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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

Chair's Report

The twelve months to 31 March 2019 began a matter of weeks after OYAP Trust's administration moved into its temporary home in the old St Edburg's School, since renamed Studi02. The year was characterised by consolidating the trust's core activities at the new centre together with attracting other users to the building. Although the statutory accounts show a small deficit for the year the charity's finances continue to be well managed. Expenditure is closely controlled, and every opportunity taken to increase income through hire of spaces in the centre.

While not falling within the strict definition of the financial year two major successes are worthy of mention as they illustrate the charity's rising reputation at national and local level. In the Spring, Helen Le Brocq, OYAP's Director, received a High Sheriff of Oxfordshire's Award in recognition of the trust's work and in the summer OYAP Trust was granted the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. Both honours are a tribute to the Trust's team, the arts professionals who work with OYAP, and the small army of volunteers who, over twenty years, have harnessed the creative arts to enhance the lives and life chances of many of the county's most vulnerable children and young people. There has never been a greater need for the specialised approach developed by OYAP Trust and the trustees are pledged to use this prestigious recognition as the springboard for future development.

On behalf of the trustees I would like to record our thanks to the management team and on a personal note I would like to record my personal thanks and appreciation for their continued commitment to my fellow trustees.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Summary of the objects of the charity as set out in its governing document:

The charity has been established to advance the education of the public, with particular emphasis on young people, in the field of creative arts, such benefit to be provided principally in Oxfordshire; and/or such other charitable purposes beneficial to the community consistent with the object above as the Trustees shall, in their absolute discretion, determine.

Public benefit that is provided by the charity:

In setting our objectives and planning our activities, the trustees' have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. The charity's objectives were achieved through the provision of the following activities for public benefit:

- To further the advancement of education of young people through participation in the arts;
- To develop the skills, confidence and self-esteem of young people;
- To enable vulnerable young people to access mainstream education, arts and training opportunities;
- To promote and develop the diversity of young people's cultures;
- To contribute to establishing Oxfordshire as a centre of excellence for youth arts development and provision;
- To generate resources for youth arts development and provision in Oxfordshire.

The charity's aims including the changes or differences it seeks to make through its activities:

The aims and objectives of the charity have, as usual, been achieved through a series of arts- and culture-based projects working with disadvantaged young people. All these activities are directly related to the Charitable Objects; that is to advance the education of the public, with particular emphasis on young people, in the field of creative arts, principally in Oxfordshire.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Achievements and performance

In 2018/2019 OYAP has strived to increase the sustainability of our Youth Action Teams, Kick Arts, and weekly after school activities, the core elements of its programme. As previously, the funding climate is tough, but our efforts in advocating to the local authorities for the need for the work OYAP is uniquely able to deliver in Bicester has successfully secured three year support from both district and town councils.

We have been successful in securing two year funding from Arts Council England for an organisational development project called Growth for Change. This will enable us to examine, challenge and improve our governance, staff team, policies and procedures to ensure OYAP is fit for purpose and can work effectively with new partnerships and in our new home. It also allows us to extend and develop our expertise in partnership working to bring new creative opportunities to Bicester.

We have now been in Studi02, our new home, for just over a year. Our efforts to make this a vibrant centre for the arts locally are beginning to pay off, allowing our own programme to co-exist with local artists and community groups. With a small amount of funding and a lot of good will we have created a studio theatre space for our young people and the local community, and have been able to generate additional income from the venue itself.

Training Delivery:

OYAP continues to deliver mentor training for arts and corporate organisations across the country. Helen Le Brocq, Director, sits on the South East Bridge Development Organisation Advisory Committee. Helen is commissioned to deliver training on behalf of Artswork and in partnership with them for the delivery of OYAP Trust mentor training. This year Helen has also developed and delivered an ongoing training programme for The University of the Arts, London. OYAP Trust has been the Support and Guidance Agency for the Arts Award in the South East since April 2012, has been commissioned again for 2018/19 and is a registered training agency for Arts Award Adviser Training in Oxfordshire.

The contribution of volunteers:

Through our Youth Action Teams and by building links with the community, we have benefited from volunteer support on some of our projects and in kind services. Many of our projects are significantly enhanced by this contribution.

The charity's grant making policies:

OYAP Trust does not make grants but has on occasion been able to offer subsidised or free project places to those who would otherwise be unable to attend.

The financial statements have been prepared implementing the FRS102 Revision of the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued by the Charity Commission for England and Wales and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102(1a). The trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been satisfactory.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net incoming resources for the year of £5,277 (2018 net outgoing resources £31,996).

There were no unrealised losses or revaluation of investments in either the current or previous years.

The total reserves at the year end stand at £99,395 (2018 - £94,118). Free unrestricted liquid reserves amount to £51,154 (2018 - £51,673).

FUTURE PLANS

In 2019/20 we will:

- Continue to develop strategic relationships to make best use of Studi02 and work with local stakeholders to secure a permanent home for cultural activities in Bicester.
- Use our ACE funded Growth for Change project to ensure the organisational structures, staff, policies and procedures are fit for purpose.
- Develop partnerships to create new opportunities for young people in Bicester.
- Seek continued funding to deliver our work with vulnerable young people, particularly through our Kick Arts programmes, aspiring to secure longer term funds.
- Continue our work with the local authority as a key partner in the development and provision of a cultural strategy for Bicester.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

INCOMING RESOURCES

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Equipment

- 25% on cost

TAXATION

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

FUND ACCOUNTING

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

PENSION COSTS AND OTHER POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

The OYAP Trust is a company Limited by Guarantee, not having a share capital. The members undertake to contribute a sum, not exceeding £1 each, to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up.
