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COUNCIL MEMBERS REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The Council members present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the PCC's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)"

Objectives and activities

St Mary and St Cuthbert's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has responsibility for co-operating with the incumbent, Revd David J Tully, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities of the Church Centre complex of the Parish Church of St Mary and St Cuthbert, Chester-le-Street. Correspondence may be addressed to the Church Office, Parish Centre, Church Chare, Chester-le-Street, Co Durham, DH3 3QB.

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and makes suggestions on how our services can improve the many groups that live within our parish. Our services can involve the many groups that live within our parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

The PCC is governed by the Church of England measures which comprise of 1) the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 as amended and 2) the Church Representation Rules (contained in schedule 3 to the Synodical Government Measure 1969 as amended).

When planning our activities for the year, the incumbent and the PCC have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. We have described some of the activities we have undertaken to fulfill our objectives below.

Achievements and performance

Our Parochial Church Council met six times through the year as usual.

The PCC have undergone training (using the CPAS *PCC Tonight* materials). We have had five 40minute sessions. It started in November 2017.

As usual we aim to give away 10% of the congregation's giving from the previous year and we have achieved that goal - to the agreed charities/mission agencies - local, national and international.

The PCC still hold to our Parish Values (agreed in January 2013):

- Reaching out with God's love
- Serving the people of Chester-le-Street
- Doing everything for Jesus.

The **priorities to develop** in the next few years, agreed by PCC in November 2017, slightly modified from the previous ones:

- Parish Centre improvement and developing our links through it
- Children's and Youth work development
- Faith sharing.

We received a new curate, a deacon - Rev Mark Harrison who joined the staff in July. He is here for 3 to 4 years. He is expected to be ordained priest in June 2019.

Our former non-stipendiary curate, Rev Danie Lindley left us in September. She went to be Priest in charge of Gateshead Fell and Windy Nook.

A team of mainly lay people continue to run "Open the Book" in our Church of England primary school, using the Bible Society's resources.

We did a number of HOPE events throughout 2017. The diocese had a 4 day mission entitled *Talking Jesus* with bishops and their teams from all over the north of England. Our deanery welcomed the Bishop of Sherwood, Tony Porter – a number of much appreciated events were held in our parish.

We ran two nurture courses through the year – Start and Moving On.

We continue to operate with other churches of the town – doing *Street Friends* – on the last Saturday evening of each month.

We began a termly Job Club in June, with an enthusiastic and committed team of lay people – using the training and materials produced by *Christians Against Poverty* – in our Parish Centre.

All the incumbent status clergy of the diocese have been asked to undergo *Missional Leadership for Growth* training, David did that through 2017. He decided that his project would be to seek to set up a monthly *Sweaty Church* on Sunday afternoons in 2018.

The Rector – Rev David Tully continued his chaplaincy of three local football clubs (under the auspices of the Northern League) – Chester-le-Street, Birtley Town and Durham City. He also represented Durham diocese in the Church of England's Northern Sports Ministry as the home of the Archbishop of York. Rev David then spoke to the Diocesan Synod about opportunities for sports mission and ministry in November.

We continued with our Marriage preparation sessions, which are offered to all the couples to be married in our church through the year. We conducted about 80 baptisms, about 30 weddings and about 140 funerals through the year - which involve a vast amount of contact with our local community.

Our PCC applied for a faculty (with the backing of the Diocesan Advisory Committee) to put screens on 4 pillars of the church to replace our current projection system. The chancellor of the diocese decided it needed to go to consistory court, which was held in February and adjourned and continued in July. His judgement was that most of the scheme could not go forward. It left the PCC with a bill of £5,300 for costs. Donations were made of £12,000 to cover those costs and pay for a different scheme to upgrade our projection system.

Our Church primary school had an OFSTED in December and was given a "Requires Improvement" assessment.

Church attendance

Our church attendance has declined slightly at most services through the year.

At the 2018 Annual meeting our Electoral Roll stood at 415, exactly the same figure as 2017. 21 had joined, but 16 had either died and 5 had moved away.

Financial review

The general, unrestricted income of the PCC in 2018 was \pounds 306,268 compared to unrestricted income in 2017 of \pounds 304,998. Income has remained consistent and there has been an increase in covenanted giving and collections.

The organ restoration fund balance stood at £6,727 at the year end. This is restricted towards the repairs and restoration of the organ, and much of the work was undertaken during the year.

As regards unrestricted expenditure, £102,000 Parish Share has been paid over during the year compared with £100,000 in 2017. Overall, the excess of ordinary unrestricted expenditure over income gave rise to a deficit for the year on unrestricted funds of £23,462 compared to a deficit of £27,915 in 2017.

Looking forward to 2018, the PCC's finances should follow the same pattern.

COUNCIL MEMBERS REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The policy of the PCC is to maintain a minimum cash reserve within its unrestricted funds of £10,000, to enable it to manage the church's normal expenditure requirements. Year end unrestricted bank balances total £64,265, well in excess of the £10,000 limit. Restricted funds are held until such time as expenditure arises for which they may be used in accordance with the restrictions placed upon their use.

Risk Factors

The Council members has assessed the major risks to which the PCC is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

In relation to the management of the major risks that have the potential to adversely affect the work of the church, these are considered by the relevant sub-committees and issues are raised at Council meetings where action is necessary. A formal policy for the protection of children and vunerable adults has been put in place by the PCC and, in accordance with its terms, the necessary DBS searches are made through diocesan channels.

The Parish Centre Management Committee is responsible for health and safety and maintenance issues within the Parish Centre.

The Standing Committee is responsible for the initial management on behalf of the PCC of financial risks. The same Committee also manages health and safety and maintenance issues within the church building and for compliance with the 5 yearly programme of inspection required of church buildings by the Church of England central authorities. The 5 yearly quinquennial survey was carried out in 2013 and therefore the next report is due in 2018.

Structure, governance and management

The PCC is governed by the Church of England measures which comprise of 1) the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 as amended and 2) the Church Representation Rules (contained in schedule 3 to the Synodical Government Measure 1969 as amended).

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE COUNCIL MEMBERS OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH OF ST MARY'S & ST CUTHBERT'S

I report to the Council members on my examination of the financial statements of The Parochial Church of St Mary's & St Cuthbert's (the PCC) for the year ended 31 December 2018.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the Council members of the PCC you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act).

I report in respect of my examination of the PCC's financial statements carried out under section 145 of the 2011 Act. In carrying out my examination I have followed all the applicable Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act.

Independent examiner's statement

Since the PCC's gross income exceeded £250,000 your examiner must be a member of a body listed in section 145 of the 2011 Act. I confirm that I am qualified to undertake the examination because I am a member of ICAEW, which is one of the listed bodies.

Your attention is drawn to the fact that the charity has prepared financial statements in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) in preference to the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice issued on 1 April 2005 which is referred to in the extant regulations but has now been withdrawn.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Parochial Church of St Mary's & St Cuthbert's is governed by the Church of England measures which comprise of 1) the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 as amended and 2) the Church Representation Rules (contained in schedule 3 to the Synodical Government Measure 1969 as amended)

1.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102, the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015. The PCC is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the PCC. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Council members have a reasonable expectation that the PCC has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Council members continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

General funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the PCC are also unrestricted.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the PCC.

The accounts include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body or those that are informal gatherings of church members.

1.4 Income recognition

Collections are recognised when received by the PCC.

Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received.

Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement, the amount due is quantifiable and its ultimate receipt by the PCC is reasonably certain.

Funds raised by the Autumn Fayre and similar events are accounted for gross.

Sales of books and magazines are accounted for gross.

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

1.5 Expenditure recognition

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred.

Fundraising costs comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes including the PCC's cafe.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the PCC in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the PCC.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs are analysed in the notes to the accounts as requested by the Trustees. This is a departure from the SORP which requires support costs to be allocated between the different activities engaged. The analysis in these accounts is thought to provide a more meaningful analysis to the readers of the accounts.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and benefice property is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 2011.

No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the church wardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure in the SOFA and seperately disclosed.

Other fixtures, fittings and equipment

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and machinery	15% reducing balance
Fixtures, fittings & equipment	15% reducing balance

Freehold land and buildings are retained for Church use. These are stated at cost and have not been depreciated due to their market value being considered to be higher than their carrying value.

1.7 Pensions

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1.8 Investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

All gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and their opening carrying value or their purchase value if acquired subsequent to the first day of the financial year. Unrealised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between the fair value at the year end and their carrying value. Realised and unrealised investment gains and losses are combined in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable.

1.9 Stock

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price.
