**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY** 

### LOOK END OF YEAR REPORT

"I want to be part of a community where I am included and not tolerated. I want to be able to help other young VI people, through the lessons I've learned." (mentor, 18)

This has been a very busy year for Look. Our services are gathering momentum and referrals are increasing. The need is clear. Look is working hard to answer that need and provide more wrap-around, bespoke emotional support for VI young people and their families, through our mentoring project and events programme.

### Mentoring Project Round Up:

We offer one-to-one support from a trained mentor who is visually impaired themselves. Many blind young people tell us that they do not have the opportunity to talk openly about their impairment and the isolation they are experiencing. Our mentors help, as they understand these issues first-hand in a way that teachers and other professionals can't. Mentoring happens online, one-to-one and in groups at our local youth forums and events. Lack of accessible opportunities, unemployment and isolation mean that young VI adults are at risk of mental health issues. Three out of four blind young adults are long term unemployed. By providing our VI volunteer mentors with training and ongoing development opportunities, we ensure that both the mentor and their mentee benefit from the LOOK mentoring project.

"LOOK mentoring has helped my daughter so much. It means so much to us all to know there someone there for her to talk to, who understands what things can be like for her, how tough it is, and who provides hope to us all that she will have a bright and happy future." (Jane, mentee mum)

### Staffing

This year we built up a dynamic team to reach and support more young VI people. We increased the working hours of certain posts. We increased our staff team, to 6 (3 full time and 3 part time posts) and as a result, built our capacity to deliver more mentoring to more visually impaired young people. All except 2 of our 6 staff are Visually Impaired themselves.

### Hereford Youth forum:

The Hereford youth forum provides a wonderful opportunity for YVIPs to meet in person for face to face group mentoring. Although our online mentoring provides

invaluable support, this personal contact is a vital tool in tackling the social isolation felt by many YVIPs, especially within mainstream schools. This service is restricted to Herefordshire at present. The forum is held at The Royal National College in Hereford.

Youth Forum brings Herefordshire VI people to come together once a week to make friends and share experiences through facilitated discussions and activities. There is no provision like this for young visually impaired in Herefordshire. This year the weekly Youth Forum has 16 regular members, and we have run various activities, from yoga to cooking and recording pod casts, covering issues such as bullying in school, coming to terms with sight loss and social isolation.

### Yoga - Well-being support:

We have run weekly yoga sessions at the RNC, especially designed for VI participants, in partnership with the Hereford yoga centre. The class has been well attended and feedback has been extremely positive. We hope to secure funding to continue this partnership in the future.

### Events

Our events reach out to families and young people to get them involved in the LOOK community. They are designed in response to need expressed by our members and serve to build confidence and independence, create friendships and social networks for mutual support and to provide opportunities to learn and share skills and knowledge.

#### Connections

We have been focusing on raising the profile of LOOK both within and outside of the sight loss sector. We look forward to growing these partnerships in the coming year. We have attended a number of conferences, exhibitions and charity information days where we have promoted our services.

### Communications

This year we developed a monthly news bulletin, podcast and active social media channels. We write blogs and top tips guides for young people and families. We have designed new paper leaflets and are gathering filmed material for a promotional film to be made next year. We employed a communications manager to lead on this.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Look is a Registered Charity in England and Wales, number 1140471 and a Registered Company Limited by Guarantee, number 07406571. Look is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Charity was founded and constituted in 1991, first registered in 1992, with future amendments to the Constitution in 1995 and 1998. In October 2010 Look was registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee and as a consequence reregistered with the Charity Commission in February 2011. As a charitable company, Look began its activities as from 1st April, 2011, at which point the unincorporated Look (Registered Charity number 1007282) stopped operating and its assets have been transferred to Look as a Charitable Company (Registered Charity number 1140471).

The Trustees of Look, who are also the Directors for the purpose of Company law, have the overall responsibility for the governance and the strategic direction of the charity. The Chair, Vice Chair and Treasurer are elected annually. They then appoint the other Trustees who are recruited to provide the range of skills and expertise to effectively govern the Charity. The Board of Trustees meets regularly to review strategy and performance and agree budgets. In line with the requirements of the governing document Trustees also organise an Annual General Meeting at which elections take place and resolutions are passed. Trustees are familiar with the work of the organisation as they have been involved for several years.

An induction pack has been developed, which is available to all existing and newly recruited Trustees. This includes various Charity Commission publications, a copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, published Trustees Annual Report and Accounts, financial procedures, risk assessment documents, the current business plan, working budget, and the roles and responsibilities of a Trustee and the Board.

On a day to day basis the organisation is managed by the Director, Charlotte Carson, who has the overall responsibility for strategic planning, operational management, human and financial resources and service.

### Related Parties

Look has been a loose federation of groups with clusters of activity across the UK. More recently while the central organisation has gone through a period of evaluation these groups have continued and contact with them is being reestablished.

### Risk Management

The Board is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the charity. Detailed considerations of the risks are delegated to the Director. Risks are identified, assessed and controls established throughout the year. A formal review of the charity's risk management processes is undertaken on an annual basis and risks are reviewed on a rolling cycle. The key controls used by the charity include strategic planning, budgeting and management accounting, organisational and governance structure and lines of reporting. Formal written policies are reviewed annually, and assessment of risk is a

standing item on the agenda at Board meetings. Through these risk management processes the Trustees are satisfied that the major risks have been adequately mitigated.

The main financial risk to the charity is considered to be the unexpected loss of income through charitable funding or funds brought in by the marathon runners and other fundraising activity. In order to mitigate this we ensure that we abide by our reserves policy ensuring that we have six months core running costs in the bank. We have recruited a volunteer and a LOOK staff member manages our Marathon running team to ensure that core funds are received each year.

### Charitable Objects

To facilitate parents' groups and parents in enhancing the education, welfare and leisure opportunities of visually impaired children, to promote the coordination of services, both statutory and voluntary, provided by parent groups and organisations relating to visual impairment.

### Vision

Our vision is to be an organisation that is recognised as a key provider of services to families with visually impaired children and young people.

### Purpose

To improve the lives of families with visually impaired children and young people by providing support, information and activities with a view to helping them gain the best outcomes in life. We want to break down the barriers that young VI people and their families face.

### Public Benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with their obligation under Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance used by the Charity Commission for England and Wales. The Trustees further confirm that the activities of the charity are carried out, in line with its objects, for the public benefit, and the charity achieves its objects through the activities described below.

### The following events were delivered:

Looking Good, Feeling Good, LOOK Fashion event (Birmingham, August 2018) Look teamed up with John Lewis to deliver a day of fun and fashion advice. VIYPs often feel excluded and lacking confidence when it comes to looking good. Look engaged beauty and style experts to deliver workshops in grooming, and VI fashion and beauty bloggers gave talks and demonstrations. There was time for structured discussion, about appearance and confidence, as well as shopping and chatting. A great day was had by all. The event went very well, with excellent feedback from delegates. We intend to extend this programme of work with Lucy Edwards (VI beauty blogger) next year.

### Find Your Voice media training (Birmingham, Oct 2018)

10 young people were selected to attend a day of training run by Visually Impaired BBC reporter Tom Walker. The day was packed with information and activities to give them the basic skills necessary to hatch an idea, pitch it and go out and record audio features. Feedback was again, very positive, with appetite for further training from Tom in the future.

## Getting Great at the Every Day! (Worcester, November 2018)

This confidence and independence weekend gave young people and their families the opportunity to get together with LOOK mentors to share experience, develop skills and have fun. We are training our Mentors to be young leaders and they helped

to facilitate the whole weekend - from meeting and looking after families to help running workshops. Mentors ran workshops in self advocacy, physical confidence and accessible tech. We also hired ILS professionals to deliver cooking workshops to parents and YPs. There was a VI accessible Ceilidh on the Saturday night and lots of laughs were had.

The event was overwhelmingly successful. The support network we created there will last beyond the event itself. Many of the young people in attendance signed up to the online mentoring scheme afterwards, a parent's support group has been formed on facebook and parents and mentors are being put in contact via a chat group on the online platform. All those who attended said they would attend future events.

Here are some sample responses from parents and young people:

"I came wanting Chloe to grow in confidence about herself and have experience of other visually impaired children, and actually it's exceeded expectations." Jane, parent of 10-year-old Chloe.

"It's nice to do this with other visually impaired people because we can share stories and understand each other." Kayleigh, 13 from Devon and Sirine, 13 from London.

"Words cannot describe and express my experience with Look. I'm overwhelmed and privileged to be part of your journey to support individuals like us. Carlisle has been playing the piano since he came back. Such motivation! Thanking all once again." Claudine, parent of 15-year-old Carlisle.

"It's been really great just to be with other families. We need more of it, keep it coming." Christine, parent of 13-year-old Charlotte.

Eye on Work Employment Workshop x 2: (Surrey and Birmingham, November and December 2018)

These sessions address employability skills and a solution focused approach to the job market. They include interactive activities and group discussion on topics relating to employment and are planned and delivered by staff and Look VI mentors with employment experience. Again, these have been very well received. We are offering these workshops to schools, colleges and VI service users and providers, to raise expectations and broaden knowledge about the opportunities out there in the world of work.

## Greece Music Key Project 2018 (Athens, June 2018)

Since November we have auditioned and recruited 6 participants in a pan European music project in Athens. 3 sighted and 3 VI singers attended a residential week of singing and cultural exchange. The event was a life-changing opportunity for our VI participants, 1 of whom had never left her hometown of Leeds before. Another VI participant described how the trip had "reminded her of everything she is capable of" and given her a newfound determination to "get on with living and enjoying life and all the things I love".

### Mentor Training Weekend - Derby, July 2018:

We trained 16 new mentors at our Mentor Training weekend in Derbyshire. Training is intensive and covers communication skills, safeguarding, VI issues and discussions around disability and identity. Evaluation questionnaires given to our

trainee mentors show that 100 percent of the delegates were highly satisfied that we met our aims for the weekend and responses were extremely positive.

# Mentor Christmas Celebration Event (Birmingham, December, 2018) We brought our mentors together to celebrate all we have achieved and to thank them for their fantastic hard work supporting their young mentees.

Pantomine Visit (Hereford, December 19) the group had a great time socialising and celebrating together.

### Well Being Weekend (Herefordshire, February 2019)

We ran an action-packed weekend for VI 18-30 yr olds, designed to increase physical confidence. Activities included yoga, dance, horseriding and blind rugby. We also held structured discussions about body image, using mobility aids, barriers to fitness and how we can help our young mentees to better access these opportunities. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with concrete impacts:

"Since attending the Get Moving weekend I have rediscovered my love of dance, which I haven't done since I was a child with more sight. I have joined a local class since I got home, and I feel like I discovered myself again." (Mandy, aged 22)

Schools workshops and assemblies (various locations, throughout year at mentee's schools)

We have been piloting schools' workshops in several of our mentee's schools with huge success.

On each occasion the young person has taken the decision, with the appropriate encouragement and support of the Look staff, to stand up and address their peers themselves. We have then delivered a short workshop including some visual impairment simulation exercises and some interactive games, intended to spark discussion around discrimination and inclusion.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive. Since starting this pilot phase, the project has been self-promoting, with word of mouth recommendations resulting in numerous enquiries from teachers, parents and young people wishing to book a workshop in their school.

'Thank you Look for helping me talk about my sight loss for the very first time to my friends. Since you came to my school I feel much less shy at school and people who I was always scared to talk to now come up to me and tell me who they are and talk to me.' (Maleeka, mentee)

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Reserves Policy

Free reserves are represented by net current assets within the unrestricted fund. In view of the unpredictable nature of charitable income, it is the Trustees intention to maintain an unrestricted reserve of a minimum of six months' projected running costs.

### Fixed Assets

Following an agreement with the Lincoln VIPs Group to transfer their holiday flat to Look, the Trustees took ownership of the flat on 21st July 2006. This is an enormous asset valued at approximately £100,000. In 2010 the Trustees had the opportunity to acquire the freehold of the flat for £2,000 and this option was taken up. The flat creates the opportunity for Look member families and groups to enjoy a reasonably priced holiday by the sea.

## Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements so that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the financial year and of its surplus or deficit for the financial year. In doing so, the Trustees are required to:

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discertion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the company has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company, and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the usage of resources, apportioning staff costs by the budgeted time spent. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
