Learning Disability England Limited The report of the trustees for the year ended 31st March 2019

Introduction

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2015.

Learning Disability England's History

Learning Disability England (LDE) is a registered charity (No. 1092587) and a company limited by guarantee (No. 4233275). It has been working in its present form since June 2016.

LDE was formed through the coming together of the Housing and Support Alliance and People First England. Until June 2016, the charity currently known as Learning Disability England operated as The Housing and Support Alliance (H&SA). LDE retains the membership of H&SA. In addition, Learning Disability England now has expanded membership for individuals, user led or selfadvocacy or family organisations.

Objectives and Activities

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, and have referred to and taken due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and consider the charity's activities are for the public benefit.

Learning Disability England's (LDE's) aims and objectives are outlined in our Memorandum and Articles of Association. All our activities aim to further these aims and objectives. These are: the relief of people who are disabled, handicapped (whether physically or mentally) or chronically sick people, their families and carers in particular through the provision of advice, counselling, workshops, training, and advocacy in respect of their housing care or support needs.

Objectives, aims and significant activities

The main activities undertaken to further LDE's purposes for the public benefit in 2018/2019 were structured around 5 key areas:

- Informing and supporting our members.
- 2. Represent their priorities to inform policy and change attitudes.
- 3. Supporting good practice and finding solutions together.
- 4. Campaigning and influencing on what matters to people with learning disabilities.
- 5. Learning and supporting partners through projects and research.

Examples of the actual work done include:

- Webinars, learning events and conference and e-newsletter information for people with learning disabilities, their families and organisations and individuals who support them.
- Blogs, reports or campaigns support on issues important to people with learning disabilities and the wider membership promoting open dialogue and transparency in how problems are dealt with;
- Gathering evidence and examples of good ways of working or solutions, for example in what good supported living looks like;
- Working with policy makers to ensure the needs of people with learning disabilities are met; Considered for example in the provision of mandatory training, changes to the Mental Capacity Act Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards; and
- Attendance at party political conferences and other MP lobby or policy events to ensure people with learning disabilities were represented and policy makers met.

We also provided:

- Support for the development of the NHS Long Term Plan ensuring LDE members and community representatives were able to contribute to the priorities;
- Support and assurance to the Transforming Care programme through the Transforming Care Stakeholder Roundtable;
- Contribution to the health and wellbeing voluntary and community sector alliance, 'Valuing People';
- Speakers for various conferences and media channels including developing a group of spokepeople who can represent; and
- Responses to calls for information or consultations where decisions were likely to affect the quality of live for people with learning disabilities.

Who benefits from our services?

Our membership comprises people with learning disabilities, their families and friends and organisations and others who support them. Benefit extends beyond our membership as many Learning Disability England people avail themselves of a broad range of resources via our website, and our campaigning influences policy for everyone with learning disabilities.

By end March 2019 we had over 700 members and a reach of approx. 11,000 people through the newsletter, social media and our direct work. The membership includes 580 individual members and 120 organisational or small group members.

The funding for our work primarily comes from membership fees. This is supplemented by donations and grant payments for commissioned work.

In our third year of operation, we have worked to give our members more direct influence our work and decision making.

We have:

- Responded to 8 consultations on behalf of our members and run 3 engagement projects including supporting self advocates and family members to inform research;
- Held 6 member webinars, run 15 member workshops and 3 training sessions plus being part of the Louder Voices project;
- Held the annual LDE Conference in Manchester, with 250+ attendees;
- Delivered 75 updates on policy, news, events, resources and research relevant to all members; and,
- Developed networks across the membership to increase the engagement and connection of people with learning disabilities including through the existing organisational involvement mechanisms.

Outcomes for members

LDE aspires to be an inclusive solution focused organisation from which members benefit by having a stronger and more unified voice in the learning Disability sector, and by having access to membership benefits. These benefits vary according to the membership type and fee paid and include information and advice, newsletters, members' days, the opportunity to comment on, and influence policy, free or reduced-price attendance at our national conference and in some cases consultancy. Members who wish to be active in campaigning or influencing are often able to gain a place at policy tables through us.

Empowerment

LDE's structure is designed to put considerable influence into the hands of Elected Representatives who work closely with The Board. Throughout our design and the work on our Articles of Association, we have been determined to ensure that people with learning disabilities play a leading part in the running of LDE.

Volunteers

LDE benefits from the active participation of the 21 volunteers involved in its governance as Representative Body members or Trustees. In addition, a group of 10 - 15 people from the membership regularly volunteer to represent Learning Disability England at policy or consultation working groups, through being spokespeople on formal or social media.

Achievements and Performance

The longer term impact of the charity's work

Learning Disability England recruited its first Chief Executive this year. She worked with the Representative Body and Trustees to review and clarify the key aims and change LDE wants to see. These are:

- Policy makers and providers hear, understand and respond to what people with Learning Disabilities and families say is important;
- Changed actions/behaviour from services, so that design and delivery builds on people's rights;
- That coproduction between self-advocates, families and services happens and makes a difference in people's lives; and
- The way LDE works reflects our own values and principles. We are developing ways of measuring the contribution LDE is making through all its work and indirect influence by modelling inclusive ways of working.

By supporting policy makers, individuals and organisations to recognise and demand best practice, LDE will make a lasting impact on the lives of people with learning disabilities.

Financial Review

The statement of Financial Activities for the year includes income of £220,188 (2018: £281,293).

The total funds carried forward are £57,156 (2018: £36,884). The Trustees have closely monitored financial performance and cash flow throughout the year and at every Board meeting. They have sought to diversify income streams, including successfully obtaining additional grant funding. A sustainability plan was developed and implemented from Autumn 2018. This included a restructure of the staff team as well as further grant funding applications and developing projects in partnership.

The trustees have agreed a policy of seeking to maintain 3 months running costs as reserves.

Future Plans

LDE's Representative Body led the development of the work priorities for 2018 - 2020.

After a consultation open to the whole membership the 4 core priorities for the work were agreed as:

- 1. Funding
- 2. Housing Choices
- 3. Making self-advocacy stronger
- 4. A vision for social care

A workplan was agreed by the Representative Body and Trustees in Spring 2019 to deliver work on these priorities alongside the sustainability and development already being implemented. The organisational priorities in that plan for 2018 - 2020 are:

- 1. Finance: to ensure financial stability and sustainability;
- Mission Vision and Values: to be clear about what LDE stands for, what we value and how we do business;
- 3. Membership: to be a credible representative body of membership group;
- 4. Staff and volunteers: To ensure the paid and voluntary roles are designed and supported to deliver the mission and priorities;
- Service Delivery and Development: To ensure members work and projects continue, and are delivered in ways which are flexible, responsive and balance quality with value for money;
- Partnerships and External Collaboration: To build upon and deepen our existing partnerships, and to improve the collective action and influence of people with learning disabilities and their families; and
- Communication: To excel in every way we communicate. Letting people know what we do, how we do it, the difference it makes, and they can help us achieve even more.

Structure Governance and Management Governing document and charity constitution

LDE was formed through the repurposing of the Housing and Support Alliance (H&SA).

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 12th June 2001, amended by special resolution on 28th May 2012, and registered as a charity on 24th June 2002. The organisation changed name on 14th June 2016.

The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company, which is governed under its Articles of Association.

LDE's Articles were reviewed and revised in 2016/2017.

Organisational structure and decision making

The charity is managed by a Board of Directors who are also Trustees. All trustees are members of the charity.

The Board of Trustees hold the overall responsibility for governing the charity but do that is consultation and partnership with the Representative Body, elected by the membership. LDE has a registered small office base in Faversham. Most of LDE's staff work from home. LDE maintains a cost-effective staff structure which aims to provide adequate resources to meet the needs of our members.

Since July 2018 the first Chief Executive has been in post. The Chief Executive reports to the Trustees of the charitable company who meet at least quarterly. The Board focuses on strategic decision making and delegates the day to day management to the Chief Executive Officer. The CEO collaborates with the Co Chairs of the Representative body and Chair of the Board on decisions affected by organisational policy or strategy and consultation with the wider governance group.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

In line with our approach to democratic involvement the Representative Body lead the appointment of Trustees on behalf of the membership. In August 2018 the Representative body started a public recruitment process for 6 new Trustees to join the board by summer 2019. The recruitment was done based on a role description and skills and criteria developed by the Representative Body and Trustees working together. Six Trustees were recruited after interviews and other checks. In January 2019 4 new people joined the Board with another 2 joining by July 2019.

Induction and training of new trustees

The new Trustees received a full induction including meetings with longer standing Trustees, and the CEO with written and electronic information shared on the organisation, the legal responsibilities and current or recent organisation plans and activities. Now the Board has 6 new members in place they are doing a skills audit to inform the next phase of renewal and priorities for future recruitment with the Representative Body.

Related Parties

Trustees are employed by member organisations which are documented. All trustees give their time freely and no trustee received remuneration in the year. Details of directors' expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in the notes to the accounts

Risk management

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- a regular review of the risks the charitable company may face;
- the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks;and,
- implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charitable company should those risks materialise.

The Risk Register identified

- a reduction of membership levels and resulting financial difficulties, and;
- lack of capacity within a small staff team resulting in an inability to perform all needed functions as key risks.

The Risk Register identified the effect of changes in Government/LA funding priorities due to austerity and the impact on organisational membership in particular.

The impact of the current economic and political changes is regularly reviewed by the Board to provide a robust response to ensure long term survival of the organisation. A key element in the management of financial risk is the regular review by trustees of the financial position.

Independent Examiner' Report to the Trustees of Learning Disability England

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulative depreciation and any accumulative impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Plant & equipment

over 4 years

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the transaction price).

Debtors

Debtors are measured at their recoverable amount at the balance sheet date.

Income

All income is recognised in the statement of financial activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants awarded are included in the statement of financial activities when approved by the trustees and agreed with the recipient. The value of grants unpaid at the year end is accrued. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted general funds may be used in accordance with the charity's objects at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are amounts set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for a particular restricted purpose.
