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Board of Trustees Report

For the year ended 31 March 2019

The trustees present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities Act 2011 and 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102)' (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Charitable objectives and activities

London Friend has been at the forefront of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGB&T) activism and service provision since the early 1970's – we celebrated our 45th birthday in 2017. London Friend is a vibrant LGB&T health and well-being charity with a wide portfolio of well-established services and a range of newer initiatives aimed at meeting the needs of the LGB&T community.

London Friend exists to improve the health and well-being of people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender, or in doubt about their sexual orientation or gender identity. Where necessary, support is also provided to families and friends of LGB&T people.

London Friend works to provide services to LGB&T people where those provided by mainstream services do not appropriately meet the needs of LGB&T people, for whatever reason.

The charity currently provides a helpline, one-to-one and group counselling, peer support groups, social groups and activities, drug and alcohol support and advice, training and consultancy, referral to other services and a range of other ad hoc support services.

The service also contracted the services of a finance office.

London Friend has a policy of engaging LGB&T volunteers in the delivery of its services to clients, and it is dependent on the support of these volunteers for the running of the organisation. During the course of the year 112 people volunteered time with the organisation in structured volunteering roles, including counsellors, Antidote key workers, group facilitators, clinical supervisors, trustees, and administrative support. 157 people gave their time to support our presence at Pride in London.

All the volunteers received a full induction, together with specific training relating to their area of work. The counsellors received fortnightly clinical supervision.

Public benefit

The charitable objectives and activities, and achievement sections of this report clearly set out the activities which London Friend undertakes for the public benefit.

Significant achievements within the year

2018/19 saw London Friend continue to deliver its services supported by existing and new funders. We continued existing partnerships and developed new ones, and played a strategic role working as a member of the National LGB&T Partnership.

Some of the significant achievements within the year included:

- Income for the year was £344,397. This included funding from the Henry Smith Charity, The Leathersellers Chartable Fund, HIV Prevention England, The National LGB&T Partnership, SASH Partnership, London LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership, RISE Partnership, the Drug and Alcohol Relief Fund, Help Refugees, the Government Equalities Office and the Tampon Tax Community Fund.
- 2. We continued to deliver alcohol and drug support for LGBT people via our Antidote service. This service remains the main drug and alcohol service in the UK specifically run by and for LGBT people. Our expertise is this area has been shared through training and presentations at various conferences.
- 3. We continued to run SWAP the Structured Weekend Antidote Programme piloted in summer 2014. In total 15 programmes have been delivered up to the end of March 2019.
- 4. We continued to provide services as a member of the LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership as a counselling provider. Our part time paid counselling role was shared between two members of staff from May 2017.

- 5. 2018/19 was our third year as a member of the RISE HIV and sexual health partnership delivering services in Lambeth, Southwark & Lewisham. The Partnership is led by Naz, with GMFA and the Race Equality Foundation. Through this we targeted men who have sex with men (MSM), at risk of HIV and/or other sexual health issues as a result of drug or alcohol use and chemsex. We continued delivery of a successful group programme, ChemCheck, delivered from the Burrell St NHS Sexual Health Clinic, and delivery of a weekly clinic session, Axis, in partnership with two NHS Trusts: Kings College and South London and the Maudsley. This provides sexual health screening, chemsex support, and metal health support.
- 6. 2018/19 was the second year in the SASH Partnership, to deliver sexual health support in the three central London Boroughs of Westminster, Kensington & Chelsea, and Hammersmith & Fulham. Led by Turning Point with Metro, Naz and Marie Stopes UK, the service works as a multi-agency, multi-disciplinary team. London Friend provides leadership on LGBT work through two full-time and one part-time roles.
- 7. Help Refugees provided funding to continue our partnership with the Say It Loud Club, a group supporting LGBT asylum seekers and refugees, which was funded by the People's Postcode Trust to March 2019. This provided four additional months of partnership, until the Say It Loud Club secured its own funding, and has been operating as a fully independent organisation, and meeting in bigger premises, since July 2018.
- 8. London Friend continued as a key member of the National LGB&T Partnership, a group of England-wide LGB&T organisations working collectively as a member of the Department of Health's Voluntary Sector Health and Wellbeing Alliance. This is a mechanism via which the Department (DH), Public Health England (PHE) and NHS England engage with the voluntary sector. We contributed to projects including the delivery of the third Lesbian, Bisexual and Trans Women's Health Week in March 2019. Through the National LGBT&T Partnership we also helped influence the work of the Government's newly appointed LGBT Health Adviser.
- 9. In January 2018 we began a year-long project working in partnership with Adfam to pilot some support services for families and friends of LGBT people affected by chemsex, and to produce a written support resource. This was published in January 2019.
- 10. During the year London Friend maintained a number of innovative service delivery partnerships with NHS and other LGBT organisations. These include the CNWL NHS Foundations Trust's Club Drug Clinic; Code Clinic at 56 Dean Street; and cliniQ, the trans sexual health and wellbeing partnership also at 56 Dean Street.
- 11. London Friend continued to be a local delivery partner in the national HIV Prevention England programme, delivering brief and structured interventions to gay, bisexual and other MSM affected by chemsex.

- 12. We supported the HPV Action campaign, which calls for HPV vaccinations for boys as well as girls. Through this we supported a call for vaccines to ensure men who have sex with men are protected. This campaign was successful as the Government announced the roll-out of a national programme of vaccinations for adult MSM from April 2018 following a successful pilot, and a new programme of vaccinations for boys in June 2018.
- 13. We continued to be a member of the Metropolitan Police's Child Abuse and Sexual Offences (CASO, previously SOECA) sub-group, providing input on chemsex and sexual assault with our partners Galop.
- 14. We continued to share our experience and knowledge with others through training and conferences.
- 15. We submitted evidence to the Parliamentary LGBT Health and Social Care Inquiry, and also to the Government's Gender Recognition Act Reform Consultation.
- 16. We began a partnership with Drink Aware, providing training on LGBT issues and alcohol safety which is being rolled out to LGBT venues in London during 2019.
- 17. We have worked with several Master's and PhD students to analyse data from our Antidote service and to publish this through academic journals, contributing to the growing evidence on chemsex.
- Our CEO Monty Moncrieff was awarded an MBE in June 2018 for services to LGBT equality. Our Antidote Manager Toni Hogg was nominated for an OSCAR Award via our partners Naz.

Charitable activities within the year

London Friend's core client services within the year included:

Counselling

203 clients received contracted counselling. A total of 17 volunteer counsellors and five clinical supervisors provided the counselling service throughout the year.

Antidote – Drug and Alcohol Services

Our drug and alcohol service, Antidote, continued to deliver during this year. We provided advice, information and treatment through 6 weekly clinic sessions across 6 sites, including partnerships with NHS substance misuse and sexual health clinics. We provided one to one support for 431 people. Three paid staff and 24 volunteers supported delivery the services. Presentations for support for chemsex continued to be the most significant reason people presented to the service, with 91% of clients identifying as gay or bisexual men. The three drugs most associated with chemsex continued to account for the majority of support: 63% requested support for crystal methamphetamine; 50% for GHB/GBL; and 21% for mephedrone. This indicates a shift in patterns of use, with fewer people reporting mephedrone use, but more indicating use of the more harmful drug crystal methamphetamine. After these three chemsex-related drugs, the next most prominent substance reported was cocaine, by 20% of those seeking support. 19% of clients stated alcohol was their primary issue, up from 17% last year, and indicating a rising trend from 13% and 10% during the two years before.

SWAP

In summer 2014 we piloted SWAP, the Structured Weekend Antidote Programme, the first highintensity programme for gay and bisexual men engaged in chemsex, the sexualised use of certain club drugs. During the year 34 men attended the programme, which ran for three cycles.

Social and Support Groups

The organisation ran 194 support groups and social activities within the year. These included; TURNING POINT, a coming out group for gay and bisexual men; CHANGES, a coming out group for lesbian & bisexual women; MATTRIX, a safe and sober space for men of all ages to socialise and meet new people; T ON TUESDAY, a social and support group for trans people; a weekly drop-in every Friday at our Kings Cross centre, providing a space for LGB&T people to meet; PINK INK, a creative writing group; and a group for older (55+) LGB&T people in partnership with Opening Doors London; and weekly Conversational English Classes for people who want to improve their written and spoken English. There was a total of 714 individual clients attending these. Delivery of these groups was supported by 49 volunteers.

Domestic Abuse Counselling

London Friend joined the London LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership in July 2016. The Partnership is led by Galop and also includes Stonewall Housing and Switchboard. 31 clients accessed counselling (24 completed, 7 were referred to other services).

SASH

London Friend joined the SASH Sexual Health partnership which was commissioned to deliver services in the three London Boroughs of Westminster, Kensington & Chelsea, and Hammersmith & Fulham from April 2017. SASH is led by Turning Point with London Friend, Metro Charity, Naz Project and Marie Stopes UK. London Friend's staff directly supported 259 clients through SASH during the year, delivering structured one to one sessions, brief interventions, group work and advice and information.

Administrative Support

The organisation was supported by 3 admin volunteers throughout the year.

Community Centre and Meeting Space

The organisation continued to provide free and subsidised meeting and social space for external groups and organisations within the LGBT community to use. Some of these groups who meet in the centre regularly included Beaumont Society, Families Together London, Bent Bars, Say It Loud Club, Stonewall Housing, CHE and Kenric.

Training

83 volunteers attended in-house training; 16 volunteer training courses were provided during the year. 9 training sessions were provided to external agencies, with 212 attendees, including from sexual health and drug and alcohol treatment agencies. 100% of training attendees would recommend our training.

Financial review

The Trustees are pleased that the organisation has maintained a strong financial position and has continued to attract support of funders, including a number of new funders during this financial year. The CEO has maintained a level of income and represented the interests of our service users at a national strategic level. The Finance Officer has contributed significantly to the improvement of financial record-keeping and to the charity's financial governance.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees review its policy and reserves position on a regular basis. They believe a minimum of 3 months resources expended will enable the charity to continue to meet its objectives if it faces loss of income, increases in costs or delays in receipts,

At present the unrestricted income funds stand at £115,435 of which £40,000 has been designated as the salary cost commitment on the charity's behalf.

Looking forward to 2019/20

In 2019/20 the charity will begin delivery of a joint project on LGBT mental health with partners HERO and ELOP. This work is funded by the Government Equalities Office to pilot a range of new interventions. Preparatory work has taken place during the final quarter of 2018/19, with HERO's delivery of online peer support forums already beginning during this time.

The charity will also embark on a consultation with groups working with LBTQ women, as part of a project funded by the Tampon Tax Community Fund. This will engage with LBTQ women and groups supporting them, to improve our knowledge of their support needs and help us address these in our service development.

The charity has also secured a new grant from previous funders the Lloyds Bank Foundation, supporting volunteering in Antidote from October 2019 for three years.

Structure, governance and management

London Friend is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22nd December 1977 and registered as a charity on 18th December 1989.

London Friend is governed by a Board of Trustees who are recruited openly and who meet at four to six times a year together with the Chief Executive. Trustees serve for a one-year period and may be re-elected.

Trustees receive a full induction, are briefed on their roles and responsibilities within the organisation and subsequently have access to a range of governance and financial management courses. The trustees develop and oversee the strategic planning and all new developments are approved by the Board before work progresses.

The trustees delegate day-to-day management of the charity to the Chief Executive who regularly reports on all areas of organisational performance to the board. There is also regular strategic review and planning sessions.

Governing document

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Risk statement

The Trustees review risk management annually. This involves identifying the types of risks the charity faces (financial, operational, governance etc.), prioritising them in terms of potential impact and likelihood of occurrence and identifying means of mitigating the risk. As part of this process the Trustees keep the adequacy of the charity's internal controls under review.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the charity.

1. Accounting Policies

Charity information

Friend Counselling (London) Ltd (know as London Friend) is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22nd December 1977 and registered as a charity on 18th December 1989. The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company.

The charity is registered with the Charity Commission of England and Wales with the charity number 299307. The principal address is 86 Caledonian road, Kings Cross, London N1 9DN.

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statement are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (as amend for accounting periods commencing 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102. The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash flows.

The accounts have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provided a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency for the charity and rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal policies adopted are set out below.

b) Goina concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis for accounting in preparing the accounts.

c) Charitable Funds

Unrestricted general funds comprises those monies that may be used towards meeting the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are monies raised for, and their use restricted to, a specific purpose, or donation subject to donor imposed conditions.

1. Accounting Policies - continued

d) <u>Income</u>

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable certainty. The following specific policies apply to categories of income:

- * Any income from fundraising is shown gross.
- * Donations are included in the financial statements when received, with any associated tax reclaim being included in the financial statements at the same time.
- * Grant income is recognised when receivable except when it is for a specified period, in which case the income is spread over that period.
- * Gifts in kind are included in the financial statements when they involve an expense by the donor and that expense can be quantified.
- Legacies are included in incoming resources when the charitable company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Entitlement is the earlier of the charitable company being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.
- * Investment income is included when receivable and includes interest from deposits.

e) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activates on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. They are reported as part of the expenditure to which they relate:

- Costs of fundraising comprise the costs associated with attracting income and the costs of generating ancillary income.
- Expenditure on charitable activities comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- □ All costs are allocated between expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to particular activities are allocated directly, others are apportioned an appropriate basis e.g. staff time and estimated usage.

f) Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against income as incurred.

g) Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual values, of all fixed assets evenly over their expected useful lives. It is calculated at the following rates:

Land and Buildings	-	2% on buildings
Refurbishments	-	20% straight line
Equipment	-	20%straight line or 33 1/3% straight line
Furniture and fittings	-	20% straight line

No depreciation is charged on land

The charitable company has a policy of capitalising assets which cost more than £100.

1. Accounting Policies - continued

h) Impairment of Fixed Assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss.

j) Cash and bank

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash or the opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

m) <u>Pension</u>

The company operates defined contribution, externally funded pension schemes. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the company to the fund.

n) Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

o) Company Status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named in the Trustees report. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.
