the constitution. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of Lady Garden Foundation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

#### 1 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of Lady Garden Foundation's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The Trustees do not believe there to be any estimates or judgements which have significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities.

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102, the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015. Lady Garden Foundation is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of Lady Garden Foundation. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\pounds$ .

#### 2.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that Lady Garden Foundation has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

#### 2.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted general funds are funds that can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with the specific requirements set by the donor.

#### 2.4 Incoming resources

#### 2 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Grants/sponsorship/donations are recognised in incoming resources in the period in which they are receivable, except as follows:

- when donors specify that grants/donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- when donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the preconditions for use are met.

Donations of goods for resale are included in incoming resources at the sale value, once sold.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts is included in incoming resources when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

#### 2.5 Resources expended

Charitable expenditure in the form of donations payable is accounted for as and when approved by the Trustees. All other expenditure is included within the accounting period which it is incurred.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

#### 2.6 Cash and cash in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.
