THE SHIRLEY COMMUNITY CHAPLAINCY (North East)

ANNUAL REPORT 2018/2019

The Chaplaincy was founded in 2014, and the first two years of operations focused largely upon activities with men from HMP Northumberland, whom the Chaplain had known in his time as Chaplain there. In the last three years, the Chaplaincy's scope has broadened through referrals from existing members, Chaplains from other prisons and from other agents. The Chaplaincy is a member of the Community Chaplaincy Association.

Shirley is a client-centred organisation, and in 2018/19 this has been reflected in the wide-ranging nature of the Chaplain's activities, some individual-focused, some group-focused, some involving trips and activities in the region, some driven by particular clients' practical and spiritual needs. This can be seen at a glance by the pattern of the Chaplain's work in a typical week:

- Sunday church (Holy Spirit Crawcrook) with clients and meal out
- Monday in morning: Celebrating Recovery with clients and others at Elim Pentecostal church In evening: Prayer Meeting at Holy Spirit
- Tuesday Social meeting with clients in coffee shop, prison visits
- Wednesday in morning: Fellowship meeting with men at Holy Spirit In evening: Celebrating Recovery with clients and others in Tyne Valley
- Friday meetings with clients one-to-one, 'phone calls, emails, administration.

In addition, the Chaplain organises trips, visits and residentials for clients. Day outings have included fishing, meals, cinemas, football matches and a variety of church-based meetings. The Chaplain also makes time to speak as an advocate for clients in court and before parole boards, and this has been an increasing feature of his work this year: he has been to court five times in support of clients. He also works constructively with solicitors, the probation service, police, MAPPA (Multi Agency Public Protection) and hospitals. He has met seven men on release from prison and accompanied them to their accommodation, usually ensuring that they have suitable furnishings, an initial supply of appropriate food and social outlets. At any one time he is in close touch with about twenty clients, and his main concern is to enable them to integrate well with other people. A new departure this year has been contact with a female client, who is also offering her services as a volunteer, and Shirley looks forward to expanding its work with women and with families. The list of the Chaplain's activities in Appendix 1 below gives an overall view of the range and scale of his involvements.

The Chaplaincy offers support to the Chaplain and his work through its Board of Trustees, the Management Committee and the Pastoral Group. Following their decision last year to increase the Chaplain's salary, to match his working hours, the Trustees were again able this year to award a similar increase in salary, and they hope to continue this practice in subsequent years. The Trustees and Management Committee have focused this year on the Chaplain's Appraisal and a Business Plan, both of which have re-emphasised the need to locate suitable assistants to work alongside the Chaplain and alleviate some of the stress involved in outings and engagements with clients when the Chaplain is the lone worker. The Pastoral Group has continued to meet on a bi-monthly basis, to address with the Chaplain any issues which have arisen in the course of his work, particularly those connected with the wellbeing of clients and staff. All three bodies are acutely aware of the desirability of raising more money to sustain and extend the work of the Chaplaincy: the annual income of £25,000.00 allows for little more than half-time work, when salary and expenses are taken into account, and adding to the Chaplain's working hours and deployment of assistants have obvious cost implications.

A large part of the Chaplain's energy is focused on enabling the clients to develop the confidence to invite peers, friends and members of their families to Shirley events and other social activities, and there is evidence to illustrate the success of this aspect of the Chaplaincy's function. Shirley is committed to encouraging a network of mentors, mainly from among clients, and there is now a number of potential candidates. The Chaplaincies at HMP Northumberland, Durham, Moorlands, Doncaster, Kirkham, Rampton and Holme House are supportive of Shirley's work and allow good access for visits to clients who have been returned to prison. In the process, the Chaplain is sometimes introduced to potential new clients.

The Chaplain, Trustees and Management Committee have identified the following four challenges as priorities to be addressed in 2019-2020:

- 1. recognition of the value of working with ex-prisoners
- 2. the sensitivities involved in introducing clients to a local church and sustaining their participation
- 3. addressing clients' addictions and behavioural inconsistency
- 4. funding.

The Chaplaincy wants to record its gratitude to the vicar and congregations of Greenside, which includes Holy Spirit Crawcrook: they have made Shirley welcome in so many ways, and this year the Trustees had a very helpful meeting with the Chaplain and the Vicar of Greenside, Tom Brazier. The Chaplain is an elected member of the Greenside PCC and the West Gateshead Deanery Synod.

The Chaplaincy also thanks warmly:

- its volunteers, John, Mandy, Jane, Frank and Chris, for their behind-the-scenes and front-line work
- Gwen for providing a location, meals and love
- all who support the sponsored fund-raising events and the Chaplaincy in prayer, finance and other practical ways, among them All Saints Gosforth, Holy Trinity Jesmond, Elim Pentecostal church, St Mary's Ponteland, St John's Greenside, St Francis' High Heaton.
