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TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 30th April 2019.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEEES RESPONSIBILITIES

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare statements of account for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the affairs of the charity and its incoming resources and appliaction of resources for that period. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to:-

- selecton suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare financial statements on a going concern basis;
- value assets and liabilities in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting by Charities.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which are sufficient to show and explain the Chariles activities and to disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity, and to enable them to ensure any statement of account comply with the requirements of the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 1995. Theyabre also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the chaity abd hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and dedection of fraud other irregularities.

REFERENCE AND ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS

The Charity was established by a Deed of Trust dated 18th February 1991. It is a registered charity number 1004278.

The appointment of new Trustees come through the recommendation from any existing Trustee and will only be ratified by unanimous agreement.

OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the chaity is to provide eductaion, to relieve the poor and suffering including medical and surgical relief work. The support for this work comes mainly but not exclusively from individuals who have heard about the needs in India, who receive verbal reports by the Trustees and Dr Alfred on his visits to the UK.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Charity was formed over 25 years ago to support the primary health care and community health programmes in the Thane district of Mumbai, India. The medical and community programmes are conducted by way of a registered Indian charity Bethany Trust, which owns and manages the Bethany Hospital.

Thana is now a satellite city to Mumbai which houses 7 million people and has significantly grown both in infrastructure and in commerce in the last 10 years and now has become one of the biggest information technology hubs in the State of Maharastra, attracting companies like Accenture, INFOSYS and TCS.

The hospital has continued to develop from its small consulting room and Clinic and the first Lok Hospital to the fully equipped Bethany Hospital with 200 beds, 125 specialist Doctors, Consultants, 40 junior doctors and over 600 nursing and support staff who care for 600-650 outpatients a day.

Bethany Hospital has 5 operating theatres, a cardiac catheterisation laboratory in addition to other special features which include Radiation therapy with the latest Varian machine. During the year the New Cardiology Wing was opened and which is fully equipped for open heart surgery.

In addition to the hospital the Bethany Trust supports a number of associated care projects;

Jeekvan Sahara Kendra. JSK with a small team of 12 staff running an HIV/AIDS clinic in part of the hospital as well as primary care in the patient's homes -often in slum villages. This support extends to care for the widows and HIV children. They conduct regular' Positive Friends' meetings offering counselling and support to patients in their homes.

NEEV is a special needs school which has around 10-15 children who come regularly for primary care and teaching of basic skills and helping parents to cope with the children who often have extreme disabilities.

Dolkamb Community. This is work among tribals scattered on a mountain range of about 75km from Thane. The base camp is in the village of Dolkamb and from there Abraham and his team reach out to about 35 hamlets scattered on the mountain range.

Dehradun. Nijjat is the Drug Rehab Centre working with 20-25 clients. There are 3 schools working specifically with approximately 275 gypsy, slum and street children. Alongside this are Adult literacy classes, vocational training centres and Special needs schools with 6-10 children.

Next big vision.

For some time we have been praying about purchasing 5 acres of land. The Indian Trustees with the full support of the Thana Trust UK Board have agreed to try and purchase the land. The land will be used to build a number of projects that are complimentary to the existing work of the Bethany Hospital Trust, such as a residential centre to care for and support of 50 end of life or terminally ill patients with HIV/AIDS and cancer. A home for people who are destitute. A special needs school and a Community Hall. The initial vision is to provide residential care for 100 people. The land is only about 5km from the Bethany Hospital

The reserves of the charity total £515,388. All the reserves are restricted to the work in India.

The Trustees are satisfied that the reserves of the Trust are sufficient to carry out the activities for which the Trust was created.
