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The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objectives are:

- a. To advance the education of the public in the art of poetry, in particular but not exclusively by translating into English and making available to the public contemporary poetry from non-European countries.
- b. To advance the education of the public in general about issues relating to immigrant communities by introducing the public to immigrant communities' contemporary poetry and by such other means as the trustees see fit.

Organisational Management

During the financial year 2018-19 the following people served as PTC employees:

- Commissioning Editor Edward Doegar (0.6 FTE)
- Communications Manager Bern Roche Farrelly (1.0 FTE)
- Administrator Madeleine Fogelman (0.2 FTE) increase to 0.3 FTE in August 2018 and title change from Administrator to Office and Publications Manager in October 2018

The PTC continued its intern programme in 2018-19 in order to offer an early-career opportunity for young graduates with a particular interest in translation, poetry or communities work. This position was offered part-time and paid at the London Living Wage rate. Our 2018-19 intern was Hatice Cin.

The PTC workplace pensions scheme (administered by Aviva) offers employees a match-contribution of 5% of gross qualifying earnings.

The PTC was based at The Albany, Douglas Way, London, SE8 4AG from June 2018 after moving from 2 Wardrobe Place, London EC4V 5AH.

Business Plan

In 2018-19 the PTC worked to the new business plan for the period 2018-22, in connection with the PTC's new four-year funding agreement with Arts Council England (NPO status). The Business Plan covers artistic programme, audience development, resourcing and income generation, and will be reviewed and updated by staff and board once per year. In 2018-19 the PTC has its second Together Day, a full-day gathering of staff, board and advisory board where we looked at the successes of the past year, and discussed future plans and overall organisational strategy.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate them. The main risks identified are:

Board - Following a period of high turnover in 2014-18 the board is still small and vulnerable to change. The trustees have agreed a control procedure to mitigate this risk, including board recruitment and training, and succession planning for the Chair role. In 2018-19 three new trustees attended trustee training delivered by the consultancy Cause 4.

Staffing - As the PTC has a small executive team it is vital that there are clear management structures in place, as well as robust procedures in the case of illness or other destabilising forces. New positions were created and recruited for in 2018, including the appointment of an Events and Workshops Manager. We have also agreed review, training and succession planning frameworks.

Fundraising - Core funding remains overly dependent on Arts Council England. During 2016-18 the PTC began developing a new fundraising strategy, to include trusts and foundations, direct income streams, individual giving and crowdfunding. All staff and board are involved with the delivery of the new strategy, which will reduce reliance on Arts Council funding by 2022.

Objectives and aims

The trustees have considered the Charity Commision's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Beneficiaries

The Poetry Translation Centre's main beneficiaries are: diaspora/immigrant communities in the UK and around the world; young people living in the UK from BAME and mixed-heritage backgrounds; the English-speaking public in general who encounter poetry; poets and translators who enjoy a professional development benefit through working with the PTC.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements against objectives

In 2018-19 the PTC delivered on our core objectives through our workshop programme, a publication in partnership with Bloodaxe Books, two chapbooks, one anthology with RedSea Online, 19 public events, 19 workshops and our continuing online offer. We brought on board a commissioning editor and joined Arts Council England's National Portfolio for 2018-2022 (representing four years of core funding at the current level).

In 2018-19 we brought in £7,721 through charitable activities, compared with £9,532 in 2017-2018 and £2,015 in 2016-2017.

Our income from partners dropped slightly 2018-19. Our event audience figures, book sales and workshop attendance figures all rose significantly in 2018-19, as did the numbers listening to our podcasts, while our digital reach figures remained steady.

We moved to our new home at The Albany Arts Centre in Deptford in June 2018. Other residents from the literary sector include Spread the Word and Apples & Snakes. The new office is large enough for our team to grow, and also has enough space to host our translation workshops.

2018-2019 PROGRAMME ACTIVITY

Workshops

Our workshop programme develops talent in literary translation from under-represented languages such as Georgian, Chinese, Somali, Urdu, Persian, Hebrew and Indonesian. In 2018-19 we translated 26 poems from 12 languages in 19 public workshops, with 13 different 'guest' translators and 189 participants. Our main poet-facilitator during the year was poet Edward Doegar. Highlights from the year include:

- translating exciting younger poets such as Carla Diacov from Brazil, Najwan Darwish from Palestine and Shookah Hosseini from Iran;
- receiving translations back from participants after the workshop who'd translated the poem into further languages;
- trying workshops from new guest translators from regular attendees to the workshop;
- finally, we are pleased that despite moving the workshop to our new site mid-year we managed to maintain attendance figures;

Our workshop programme brought in £1,300 of direct income in 2018-19.

Publications

We published four publications in 2018-19. In May we published Beginning to Speak (Diana Anphimiadi) and I wanted to Ask You (Salome Benidze) to coincide with the PTC's Georgian poets tour. For both chapbooks we worked with translator Natalia Bukia-Peters and poets Helen Mort and Jean Sprackland.

The PTC and Kayd partnered to produce an anthology, So At One With You of Somali poetry celebrating the first ten years of Somali Week festival. The anthology was edited by longtime PTC collaborators WN Herbert and Said Jama Hussein. The book was co-published with RedSea Online, with whom we have co-published previously. The book included three newly commissioned essays as well as an introduction by the editors. Several poems translated for the first time were included. The anthology was launched as part of this year's Somali Week festival in October.

Azita Ghahreman's collection, Negative of a Group Photograph, was published in October to coincide with a tour with the UK poet and translator team, Maura Dooley and Elhum Shakerifar. It received a PEN Translates Award and poems from the collection appeared in Modern Poetry in Translation.

As part of a new publications strategy we raised the price of PTC chapbooks from £6 to £7.

Direct income from book sales in 2018-19 was £2,746. As a comparison our direct income from book sales in 2017-18 was £2,210.

Events

In 2018-19 the PTC held 19 events in 10 cities. Our events took place in arts venues including literature festivals, but also in community centres, libraries, universities and a bookshop. For our Georgian Tour, 20% of our audience were under 26, while 6% were Georgian speakers. For our October Tour with Iranian poet Azita Ghahreman 20% of the audience were again under the age of 26, and 26% were Persian speakers. We reached 890 people through live events in 2017-18.

We worked with 18 different partners for our 2018-19 events, (this figure is only the venues), compared with 31 partners for our 2017-2018 events, of which were 20 new partners for the PTC.

The PTC's 2018-19 touring was supported by grants from Arts Council England's Strategic Touring Fund. We also brought in £2,040 in direct income from venue/promoter fees, and £80 in ticket sales for events.

Community events

Our target 'least engaged' audiences are UK residents from immigrant/diaspora and working-class backgrounds. In 2018-19 we held a launch for our So at one with you Somali Anthology in London's City Hall in Partnership with Kayd Somali Arts and Culture, 2 Georgian Events including a workshop and an event at the The Poly Arts Centre in Falmouth and 2 events for our Azita Tour including an event at SOAS presented in partnership with the Jaleh Esfahani Foundation. We also started doing events with our local community in Deptford including a workshop and open mic night inspired by the work of Al-Saddiq Al-Raddi co-hosted by the Goldsmiths English PEN Society.

COMMUNICATIONS AND FUNDRAISING

Digital

The PTC website now boasts over 550 poems by 143 poets in 30 languages.

In 2018-19 we had 400,707 sessions on the PTC website, a 32% increase on the previous year, with visitors from 222 countries. 34,023 sessions lasted 10 minutes or longer, pointing to deep user engagement, this is a 51% increase in deep engagement on the previous year.

We published 15 blog posts, as well as all the poems we translated through the year, in three parallel versions - the poem in its original language, the 'bridge' or 'literal' translation, and the 'final' English translation - with accompanying notes.

We released 48 podcast recordings, attracting 20,727 downloads. We posted 21 YouTube videos, achieving approximately 3,927 views and 4,400 minutes viewed. We published 192 Facebook posts, with a reach of 158,539 people, and 1,797 tweets, achieving over one and a half million impressions.

Our mailing list had 724 members in March 2019, having being significantly reduced by the need to re-subscribe users under the new GDPR provisions. Post GDPR the average open-rate for our emails is 50% (industry average is 26%), and click-rate 5% (industry average 2.66%).

Funding/fundraising

The PTC successfully renewed its status as an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation. The new funding period

is 2018-22, bringing in core funding of £124,576 per year.

Our 2018-2019 non-NPO funding target was £115,000. We secured project funding from Arts Council England - £112,500 over three years. We secured our first grant from the British Council - £4,240 for a series of Indonesian workshops.

We brought in £5,133 from trusts and foundations, £11.81 from direct donations, and a new partnership with the Stephen Spender Trust for a three-year pilot programme of workshops in schools worth £7,500 to the PTC.

As outlined above we were also delivering a much-expanded artistic programme and making major changes to our team structure.

In 2018-19 we brought in £7,721 through charitable activities, compared with £9,532 in 2017-2018 and £2,015 in 2016-2017.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

In 2019-20 we plan to:

- Launch a new series of short books called the World Poet Series replacing our existing 34-page chapbook series with 66 -page pocket-sized editions.
- Publish three poets, Adelaide Ivanova, Yu Yoyo and Legna Rodrigues Iglesias, translated by respective translator/poet duos Francisco Vilhena/Rachel Long; Dave Haysome/A.K. Blakemore; Serafina Vick/Abigail Parry.
- Reissue two existing chapbooks in the newly expanded World Poet Series.
- Grow our book sales including direct sales through our website, event sales and sales via UK retailers
- Deliver two poet tours around the UK, targeting 'mainstream' poetry venues/festivals as well as Brazilian, Chinese and Latin-American diaspora communities.
- Programme 18 poetry translation workshops in London, to feature poets from Asia, Africa and Latin America, working with a roster of literary translators
- Increase repeat attendance to PTC workshops and gather meaningful feedback from participants
- Pilot/establish up to 6 new workshops in other UK towns, with active local partners
- Begin work on a range of 15th-anniversary projects for 2019 including a poetry translation symposium. £15,000 in funds to be raised through non-NPO funding and partnerships.
- Establish and develop new partnerships with literature organisations, venues and cultural centres
- Make further improvements to the PTC website, social media and e-bulletins
- Increase our web audience and understand this group better through web analytics
- Raise £16,000 through non-NPO funding and donors to develop and launch the Sarah Maguire Prize for Poetry in Translation.
- Continue the intern programme and continue to implement staffing changes as per the new PTC Business Plan
- Review the strengths of the PTC board with a view to further recruitment

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The PTC continues to receive significant core revenue support from Arts Council England, largely through its National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) funding programme.

Total income was £139,609 with £177,056 expended, resulting in a planned deficit of £37,447 for the year. As at the balance sheet date, the charity held unrestricted funds of £81,784.

The PTC received £7,004 of restricted income in 2018-19. We are taking forward restricted funds of £13,475 into 2019-20.

Sarah Maguire's estate agreed that £4,596 will remain with the PTC, to be spent towards the new poetry prize we plan to establish in Sarah's honour.

Reserves

The PTC recognises the importance of maintaining healthy reserves, to cover emergency expenses such as sudden loss of funding, legal costs or shifting economic conditions. At our quarterly board meetings we analyse our cash flow for seasonal factors, potential opportunities and overall stability. Our board of trustees has agreed a policy about how reserve funds can be used; the process for authorising its use; and how this use is to be reported to the board.

Our aim is to always have cash reserves of 3 months of running costs, approximately £46,500, in addition to any restricted and designated funds. In 2018-19 we will continue to use some of our reserves to enable us to grow our core team; this will help us to generate additional direct income from 2019 onwards which will allow us to maintain our reserve at a healthy level while being ambitious for our artistic programme and the growth of the organisation.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Poetry Translation Centre Ltd (PTC) is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 16 July 2007 and registered as a charity on 4 March 2008. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

The Centre was established by the poet Sarah Maguire in 2004, who died in November 2017.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, new directors are approved and appointed by the existing trustees.

The trustees (who are also directors of the Poetry Translation Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Account Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company and charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources (including the income and expenditure) of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities' SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going-concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act, 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Resources expended are included in the statement of financial activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of VAT that cannot be recovered.

The company is a registered charity and as such is exempt from corporation tax on all its income and gains, properly applied for its charitable purposes.

The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objectives are:

- a. To advance the education of the public in the art of poetry, in particular but not exclusively by translating into English and making available to the public contemporary poetry from non-European countries.
- b. To advance the education of the public in general about issues relating to immigrant communities by introducing the public to immigrant communities' contemporary poetry and by such other means as the trustees see fit.

Organisational Management

During the financial year 2018-19 the following people served as PTC employees:

- Chief Executive Officer Erica Hesketh (0.8 FTE) -
- Commissioning Editor Edward Doegar (0.6 FTE)
- Communications Manager Bern Roche Farrelly (1.0 FTE)
- Administrator Madeleine Fogelman (0.2 FTE) increase to 0.3 FTE in August 2018 and title change from Administrator to Office and Publications Manager in October 2018

The PTC continued its intern programme in 2018-19 in order to offer an early-career opportunity for young graduates with a particular interest in translation, poetry or communities work. This position was offered part-time and paid at the London Living Wage rate. Our 2018-19 intern was Hatice Cin.

The PTC workplace pensions scheme (administered by Aviva) offers employees a match-contribution of 5% of gross qualifying earnings.

The PTC was based at The Albany, Douglas Way, London, SE8 4AG from June 2018 after moving from 2 Wardrobe Place, London EC4V 5AH.

Business Plan

In 2018-19 the PTC worked to the new business plan for the period 2018-22, in connection with the PTC's new four-year funding agreement with Arts Council England (NPO status). The Business Plan covers artistic programme, audience development, resourcing and income generation, and will be reviewed and updated by staff and board once per year. In 2018-19 the PTC has its second Together Day, a full-day gathering of staff, board and advisory board where we looked at the successes of the past year, and discussed future plans and overall organisational strategy.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate them. The main risks identified are:

Board - Following a period of high turnover in 2014-18 the board is still small and vulnerable to change. The trustees have agreed a control procedure to mitigate this risk, including board recruitment and training, and succession planning for the Chair role. In 2018-19 three new trustees attended trustee training delivered by the consultancy Cause 4.

Staffing - As the PTC has a small executive team it is vital that there are clear management structures in place, as well as robust procedures in the case of illness or other destabilising forces. New positions were created and recruited for in 2018, including the appointment of an Events and Workshops Manager. We have also agreed review, training and succession planning frameworks.

Fundraising - Core funding remains overly dependent on Arts Council England. During 2016-18 the PTC began developing a new fundraising strategy, to include trusts and foundations, direct income streams, individual giving and crowdfunding. All staff and board are involved with the delivery of the new strategy, which will reduce reliance on Arts Council funding by 2022.

Objectives and aims

The trustees have considered the Charity Commision's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Beneficiaries

The Poetry Translation Centre's main beneficiaries are: diaspora/immigrant communities in the UK and around the world; young people living in the UK from BAME and mixed-heritage backgrounds; the English-speaking public in general who encounter poetry; poets and translators who enjoy a professional development benefit through working with the PTC.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements against objectives

In 2018-19 the PTC delivered on our core objectives through our workshop programme, a publication in partnership with Bloodaxe Books, two chapbooks, one anthology with RedSea Online, 19 public events, 19 workshops and our continuing online offer. We brought on board a commissioning editor and joined Arts Council England's National Portfolio for 2018-2022 (representing four years of core funding at the current level).

In 2018-19 we brought in £7,721 through charitable activities, compared with £9,532 in 2017-2018 and £2,015 in 2016-2017.

Our income from partners dropped slightly 2018-19. Our event audience figures, book sales and workshop attendance figures all rose significantly in 2018-19, as did the numbers listening to our podcasts, while our digital reach figures remained steady.

We moved to our new home at The Albany Arts Centre in Deptford in June 2018. Other residents from the literary sector include Spread the Word and Apples & Snakes. The new office is large enough for our team to grow, and also has enough space to host our translation workshops.

2018-2019 PROGRAMME ACTIVITY

Workshops

Our workshop programme develops talent in literary translation from under-represented languages such as Georgian, Chinese, Somali, Urdu, Persian, Hebrew and Indonesian. In 2018-19 we translated 26 poems from 12 languages in 19 public workshops, with 13 different 'guest' translators and 189 participants. Our main poet-facilitator during the year was poet Edward Doegar. Highlights from the year include:

- translating exciting younger poets such as Carla Diacov from Brazil, Najwan Darwish from Palestine and Shookah Hosseini from Iran;
- receiving translations back from participants after the workshop who'd translated the poem into further languages;
- trying workshops from new guest translators from regular attendees to the workshop;
- finally, we are pleased that despite moving the workshop to our new site mid-year we managed to maintain attendance figures;

Our workshop programme brought in £1,300 of direct income in 2018-19.

Publications

We published four publications in 2018-19. In May we published Beginning to Speak (Diana Anphimiadi) and I wanted to Ask You (Salome Benidze) to coincide with the PTC's Georgian poets tour. For both chapbooks we worked with translator Natalia Bukia-Peters and poets Helen Mort and Jean Sprackland.

The PTC and Kayd partnered to produce an anthology, So At One With You of Somali poetry celebrating the first ten years of Somali Week festival. The anthology was edited by longtime PTC collaborators WN Herbert and Said Jama Hussein. The book was co-published with RedSea Online, with whom we have co-published previously. The book included three newly commissioned essays as well as an introduction by the editors. Several poems translated for the first time were included. The anthology was launched as part of this year's Somali Week festival in October.

Azita Ghahreman's collection, Negative of a Group Photograph, was published in October to coincide with a tour with the UK poet and translator team, Maura Dooley and Elhum Shakerifar. It received a PEN Translates Award and poems from the collection appeared in Modern Poetry in Translation.

As part of a new publications strategy we raised the price of PTC chapbooks from £6 to £7.

Direct income from book sales in 2018-19 was £2,746. As a comparison our direct income from book sales in 2017-18 was £2,210.

Events

In 2018-19 the PTC held 19 events in 10 cities. Our events took place in arts venues including literature festivals, but also in community centres, libraries, universities and a bookshop. For our Georgian Tour, 20% of our audience were under 26, while 6% were Georgian speakers. For our October Tour with Iranian poet Azita Ghahreman 20% of the audience were again under the age of 26, and 26% were Persian speakers. We reached 890 people through live events in 2017-18.

We worked with 18 different partners for our 2018-19 events, (this figure is only the venues), compared with 31 partners for our 2017-2018 events, of which were 20 new partners for the PTC.

The PTC's 2018-19 touring was supported by grants from Arts Council England's Strategic Touring Fund. We also brought in £2,040 in direct income from venue/promoter fees, and £80 in ticket sales for events.

Community events

Our target 'least engaged' audiences are UK residents from immigrant/diaspora and working-class backgrounds. In 2018-19 we held a launch for our So at one with you Somali Anthology in London's City Hall in Partnership with Kayd Somali Arts and Culture, 2 Georgian Events including a workshop and an event at the The Poly Arts Centre in Falmouth and 2 events for our Azita Tour including an event at SOAS presented in partnership with the Jaleh Esfahani Foundation. We also started doing events with our local community in Deptford including a workshop and open mic night inspired by the work of Al-Saddiq Al-Raddi co-hosted by the Goldsmiths English PEN Society.

COMMUNICATIONS AND FUNDRAISING

Digital

The PTC website now boasts over 550 poems by 143 poets in 30 languages.

In 2018-19 we had 400,707 sessions on the PTC website, a 32% increase on the previous year, with visitors from 222 countries. 34,023 sessions lasted 10 minutes or longer, pointing to deep user engagement, this is a 51% increase in deep engagement on the previous year.

We published 15 blog posts, as well as all the poems we translated through the year, in three parallel versions - the poem in its original language, the 'bridge' or 'literal' translation, and the 'final' English translation - with accompanying notes.

We released 48 podcast recordings, attracting 20,727 downloads. We posted 21 YouTube videos, achieving approximately 3,927 views and 4,400 minutes viewed. We published 192 Facebook posts, with a reach of 158,539 people, and 1,797 tweets, achieving over one and a half million impressions.

Our mailing list had 724 members in March 2019, having being significantly reduced by the need to re-subscribe users under the new GDPR provisions. Post GDPR the average open-rate for our emails is 50% (industry average is 26%), and click-rate 5% (industry average 2.66%).

Funding/fundraising

The PTC successfully renewed its status as an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation. The new funding period

is 2018-22, bringing in core funding of £124,576 per year.

Our 2018-2019 non-NPO funding target was £115,000. We secured project funding from Arts Council England - £112,500 over three years. We secured our first grant from the British Council - £4,240 for a series of Indonesian workshops.

We brought in £5,133 from trusts and foundations, £11.81 from direct donations, and a new partnership with the Stephen Spender Trust for a three-year pilot programme of workshops in schools worth £7,500 to the PTC.

As outlined above we were also delivering a much-expanded artistic programme and making major changes to our team structure.

In 2018-19 we brought in £7,721 through charitable activities, compared with £9,532 in 2017-2018 and £2,015 in 2016-2017.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

In 2019-20 we plan to:

- Launch a new series of short books called the World Poet Series replacing our existing 34-page chapbook series with 66 -page pocket-sized editions.
- Publish three poets, Adelaide Ivanova, Yu Yoyo and Legna Rodrigues Iglesias, translated by respective translator/poet duos Francisco Vilhena/Rachel Long; Dave Haysome/A.K. Blakemore; Serafina Vick/Abigail Parry.
- Reissue two existing chapbooks in the newly expanded World Poet Series.
- Grow our book sales including direct sales through our website, event sales and sales via UK retailers
- Deliver two poet tours around the UK, targeting 'mainstream' poetry venues/festivals as well as Brazilian, Chinese and Latin-American diaspora communities.
- Programme 18 poetry translation workshops in London, to feature poets from Asia, Africa and Latin America, working with a roster of literary translators
- Increase repeat attendance to PTC workshops and gather meaningful feedback from participants
- Pilot/establish up to 6 new workshops in other UK towns, with active local partners
- Begin work on a range of 15th-anniversary projects for 2019 including a poetry translation symposium. £15,000 in funds to be raised through non-NPO funding and partnerships.
- Establish and develop new partnerships with literature organisations, venues and cultural centres
- Make further improvements to the PTC website, social media and e-bulletins
- Increase our web audience and understand this group better through web analytics
- Raise £16,000 through non-NPO funding and donors to develop and launch the Sarah Maguire Prize for Poetry in Translation.
- Continue the intern programme and continue to implement staffing changes as per the new PTC Business Plan
- Review the strengths of the PTC board with a view to further recruitment

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The PTC continues to receive significant core revenue support from Arts Council England, largely through its National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) funding programme.

Total income was £139,609 with £177,056 expended, resulting in a planned deficit of £37,447 for the year. As at the balance sheet date, the charity held unrestricted funds of £81,784.

The PTC received £7,004 of restricted income in 2018-19. We are taking forward restricted funds of £13,475 into 2019-20.

Sarah Maguire's estate agreed that £4,596 will remain with the PTC, to be spent towards the new poetry prize we plan to establish in Sarah's honour.

Reserves

The PTC recognises the importance of maintaining healthy reserves, to cover emergency expenses such as sudden loss of funding, legal costs or shifting economic conditions. At our quarterly board meetings we analyse our cash flow for seasonal factors, potential opportunities and overall stability. Our board of trustees has agreed a policy about how reserve funds can be used; the process for authorising its use; and how this use is to be reported to the board.

Our aim is to always have cash reserves of 3 months of running costs, approximately £46,500, in addition to any restricted and designated funds. In 2018-19 we will continue to use some of our reserves to enable us to grow our core team; this will help us to generate additional direct income from 2019 onwards which will allow us to maintain our reserve at a healthy level while being ambitious for our artistic programme and the growth of the organisation.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Poetry Translation Centre Ltd (PTC) is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 16 July 2007 and registered as a charity on 4 March 2008. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

The Centre was established by the poet Sarah Maguire in 2004, who died in November 2017.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees
