Malawi Projects Somba Health Clinic Continued funding of the Health clinic in Somba, Malawi, which sees approximately 3000 patients per month. The funding covers staff and medication to treat patients for a side range of health issues.
		Somba Maternity Clinic Initiated this year, our maternity clinic, also based in Somba provides services including: Antenatal, Labour and Post Natal. An average of 121 patients per month, and still growing, access the services offered. We are currently funding staff, medication, and the general upkeep /

maintenance of the clinic and services.

Borehole drilling

We funded 5 boreholes in Malawi which would benefit approximately 10'000 people with access to clean water. (2 in Mangochi, 1 in Ntchue, 1 in Ntaje, and Blantyre district respectively)

Waterwheels

We distributed 670 waterwheels to families in various areas to enable them to transport water back to their villages safely.

Water irrigation schemes

We initiated two water irrigation schemes in the villages of Kumba Nyenyezi & Nangalamu. Combined, they will benefit over 350 families with a clean water source for irrigation farming, bathing and drinking.

School feeding

We continue to fund a school feeding programme for 450 students that encourages young children to attend school by which they would receive a meal at the end of the school day.

Sponsor a leader programme-

We sponsored ten young individuals for their further education costs

Malawi Flood Emergency Packs

We distributed 1000 emergency packs during the devastating floods that affected Malawi following the Mozambique cyclone.

Mikundi School Block

For a primary school currently teaching over 400 students, we constructed one school block as many were being taught under trees.

Mikundi Honey Farming

In Mikundi area, with the support and commitment of the village, we have been able to successfully facilitate for the community to start honey farming. They were trained in bee keeping, farming and harvesting honey. They have been fruitful with this initiative and have produced large quantities to sell as a means of income generation

Mikundi Goat pass on project

With our focus on developing Mikundi as a community hub, similar to Somba, we provided 35 goats and 2 studs

MASIYAP food Packs (Mai Ayeshas

Sisters Youth Aids Programme)
An initiative that supports women who have been affected by HIV/AIDS directly or indirectly. An empowerment program that gives women a voice, advice, guidance and an opportunity to make an income thru micro finance projects. We supported 100 women through the provision of food packs that would support them and their families for a minimum 2 months.

Building Educational and Community Centres

Mikundi and Zomba Community centres provides men, women and children an opportunity to educate, learn and train in personal, social and religious development. The two centres respectively hold approximately 200 people at a time and they both have wash facilities.

Bangladesh (Rohingya refugees)

A year on from the Rohingya seeking refuge in the Bangladesh Cox's Bazaar refugee camps, we have been able to achieve:

Hot Food Feeding

51 days of hot food feeding over 98,000 children and vulnerable adult

Food Packs

545 food packs with essentials including rice, oil, salt, lentils

Hygiene Packs

400 hygiene packs with essentials including sanitary pads, soap bars, toothbrushes.

Winter Packs

200 winter packs with warm clothing, blankets, torch hats and gloves

Children Gift Packs

150 Gift packs for school children, with exercise books, colours, stationery sets, pencils rucksack and some sweets.

Solar Tube Wells

We developed a pipeline spanning 1km that provided over 1000 families access to water. The solar powered deep tube well filtered the water and provided the education centre with washing and ablution facilities with added benefit of providing light and power for a microphone and speakers

Tara Water wells

We Drilled 14 Hand pumps in and around the camps. **Kutupalang Anti Natal Clinic** We funded 1 month of Anti natal clinic services for over 1000 women **Charcoal Distribution** We distributed 900 bags of charcoal to be used for keeping warm and fuel for cooking. **Homes** In addition to providing the immediate needs of the refugees we also supported their medium to longer term needs by: Building 488 homes with strong bamboo material to house families in waterproof private spaces. West Bengal (India) We supported the education and development of 340 orphan girls in the West Bengal region of Ganga Sagar. Providing meals, health care, secular and religious education. The upkeep of the facilities and staffing was also covered by our funding. With the crisis in Yemen impacting masses of people, many of which are women and children, we stepped in to support in a number of areas including: **Emergency food packs** We funded 150 packs that contained raw essentials to support a family of 6 for a month. **Water Trucks** We provided over 150,000 litres of water through trucks visiting different locations to get water those who needed it most. Bogop Camp (CAR) There are 14,000 refugees in the Borgop camp in a very small, over crowded area and cut-off from everywhere else. We provided 300 packs in the camps which consisted of rice. Achievements and Performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.	Para 1.20	Malawi Drop of Compassion have continued to support projects in Malawi with the focus being on empowering communities through the implementation of long term sustainable solutions. The new water irrigation projects have been introduced in new areas thus allowing other communities to benefit with water accessibility. Our systems are principally designed to be used for farming to provide sustenance. In normal circumstances they would have to depend on constant supply of rain during the few weeks of the rainy season. However, with global warming, rain fed irrigation has become unpredictable and causing communities to face food shortages, drought and famine. Our projects have ensured a steady supply of water throughout the year and even enabled farming communities to have multiple crop harvests in the year. The wider benefit allows them to sell the surplus produce, employ seasonal labour, better balanced diets and financial independence.

Following the successful impact of last years Water wheel distribution, further communities were supported this year allowing them to collect more water from clean water sources without having the burden of carrying them or dropping them. This has been highly popular during project monitoring and we aim to roll out more waterwheels this forthcoming year.

Drop of Compassion have also continued to support the (Somba Hub) by the inception of the maternity wing which is housed adjacent to the Medical clinic. The health clinic was already popular in terms of treatment for deadly diseases such as Malaria, typhoid, Bilharzia and HIV AIDS and providing FREE services to all those who want to access services plus free prescription. The maternity wing has slowly become a key feature at the Hub, with women able to give birth in a safe clean area with pre natal and post natal care also being provided by trained and qualified staff. Those patients requiring referrals for acute conditions will be supported and taken to the nearest district referral hospital.

The school feeding project ensures children attend school and have a healthy daily meal.

Bee keeping and the goat projects have also empowered communities to become financially independent.

Drop of Compassion have also continued to support high achieving students with education scholarships to go to University to enable them to empower themselves and their families through achieving a profession.

Through the development of the Somba hub we currently have donors who have visited the site and taken the initiative by wanted to develop further areas and provide sustainable solutions for other villages. Mikundi is the second hub being developed where we found students travelling 15km to the nearest school. They new school is now minutes away, allowing them to travel safely and also be provided with a healthy meal for breakfast and lunch.

The Community Centre has been built in Mikundi, for adult classes, and personal development where we have seen a growth in participation by women in the community who have taken key strides to make things happen in the village.

Honey Farming and Goat pass on projects have both been a success here, the farmers

have been able to sell on surplus honey to other villages and make an income or swap honey for other produce. We have successfully seen that the number of goats in the area increase to over 100 within one year. The community have also used some of the goats as meat for food, fertilizer for the irrigation schemes that were developed last year.

Rohingya

Drop of Compassion's support to the Rohingyan refugees that fled the war in Myanmar into Bangladesh has continued. As a result of our appeals, we have provided essential relief in many forms including: a daily food kitchen, survival kits, food packs, winter kits, shelter packs, charcoal, hand pump, Tara wells, solar powered deep well, hygiene kits, homes, toilet/showers and supported a medical and eye clinic in the refugee camps. Due to the nature of the circumstances, the refugees have had to leave all their belongings behind and have become dependent on essential support. Due to the political situation, it is difficult to forecast a long term strategy so the support given has been mainly for essential items but we have also provided monsoon resistant housing to ensure the refugees have an abode that is suitable. The water wells have also helped refugees to enable to have access to clean water for their daily needs.

West Bengal

Drop of Compassion identified a need to support 340 orphan/children girls whose family couldn't provide for them. We took on the responsibility of the upkeep of these children to facilitate in their welfare, education and social development. Those children who have completed their education are then provided further training to then teach within the institute or supported in moving to further their careers or aspirations. This year we had 9 graduates. In the future we are looking to expand the building to provide better facilities for the dormitories and education facility.

Yemen

With the on going crisis in Yemen, our thinking was to support the immediate impact and provided water and food packs that would provide families relief in the short term. There is currently no long term strategy to continue to work in Yemen.
