Community Centre for Refugees from Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia Report of the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2019

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Chair's report

2018/19 has been a positive year for the Community Centre for Refugees from Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia (VLC), consolidating previous achievements and developing new community led activities at Centre 151, our base in Haggerston, in the London Borough of Hackney.

We continued to meet our mission of supporting our core service users from Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia whilst successfully developing and delivering a programme of health, wellbeing, arts and community activities, opening our Centre seven days a week.

Working closely with the Management Committee, Dam Van Huynh who was appointed as Secretary in 2016 with responsibility for the operation of the building, continues to create and deliver a strategic plan reinvigorating the Centre and offering a new vision for social inclusion based on the desire of the Vietnamese, Lao and Cambodian communities to give back to the host community in return for the support we have received over the last 30 years.

Major achievements in the year included:

- Completion of renovation of building-wide boiler/heating system
- Renovation of the kitchen and main entrance
- Completion of our new greenhouse/tea house
- Completion of Access Audit of the building
- Cultural and heritage projects with the aim of empowering the Vietnamese community
- Establishing a Centre 151 Gardening Club
- Development of main hall as a creative performance area.

We sustained our core programme for Vietnamese elders providing twice weekly Pho Lunch Club, Tai Chi, Health Talks and launched our Gardening Club - growing vegetables and herbs used in our kitchen and providing a taste of home. Our signposting service also continued helping people access local services.

We hosted three New Year celebrations - Vietnamese, Lao and Cambodian - and continued our Vietnamese language classes for younger service users. We are happy to have seen greater engagement from younger service users at Lunch Club and cultural events, which has brought a renewed energy and positive engagement across the generations.

Our community initiated heritage project Nhà = Home captured oral history, written documentation, film and images of our Vietnamese elders through their refugee experience from Vietnam to the UK. This project, like other activities delivered throughout the year, empowered our service users with pride in their story and culture. We have seen our elders grow in confidence and independence, being more socially interactive among themselves and with other visitors to our events.

Our presence online (www.centre151.com) has brought greater visibility and widened participation with more diverse communities. Our Open Day welcomed 350 visitors of all ages from diverse cultural backgrounds and community groups, to enjoy dance and music from several of the groups in our arts programme, exercise classes, massage, craft activities for children and Vietnamese food. Our monthly Massage Shala continues to grow in popularity.

Centre 151-VLC arts programme is driven by Van Huynh Company - a vibrant, cutting edge contemporary dance company with a growing national and international reputation. It has successfully delivered professional performances, movement workshops, creative events and community events promoting arts for all. With a stronger presence in Hackney and London's creative community, this year Centre 151-VLC supported 32 emerging artists, including 14 young Vietnamese practitioners with information, mentorship, and a place to develop and rehearse their work. As part of its residency within Centre 151, Van Huynh Company has created new works inspired by traditional Vietnamese cultural themes which have received awards and acclaim nationally and internationally. Centre 151 is fast becoming a dynamic arts hub.

Our staff team of Operation Manager Pierre Palluet, Project Manager Cam Tu Phan and Learning & Participation Manager Michelle Bynoe developed and delivered a strong and vibrant programme engaging existing service users and attracting new visitors to Centre 151. Our team is augmented by several volunteers supporting activities taking place throughout the year.

Objectives and aims

The trust's objects are the promotion of any charitable activities for the benefit of the refugees from Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia in particular the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and the provision of facilities for recreation and leisure. The trustees have considered the Charity Commision's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Significant events

The financial position of the charity at the end of the financial year is as detailed in the attached financial statements. The charity received funding from charitable sources totalling £61,218 (2018: £74,252) during the year. It is financially dependent on funding from these sources.

Reserves

It is the policy of the trust that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the trust's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The trust was established by a charitable constitution on 23 March 2003.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees and the officers, which also refer to as the Management Committee, within it are selected at each annual general meeting.

The Management Committee comprised of 11 members. 3 co-optees of which 1 member must be from Laotian and 1 from Cambodian Community. The Term of office of elected members is 2 years. Half of these members will be retired annually and be eligible for re-election. The Amendment of the Constitution in 1995 states not more than 3 Co-optees shall be co-opted by the Management Committee as non-executive members. They shall be entitled to vote at the meetings of the Management Committee and shall serve until the next general meeting after individual co-option. The Management Committee is a policy making body and shall meet not less than 4 times a year. The day-to-day affair is managed by a Standing Committee that includes Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer.

There were no related parties identified during the year.

The trustees has assessed the major risks to which the trust is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value and the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and the Charities Act 2011.

Community Centre for Refugees from Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Going concern

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the Charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended when there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure:

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, are stated at cost or valuation less depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:
