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CHAIR'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The charity continues to go from strength to strength, with its work in providing a Volunteer Centre, advice and support to local charities, fundraising guidance, and networking between charities. Our community minibus which serves the whole of Bromsgrove District, is very successful and has proved an asset to both BARN and the community it serves.

I would like to thank all our members, volunteers, our trustees and our staff for the support, hard work and commitment over the last 12 months. Of course the year began with the sad loss of Mike Brown who had been a trustee and supporter of BARN over many years. During the year longstanding trustee Claire McKee stepped down due to pressure of her own work, and I would like to thank her for her service. I am pleased to say that now Dr Ben Costello has joined the board of trustees, and there will be further new recruits during 2019.

The charity has once again been successful in a range of funding bids and project grant applications. As part of our governance arrangements we have an up to date risk management register, we review financial information at every meeting and monitor the skills and knowledge base of our trustees. Financial issues remain our biggest risk which is monitored closely. We always review our activities thorough our business planning process to look at ways in which we can enhance our services and further improve our financial position, within our core values and mission.

We continue to work closely with Redditch Borough Council and Bromsgrove District Council, and their support and funding for parts of our work has been welcomed. We could not carry on without the support of various grant funders and donors that provide essential support to us, and so we thank them for their continued help. Our financial performance is more stable after a few challenging years, and we now maintain a small end of year reserve which is essential for the running of the organisation.

We continue to support local charities and to work with other voluntary and community sector organisations to help work in the community. They cover a wide range of needs including health, the environment, domestic abuse, the homeless, the elderly, isolation, skills shortages, refugees, dealing with financial difficulties, exoffenders and many other vital causes.

As local authority and central government funding and provision reduces the pressure on the voluntary sector to step in and provide vital services grows ever greater, and the sector is increasingly the only form of support and help for many vulnerable people in our community.

The amazing work that our member organisations and volunteers deliver is absolutely vital for the communities across Bromsgrove and Redditch, and so BARN's role in supporting these organisations is increasingly essential. We look forward to continuing our work in the future.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The Trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Objectives and activities

Charitable objectives

To promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the communities in the areas of Bromsgrove and Redditch local authority areas, in particular the advancement of education, protection of health, relief of poverty, distress and sickness.

Significant activities

Bromsgrove and Redditch Network (BARN) is a network supporting volunteers, voluntary organisations and communities across Bromsgrove and Redditch.

BARN is the local Council for Voluntary Service and runs the Volunteer Centre for Bromsgrove and Redditch. We represent the local voluntary sector, support local communities, and help with networking, information, funding and volunteering. Where we see a gap in provision we try to help through delivery or partnerships.

Network support activities

Network meetings remain a popular way to support the sector by providing an opportunity for VCS colleagues to meet each other and share information. There is a good mix of Bromsgrove, Redditch and countywide groups, and we now have more than 90 members across the area.

The **Funding Portal** has proved really useful to our members, particularly the funding digests that we send out. This year also saw the return of our biennial Funding Fair which went very well, and brought in many groups we had not met before to talk to a wide range of funders, and attend a variety of different workshops. **Training** was also popular this year, with the GDPR & leaders sessions well-attended.

BARN works closely with the Bromsgrove and Redditch Local Strategic Partnerships and sub-groups which provide an invaluable link between public sector and voluntary and community organisations. During the year BARN continued to work with other Councils for Voluntary Service and Volunteer Centres across Worcestershire to strengthen the voice of the grassroots VCS through Worcestershire Community Action Network (WeCAN). As Redditch is a non-constituent authority in the West Midlands Combined Authority we also work with other CVSs in the region representing the local voluntary sector to the Authority.

Volunteer Centre

We remain one of only two accredited Volunteer Centres in Worcestershire. Initiatives like our Volunteer Managers' Forums offer a rare opportunity for volunteer managers to come together to share their experience.

We continue to develop projects to build on the experience of the Volunteer Centre. Our Skills for Work volunteering programme continued to help residents across Bromsgrove and Redditch that want to get back into work, use volunteering as a stepping stone, boosting confidence, gaining experience, learning new skills.

The **Get Involved** project was completed in 2018, which had been led by our Community Engagement Officer Anne Snell. It had seen a significant increase in the amount of events we have been able to attend, a revision of our volunteering materials and increased use of social media. We were able to produce a series of volunteer stories to help people understand what you can get out of volunteering.

Our **Next Generation** project, focussing on encouraging young people to volunteer, started. It began with a series of consultation sessions to ensure the project is designed and led by young people as much as possible.

Community Action activities

BURT (Bromsgrove Urban and Rural Transport) is the largest of our community projects, running a community transport minibus in Bromsgrove for those who cannot get about on their own. Certainly the most significant development of the year was finally taking delivery of our own minibus in November after 18 months of leasing an old and unreliable vehicle from Worcestershire County Council. The new vehicle is extremely popular with our clients and our volunteer drivers, and was purchased through a mixture of grants, donations, and a loan.

Another community initiative, Bromsgrove and Redditch Open Spaces (BROS), was involved in a project focussed around communities improving their communal spaces in social housing settings, and this took place in three settings across Redditch.

During the year BARN led a multi-million pound **Creative People and Places** bid. This is an Arts Council fund only available to those areas that have the lowest levels of engagement in the arts, and Redditch now qualifies. The Consortium is made up of us, Redditch Borough Council, Jestaminute Theatre, Severn Arts & Arts in Redditch, with other partners such as the Kingfisher Centre and Rubicon Leisure. Although unsuccessful in that round, the Consortium is pressing ahead to resubmit the proposal.

BARN took over the administration of Community House, BARN's home, following the retirement of the previous administrator for a pilot period. This brought us into closer contact with the users of the space, and worked so well that the arrangement has been made permanent.

This year we welcomed Jake Porter as our Administration and Marketing Apprentice. Jake quickly became an invaluable member of the team, straight away making an impact on our marketing, and freeing up Gary and Susan to concentrate on project development. He also became a key part of the young people's project.

The support from our partners and funders, and the contributions of Redditch Borough Council, Bromsgrove District Council, the two local strategic partnerships and the Big Lottery continue to be vital to BARN. None of this would have been possible though without our members, trustees, staff and volunteers.

BARN continues on the road to a more stable footing despite increasingly tough funding conditions. We continue to be proactive, developing projects where we see gaps in provision. Our main focus, as always, remains our members and the support of the voluntary and community sector across Bromsgrove and Redditch, and we aim to continue to help to the best of our ability.

Public benefit

In setting the objectives, the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular to its supplementary public benefit guidance on advancing education.

Achievements and performance

Financial review

During the year the charity made a net surplus of £5,076 (2018 - net surplus of £14,393).

At the year end the charity had net assets of £25,079 (2018 - net assets of £20,003).

Reserves policy

The trustees consider that unrestricted reserves be held at a level approximately equal to between 1 and 3 months expenditure in order to be able to cover day to day running costs in the unlikely event that future incoming resources are either delayed or unduly cease.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Bromsgrove And Redditch Network is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Community House, 103 Easemore Road, Redditch, Worcestershire, B98 8EY.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1.10 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
