Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended March 31, 2019

Objectives and Aims

The primary mission of Sawiyan is to promote social inclusion for the public benefit among people who are migrants, refugees and asylum seekers who are socially excluded on the grounds of their social and economic position by providing :

- i) Education and training in the English language and in vocational skills
- ii) Social and recreational facilities and events involving the local community

Overview

During the year we have continued to develop and consolidate the identity and work of the charity. We have invested significantly into the development of the programme in particular working on the Theory of Change in order guide and direct the future goals of Sawiyan's work over the next 3 years towards social change.

Vision and Mission

Sawiyans vision (Sawiyan is working for togetherness) and mission statement (We create intentional spaces to grow connections between people from diverse communities) outlines what we do and how we do it.

Charitable Activities

Our activities in relation to the charity objects are as follows:

- Offer support, encouragement and sign post advice to increase community integration.
- Identify assets and needs of individuals and community and develop activities in response to increase social interaction and participation.
- Encourage creativity as a means to celebrate diversity and increase the visibility and understanding of migrants, refugees and asylum seekers culture.
- Partnership with organisations with similar objectives.

Performance and Impact

The community continues to see people migrate from across the globe. Over the past year Sawiyan has engaged directly with 65 local residents from varying migrant communities including those from Pakistan, Bangladesh, India, Somalia, China. There is consistent need for newly arrived residents to be supported to develop their English language skills. Many local groups offering English language are required to focus on female resident who have lived in the UK for 12 months due to funding criteria. However Sawiyan aims to fill in the gap offering support to all.

There are few safe community spaces for local residents in Sparkbrook to mix and grow positive relationships and their social capacity. Birmingham City Council's recent Community Cohesion

Strategy report 'asked what drives segregation?'. In reply, communities highlighted the lack of shared community spaces and services. Where community spaces do exist, they are often neglected or under resourced. Sawiyan seeks to stand in the gap and offer an intentional space needed.

"As an Asian woman I always feel a few steps behind everyone else like in opportunity and education. The best of my life I spent indoor. But now I feel confident to go out little bit by little bit. When I am home I feel depressed and worried. But then I come here and I can listen to other people and feel better."

Alongside the benefit of healthier inter-connected communities through increased interpersonal and language skills, the project is seeing an impact on the wider community as follows:

- Family Increase quality in family life and relationships participants supporting children with reading and homework
- Local community agencies partnerships with police, schools, health centres, community groups
- Economy and Employment networks- participants contribute as an extra resource providing economic investment and economic impact into the local community

We continued to work in partnership with Christ Church Sparkbrook where the group meets and with Faith Action for the license and delivery of the Creative English Programme. This year we formed new partnerships with local community arts organisations Secret City Arts working through the means of storytelling to promote awareness and celebrate the cultural heritage of the community, Near Neighbours promoting awareness for International Womens Day plus the local Wildlife Trust.

"We were asked to participate in the work of the local Wildlife Trust to give feedback on a new multilingual educational tool that they are piloting. This allowed the opportunity to experience one example of a way to be active and have their voices heard in the wider community. By completing a survey to express their individual ideas and opinions participants were able to make a valuable contribution towards the research of the local Wildlife Trust"

We continued to develop links with local community agencies to share links and sign post to and are in conversation with a local school for an explicit link.

We have 5 committed and enthusiastic volunteers who this past year have provided around 585 hours of donated support, with a value should we have to pay for it, of £4,802. We continue to encourage participants to continue on as volunteers with our beginners groups.
