Trustees' annual report

for the year ended 31st March 2019

The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2019. Included within the trustees' report is the directors' report as required by company law.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

Objects

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS is established for charitable purposes only, in particular Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS is established:

- To relieve the mental and physical distress of women survivors of rape and sexual assault
- To promote education and research in the Bradford area into the subject of rape and sexual assault and its effects on women and girls, whether they be medical, social and/or psychological.

Activities undertaken for public benefit in relation to objects

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Our objectives are achieved through the provision of specialist sexual violence support services for women and girls from a confidential office-base in Bradford and a variety of outreach locations:

Helpline: a woman who will listen, provide emotional support and useful information.

Telephone: 01274 308270 Text only: 07435 752 975 Email: contactus@brcg.org.uk

Counselling & art therapy: free and confidential with no pre-set limits on the number of sessions, delivered at our Rape Crisis Centre and Bevan Healthcare.

Advocacy & Support: ISVA service providing support throughout the criminal justice system and a specialist service for refugee & asylum seeking women who have experienced sexual violence.

Jyoti services: specialist services for Black, Asian & Minority Ethnic (BAME) women and girls delivered by BAME women including assessments, counselling, Helpline and shared support groups.

Shared support groups: on-going informal support groups building resilience and mutual support.

Young Women & Girls Groups: For young women & girls aged 14-18 years old who are at risk of further exploitation, violence and abuse.

Mindfulness: regular courses.

Outreach to schools: one to one emotional support sessions for young women and girls in schools.

Survivors Voice & engagement – supporting women and girls who have experienced sexual violence to have a voice & influence

Sexual Violence Prevention – delivering sexual violence prevention workshops (SELFIE) in schools and running events, activities, workshops and groups in the wider community.

Training offered:

- a) Working with female survivors of sexual violence.
- b) Working with BAME women and girl survivors of sexual violence including Sexual violence awareness workshops by and for BAME women
- c) Impact of Child Sexual Abuse
- d) Working with Refugee and Asylum Seeking women survivors of sexual abuse

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS works at a strategic level to improve the response to women and girl survivors of sexual violence locally, regionally and nationally.

All services are free.

Achievements and performance

The charity's main activities and who it tries to help are described below. All its charitable activities focus on supporting women and girl survivors of sexual violence and are undertaken to further Bradford Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Survivors Service's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Telephone & text Help line

The Help line is often the first contact point for a woman or girl survivor who may also wish to access other services offered by Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS. Women, girls and staff in agencies can contact us by phone, text or email. Live Help line sessions are provided across the week Monday to Friday in a mix of mornings afternoons and evenings. Two afternoons a week are dedicated to BAME women and girl survivors and those Jyoti help line sessions are staffed by BAME women. The Help line team consists of experienced staff employed by Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS. The help line supports women and girls who have been effected by sexual violence at any time in their lives including adult women survivors of child sexual abuse who are dealing with the long term impact of repeated rapes, violence and abuse, women who were raped as adults in the past and are needing support now and women and girls who have recently been raped and may want to access our ISVA service. Workers in a wide range of statutory and voluntary & community sector services contact the Help line to discuss and make referrals to our services. Some of the survivors who use the help line are dealing with the severe impact the sexual violence has had on their mental health. From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 the help line worked with 507 survivors and there were 5,266 help line contacts with survivors and agencies.

Referrals Team

The team provides assessments and support into our services. Urgent and immediate needs are responded to and where appropriate women and girls are signposted or referred to other agencies for additional support. BAME women and girls are offered the choice of a BAME counsellor to provide the assessment. From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 the referral team provided 368 assessments for 274 women and girls.

Ongoing face to face support services

From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 516 women and girl survivors had support from counselling, therapy, emotional support and advocacy services. 167 women and girls accessed the counselling, therapy and outreach to schools services, 121 women and girls accessed advocacy and support services and 98 women and girls accessed group work.

Counselling, Art Therapy and Outreach to Schools Services

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS provides counselling and therapy at our Rape Crisis Centre including a dedicated Jyoti counselling service for BAME women and girls by BAME counsellors. We provided a counselling service specifically for refugee, asylum seeking and trafficked women at Bevan Healthcare GP practice. We also provided one to one emotional support sessions at schools by qualified counsellors for girls and young women who the school safeguarding teams are aware of. Typically these girls and young women cannot travel to the city centre after school and maybe only contactable via the school Safequarding lead. During this year our Art Therapist moved from Bradford and we did not have the financial resources to replace her. All counsellors and Art therapists employed by Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS are qualified to diploma level or above, have completed specialist sexual violence training and have monthly external and in-house clinical supervision including group supervision. Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS works within BACP's Guidelines and Ethical Framework. BAME women and girl survivors are offered counselling with a BAME counsellor. We provide women & girls centred counselling, therapy and emotional support that is an empowering and non-pathologising alternative to statutory services. We aim to support women and girls to gain more control over their lives. We provide crisis, short, medium and long term support and pre-trial therapy on the basis of what a woman or girl needs. The impact of sexual violence on women and girl's lives is pervasive, sometimes overwhelming and often insidious. We work with survivors on any issue they choose, regardless of when the abuse occurred. From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 the counselling, art therapy and outreach to schools services provided 2,698 sessions for 167 women and girls.

Advocacy and Support Services

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS provides Independent Sexual Violence Advisors (ISVA) Service and Refugee, Asylum seeking & trafficked women (RASTW) Advocacy & Support Service as well as advocacy for women and girls when needed in our other services. ISVAs are survivor-focused advocates who work with victims of serious sexual crimes to enable them to access the support and services they need in the aftermath of the abuse they have experienced and throughout the criminal justice process from the reporting stage right through to court and applying for criminal injuries compensation. Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS provides a dedicated advocacy & support service and shared support group for refugee, asylum seeking & trafficked women (RASTW) survivors of rape, sexual exploitation and abuse. The aim of the service is to enable women to achieve safety by gaining Leave to Remain in the UK and increase their resilience in order to cope with the years of uncertainty and negative decisions and judgements by the Home Office that attack their credibility and do not acknowledge their traumatic experiences. From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 the ISVA service provided 3,777 contacts with survivors and agencies and the RASTW Advocacy & Support service provided 2,838 contacts for 167 women and girls. This included face to face sessions, telephone & text support, accompanying to appointments, support at court, support letters and emails & telephone calls with agencies.

Group Work

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS provides two Shared Support Groups one for Refugee, Asylum Seeking and Trafficked women and a Jyoti shared support groups for Punjabi and Urdu speaking BAME women where women can speak in their first language. Shared Support groups are ongoing drop-in groups that help women build mutual support and resilience. Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS also provides two after school Girls Groups for girls and young women survivors who are vulnerable to further exploitation and abuse. The Girls Groups run the length of a school year. In addition regular Mindfulness courses are run that have been especially adapted to be suitable for female survivors of sexual violence. From 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019 98 women and girls attended groups run by BRC&SASS.

Sexual Violence Prevention and Supporting survivors to have a voice & influence

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS provided sexual violence prevention workshops in 5 schools working with 1,276 young people. During Safeguarding week we organised a joint event with White Ribbon campaign and Sharing Voices on Working proactively with men to prevent sexual violence. We took 57 women and young women to Million Women Rise march against male violence against women and girls in London, mainly survivors of violence and abuse. The Bradford Rape Crisis Facebook page continued to raise awareness about sexual violence and publicise how people can be involved in combating rape and sexual abuse.

Beneficiaries of our services

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS supported 588 women and girl survivors in this financial year. 73 were supported solely by the help line service. The Help line assisted 3 male survivors to get support and 516 women and girls received face to face support services.

Financial review

Funding from the 31st March 2019 for the next financial year is in place. The Local Authority, Clinical Commissioning Groups, West Yorkshire Police & Crime Commissioner, Ministry of Justice and Lloyds Bank Foundation Trust continue to fund the direct service delivery. Also in place is a small Community Tampon Tax grant via Two Ridings Community Trust for Mindfulness and a grant from Rape Crisis England & Wales through the Weaving the Web project for work supporting referrals. We continue to be funded by Comic Relief's Sustainability Grant to develop an unrestricted income project and a Digital Transformation Grant from Rape Crisis England & Wales. A Local Authority grant ceased on 30th September 2019 as this money was put into the tender for Specialist Domestic & Sexual violence Services. The tender model was based on a response to domestic violence. The competitive tendering worked against a broader partnership between domestic and sexual violence services. Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS was not part of the winning consortium for this tender. However, our funding from the CCGs has increased. A different local Authority grant of twelve months from the Controlling Migration Fund is funding sexual violence prevention work in schools until 31st December 2019. The Trustees receive regular financial management reports and funding reports and will make decisions about service levels based on the actual and forecast income and expenditure.

At the end of March 2019, the total charity funds were £240,593. £73,313 of which were restricted funds brought forward.

Reserves policy

Reserves are held to cover:

- a. Employment related legal responsibilities such as pensions, redundancy, sickness and maternity
- b. Salaries & running costs should there be a gap in funding for existing staff and services
- c. Underwriting costs where grants, commissions or contracts are paid in arrears
- d. Underwriting running costs & salaries in the 1st quarter of the financial year due to late confirmation of funding
- e. Costs related to developing services to meet the needs of women & girl survivors
- f. Investing in the financial resilience of the organisation
- g. Costs related to delivering against BRC&SASS Aims & Objectives should other funding not be available.
- h. Winding down costs & legal liabilities should the organisation be unsustainable

This policy and the level of reserves has been reviewed in accordance with a risk assessment. Trustees agreed that in 2019/20 £133,949 for employment related legal responsibilities such as pensions, redundancy, sickness and maternity is required to be held. Demands on reserves will be considered on a case by case basis according to the reserves policy. Should the organisation lose 20% of funding at any one time £78,272 would be required over 9 months (on the basis of £100% in Q1, 25% Q2 & Q3) whilst replacement funding was sort.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a company limited by guarantee, first registered on 16th November 2001 number 04323961 and registered as a charity on 24th April 2002 number 1091732. It took over the assets, liabilities and undertakings of Bradford Rape Crisis Group, an unincorporated charity established in 1982 on 4th April 2002.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31st March 2019 was 5 (2018:5). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 7 to the accounts.

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS aims to recruit Trustees who have experience of working with women and girl survivors of rape and sexual abuse, experience of the voluntary sector and who have relevant management skills to offer. Trustees are appointed by Members of the organisation at the AGM and by existing members of the Trustees at Trustee meetings. One third of Trustees must retire at each AGM, those longest in office retiring first. Membership of the organisation is open to any volunteer who is interested in promoting the objects of the Charity, has been supporting the organisation through voluntary work for more than three months, applies to the Charity in the form required by the Trustees and is approved by the Trustees. New Trustees are given an induction pack and offered relevant training opportunities as they arise e.g. Bradford CVS training programme.

Trustees are Trustees of the Charity, Directors of the Company and Members of the organisation. They meet 8-10 times a year; working groups are established when necessary.

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS is a member of Rape Crisis England & Wales and has been validated as achieving the RCEW National Service Standards. Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS is also an organisational member of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP).

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS has activated a Trading Arm, Daizybell LTD, in order to generate our own unrestricted income and be less reliant on public bodies commissioning and grant funding which is subject to changes in the political environment.

Bradford Rape Crisis & SASS formed the West Yorkshire Sexual Violence Action Partnership (WYSVAP) with other specialist sexual violence organisations in West Yorkshire. In order to provide a partnership approach to supporting survivors/victims of sexual violence, that is strategically-led, transparent and accountable, offering sustainable and consistent services that are evidence-informed in relation to equity, need, accessibility and cost effectiveness, and that is well publicised to survivors/victims, person-centred and strives to meet the needs of all victims. The Partnership is a vehicle for:

- 1. Co-operative working between members to improve service-provision for survivors/victims of sexual violence and to work towards the elimination of sexual violence in all its forms.
- 2. Enabling member organisations to submit joint funding bids and contract for tenders that further their own objectives and to which they can contribute effectively
- 3. Innovations and synergy in service effectiveness and development

- 4. Supporting the ongoing operation and development of member organisations
- 5. Enabling the effective use of resources

Risk management

Trustees receive a risk reports in relation to finances, funding, staffing and service delivery at each Trustee meeting. Trustees conduct an annual risk review in addition to a rolling review of risk. Risks identified include:

- The PCC's review of sexual violence support services for W Yorkshire leads to reduction or loss of funding.
- The outcome of the tender for Bradford District Specialist Domestic & Sexual Violence Services gives legitimacy to non-specialist organisations saying they can deliver in our sector.
- NHS funding and transition to accountable care organisations require building relationships and working with new criteria/ new structures that may not fit with BRC&SASS values and approach.
- Competitive tendering creates division rather than collaboration between VCS organisations.
- Competitive tendering favours generic services that say they can deliver to 'everyone' rather than specialist single sex services designed to meet the needs of survivors of violence and abuse.
- Lack of medium to longer term funding creates uncertainty and instability in the staff team

Independent examiner's report

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Bradford Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Survivors Service meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

There are no key judgments which the trustees have made which have a significant effect on the accounts. However, judgments that have been made are described in the financial review of the Trustees' report.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

c Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of a provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019 (continued)

d Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised; refer to the trustees' annual report for more information about their contribution.

e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of services undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

h Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charity's programmes and activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities. The bases on which support costs have been allocated are set out in note 7.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019 (continued)

i Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £200 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

j Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

k Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

I Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

m Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

n Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join a defined contribution 'money purchase' scheme. The charity's contribution is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 9. There were no outstanding contributions at the year end. The costs of the defined contribution scheme are included within support and governance costs and allocated to the funds of the charity using the methodology set out in note 7.

In this financial year the workplace nominated pension scheme was the people's pension for the whole financial year. The plan invests the contributions made by the employee and employer in an investment fund to build up over the term of the plan a pension fund which is then converted into a pension upon the employee's normal retirement year age when eligible for a state pension. The total expense ratio of the plan is 1.5% and this is deducted from the investment fund annually. The trust has no liability beyond making its contributions and paying across the deductions for the employee's contributions

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.
