For the year ended 31 March 2019

It is with some regret that I have decided to resign as Chair of acta's Board of Trustees. However with lots of exciting opportunities ahead, I am looking forward very much to continuing to actively participate in the Council of Management, representing the local Bedminster community.

The acta programme never disappoints, this year once again involving all sorts of different people, who have in common that they do not normally access theatre, and that they are part of acta, bringing them together with other people to share their stories and experiences.

The Stories community theatre programme continues to astonish and delight audiences, whilst bringing new workers into the industry and delivering an exciting seminar series and CPD initiatives. The latter have demonstrated acta's ability to share the company's immense local, national and international experience with others working or aspiring to work in the community theatre field.

I am very pleased to say that the year has been significant for the increase in the scope of the youth theatre network, with the start of an innovative new programme for younger children in Lockleaze and North Bristol, supported by BBC Children in Need.

Our work with adults and older people has developed locally at the acta centre, with a range of exciting intergenerational theatre initiatives. In addition, the programme included a pertinent and timely revival of We Have Overcome by the Malcolm X Elders Theatre Company, a show which is by turns moving and hilarious, and succeeded in securing investment to tour further in the year ahead.

This report cannot be complete without a mention of the incredibly dedicated acta staff team: they truly are an amazing set of people! Fundraising and marketing in particular have become increasingly important and have been absorbed into an already busy daily workload.

Last but not least, the Company is proudly developing new international partnerships following the end of the REACT programme this year, a film of which is now available: https://www.acta-bristol.com/react/

I look forward to meeting new acta friends and partners, and hearing their stories too, over the next 12 months.

Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2019

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, submit their annual report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (effective from January 2015).

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee.

It is governed by memorandum and articles of association (September 1987), which provide details of the Council of Management and procedures for the Annual General Meeting, at which at least one third of trustees, those who have been longest in office, will be subject to retirement or rotation.

Public benefit

All of our work exists for the benefit of the public, to bring about positive change for individuals and community through promoting active, creative participation in theatre.

acta creates high quality, relevant theatre with vulnerable and socially isolated people from all generations and cultures through an open access and free creative programme which provides positive and enjoyable shared experiences, building friendships and a shared appreciation of common humanity.

Our core values are:-

Access and participation acta exists to provide access to participation in the arts for the most

marginalised and excluded sections of society;

Ownership acta is committed to co-creation of all artistic product, with participants

and professional facilitators sharing equal status;

Excellence Excellence in facilitation, in performance process, in co-production and in

the product;

Inclusiveness acta is committed to providing equality of opportunity to people without

privilege, engaging marginalised people and promoting intercultural and

intergenerational dialogue through theatre;

Partnership acta is committed to proactively developing collaborations and

partnerships within arts and wider sectors at local, national and

international levels; and

Valuing people acta is a caring organisation which listens to and supports vulnerable

people, valuing their stories, cultural heritage and life experiences and

enabling them to share these assets through making new theatre.

The Company's wide ranging participatory programme this year has delivered **547 workshops** with **518 vulnerable people** of all ages, as well as a series of quarterly seminars and practitioner CPD workshops.

The programme has enabled the creation and performance of 20 original new shows, producing 44 performances to a total theatre audience of close to 3,000 – two thirds of whom were not regular theatre-goers, and a third of whom had not seen an acta show before.

We continuously review our aims and objectives to ensure that our activities are developed in accordance with our stated charitable purposes. We have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit to review our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities:

Our aims and objectives

The memorandum and articles of association describe our objects as follows:-

- Instigate and supervise drama projects for youth and community groups;
- Provide all sections of society with the opportunity to participate in theatre;
- Supervise drama sessions with people who are encouraged to create and perform their own show;
- Identify (in conjunction with others if necessary) areas and communities in which theatre activities are lacking and to remedy deficiencies identified as a result;
- Design projects which emphasise the educational aspects of workshops and the personal and social development of individuals within a group;
- Supervise projects which are designed to assist community development.

Our purpose – strategic aims

acta believes that theatre is for everyone, and exists to promote opportunities to access theatre and the related arts.

The Company works to a diversity action plan with the following strategic aims:-

- acta workshops are open to everyone within the project target group;
- acta will make no charges to participants for workshops, and keep box office prices to a minimum, to ensure people are not prevented from participating for economic reasons;
- Workshop and performance venues are always welcoming, and accessible to the needs of the specific target group;
- acta will endeavour to provide transport to workshops for participants who may not otherwise be able to attend; and
- acta's artistic policy is to give all participants an equal opportunity to be involved in the project, with people encouraged to develop their own roles within the group. Project participants devise all acta shows, thus ensuring their relevance to the communities with which we are working.

Achievements and performance – a review of activities

We have welcomed new employees and community performers from diverse backgrounds this year, as we develop the theatre engagement programme supported by Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

The Company has also seen a significant development of our youth theatre network, as new funds were secured from Children in Need to secure a North Bristol programme for younger children, in addition to the youth theatre network supported by the Youth Investment Fund.

Our work with the Malcolm X Elders Theatre Company focused on a revival of their show, We Have Overcome, which had originally been produced in 2012.

Locally, the second Get Together programme of activities for isolated people of all ages was completed in the summer, with the end of Reaching Communities lottery funding, although the weekly adult groups from the programme all secured new small funds to enable them to continue.

Internationally, we completed the REACT programme and continue to build partnerships across Europe and beyond, despite the uncertain climate.

Stories

Stories, the adult community theatre programme supported by Paul Hamlyn Foundation, creates first job opportunities for people new to the sector, and in this year, Aqeel Abdulla and Maya Khatun completed their year of on the job training through the production of three new original shows in the summer term, each engaging refugees and BAME adults in making theatre for the first time. Working alongside experienced acta co-workers, they led a series of outreach projects and weekly community theatre groups, three of whom produced public performances of their own shows:-

- Lost Sheep from men supported by Ashley Housing;
- Motherland from women at Hannah More Primary; and
- The Woman Next Door from women in St Pauls.

A fourth original new show, Gainsborough Girls, was directed by Tracey Harvey and Jody Cook, who had completed their training a year earlier, and worked with a new group of adults in Lockleaze.

New learning posts began in September, and two new drama workers, Hiba Elhindi and Mohamed Hassan were recruited to deliver the programme for the academic year ahead. An outreach programme with a wide range of partners across Bristol communities took place through the Autumn term, before two new community theatre groups were confirmed in the Spring, meeting weekly in St Pauls and in Barton Hill, each working towards producing an original show at the acta theatre in the summer.

The programme also continued to offer weekly term-time CPD workshops throughout the year, including quarterly open access artistic workshops, attended by local practitioners taking part alongside facilitators from the acta core team.

Also with a view to sector development, quarterly seminars were developed further this year, to bring in key thinkers and exponents of community theatre to engage in sector-wide debate.

Youth theatre

The acta youth theatre network has developed through this second year of investment from the Youth Investment Fund (YIF), and with the addition of new Children in Need support for drama workshops with primary school aged children in Lockleaze.

The YIF programme continues to offer five youth theatres for young people aged 10 – 18 years: two in Lockleaze in North Bristol, two at the acta theatre in South Bristol, and a young carers youth theatre. Additionally, the young carers programme includes a series of intensive "play in 3 days" challenges, to engage new young carers in school holiday periods.

The young carer's youth theatre produced A Taste of Your Own Medicine at the acta theatre at the end of May. New young carers also took part in intensive theatre projects in July, October and February. Also in the summer term, the Lockleaze youth theatres presented a double-bill locally at Stoke Park Primary, which was transformed into a theatre space for family and friends to enjoy theatre shows on their doorstep: Eyes of the Future and The Reunion. At the end of term, Bedminster youth theatres presented their annual productions at the acta theatre: How to Survive School (kind of) and The Other Side.

Additional short projects with children and young people were also programmed in through the year, a play in a day project for children in Exeter, and an afterschool children's drama project at Hannah More Primary.

With the start of the new academic year, whilst the five youth theatres began work on new shows to perform in the spring and summer, the new Lockleaze project began for children aged 5 – 10 years, with another two new weekly drama groups, and a series of intensive school holiday projects in surrounding schools – at Glenfrome Primary in October and at Filton Avenue Primary in February.

Malcolm X Elders

The Elders developed a new version of their show, We Have Overcome, which they performed for local audiences at the acta theatre in February, before taking it back home to the Malcolm X Community Centre in St Pauls and touring to a new Gloucester community venue as part of the Strike a Light festival in March. The Company enjoyed standing ovations from delighted audiences for a series of sell-out performances.

Investment was secured to develop the show further over the year ahead, to include a tour to schools.

The Thursdays

Our ever popular Thursday morning theatre company produced a family show with an environmental message this year; Plastic Fantastic performed at the acta theatre in October. New members joined the Company through the year, and this diverse adult theatre company then devised a new show to perform as part of a double-bill at next year's summer Stories programme.

Phoenix

acta's young adults company continues to welcome new members and created another new show this year, The Underworld, which performed at the acta theatre in November. In the Spring term, weekly workshops focused on devising a new family show to perform in the acta theatre next December.

Making Time

Making Time supports lonely and isolated people out of their homes to socialise and take part in creative activities at the acta centre. At the beginning of the year, the group invited local school children to the acta theatre for productions of their show, Phoebe's Adventure. The company for this delightful show included performances from the volunteer team of acta participants who support their engagement each week, providing a hot meal and assisting with transport. Through the year, the company has engaged new members and continues to develop new stories and intergenerational workshops to share with local schoolchildren.

acta Company

This company of acta performers who come together to create high quality community theatre shows have produced two shows this year. At the beginning of the year, Ladies' Mile put a little known Bristol story on the stage for the first time. The whole company then came together to produce Circus of Marvels, the festive family show this year, which delivered a total of ten performances through December and January.

International

The Creative Europe refugee integration programme, REACT, was completed this year, with a film and book of the project published and disseminated over the summer, following on from the acta festival held at the end of last year.

EAR, a new Erasmus Plus partnership, began later in the year, with acta meeting new European partners at the kick off meeting in Athens in February. The EAR programme will focus on teacher training to support use of drama methodologies in the development of citizenship education in schools across Europe.

Financial review

The Company ends the year with a reduced balance sheet value, although general funds increased slightly, in accordance with the reserves policy.

The trustees continuously review their policy on free reserves, consulting Charity Commission guidance. The Company continues to aim to build up its free reserves to three months' normal operating costs, circa £100,000, although it recognises that this will be challenging to achieve in the current climate.

The Company accounts are reviewed by the trustees on a quarterly basis to ensure annual targets will be met, with the Treasurer attending quarterly finance subcommittee meetings with SMT prior to reporting back to the full Council of Management.

The trustees work closely with the Artistic Director to ensure that all possible areas of risk are considered in the management of the Company, and to develop all opportunities available. Each project is assessed before the charity makes a commitment to the work, and is then monitored on a monthly basis to ensure that any risks are minimised.

The Company continues to invest in fund-raising and to diversify its funding sources and activities, with a view to minimising the external risks to funding. The Company benefits from a clear fundraising strategy, and has secured funding from Arts Council England and Bristol City Council Culture until 2022, as well as from new charitable sources.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects, to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Volunteers

The Company works with over 500 participants each year, who volunteer their time as community performers and to take part in our workshops and events. Additionally, 35-50 volunteers each year assist with stewarding events and performances, assisting with refreshments, gardening and other volunteering opportunities. Staff members are all aware of our volunteer policy, and ensure volunteers are appropriately supervised, with an allocated key worker for each volunteer. We are grateful for all the efforts of our volunteers involved in service provision over the year.

Employee involvement and employment of disabled people

Employees have been consulted on issues of concern to them through weekly company meetings, and have been kept informed on specific matters directly by the senior management team, in addition to regular supervision meetings. There is regular communication between management members and employees, both through the senior management team and a system of staff reports to management.

The Artistic Director liaises with the trustees on the annual job review process for each employee.

The charity has implemented a number of detailed policies in relation to all aspects of personnel matters including:-

- Equality and diversity policy;
- Volunteer policy; and
- Health and safety policy.

In accordance with the charity's equality and diversity policy, the charity has long established fair employment practices in the recruitment, selection, retention and training of disabled people.

Full details of the business plan and policies are available from the actacentre.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the income and expenditure of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Independent examiners

Godfrey Wilson Limited were re-appointed as independent examiners to the charitable company during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

Independent examiner's report

I report to the trustees on my examination of the accounts of ACTA Community Theatre Ltd (the charitable company) for the year ended 31 March 2019, which are set out on pages 11 to 26.

Notes to the financial statements

1. Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

ACTA Community Theatre Ltd meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b) Going concern basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared on the assumption that the charity is able to continue as a going concern, which the trustees consider appropriate having regard to the current level of unrestricted reserves. There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

c) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from the government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

d) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

e) Funds accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

f) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

g) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity, including the costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements and any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on the following basis:

h) Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £500.

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

i) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

m) Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. There are no further liabilities other than that already recognised in the SOFA.
