# **Trustees Report for the Year ending 31st March 2019**

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019 The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in our governing documents and applicable law.

## **Constitution and Objects**

Kent Refugee Action Network Is a charitable company limited by guarantee and Is governed under the Companies Act of 1985 by a Memorandum of Association and Articles of Association agreed at an Extraordinary General Meeting held on December 19<sup>th</sup> 2002.

The objects of the charity are to promote the benefit of refugees, asylum seekers and ethnic minorities and to promote racial harmony in the wider community, particularly in Kent but elsewhere when appropriate, by supporting voluntary groups working with such persons and by liaising with statutory agencies, local authorities and other interested parties.

#### Organisation

The trustees named on page 2 served during the year, supported by a Management Committee. During the year as part of KRAN's education work with UASC the charity ran Learning for Life and Advocacy and Support projects together with a youth work service in the Canterbury, Ashford and Folkestone areas. The various areas of UASC support work are consolidated into an Advocacy and Support project that continues to provide an established Mentoring service, a Drop In and a Casework and Support Service in the Canterbury area, Folkestone, Ashford and other areas as needed. KRAN employs 13 members of staff both full and part time. The work in all the projects is supported by a large number of volunteers. The Officers of KRAN are Trustees and were recommended to supporters of KRAN by the Management Committee at the Annual General Meeting in December 2018. Their appointments, together with the election of other members of the committee, were approved by the meeting. In March 2019 one person joined the Management Committee as a co-opted Trustee and she will be presented at the AGM for ratification in December 2019.

## Review of the year to 31 March 2019

The year 2018 -19 has been a year when KRAN has continued to work hard to strengthen its Trustee Board and improve its governance as it took forward the review of its aims and objectives as part of the restructuring process begun in 2016 aimed at improving and expanding its work with the vulnerable young people who are our clients. Much has been achieved in all areas this year and significant progress made. The 3 year Strategic Plan begun in 2016 is due to conclude in the summer of 2019 and work has started on reviewing the plan and preparing a new 5 year Strategic Plan for 2020 to 2025. During the year the Youth Trainee programme, established in 2018 and almed at providing opportunities for some of the young people to gain valuable experience in various areas of the work we do, has been developed and consolidated. This initiative has also enabled us to make headway in establishing a Youth Forum by which the young people can contribute their ideas to the way

forward for our work. This has gone forward with the support of a grant from the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation. Our main funders this year have been AB Charitable Trust, Aviva Community Fund, Awards for All, Blagrave Trust The Listening Fund, Children in Need, Colyer-Fergusson Charitable Trust, Co-operative Foundation, Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, Kent Community Foundation, Lloyd's Bank Foundation, Private Trusts, Roger De Haan Charitable Trust, Virtual Schools Kent and the Tudor Trust

We would like to sincerely thank these major funders, together with the many smaller funders, organisations and individuals without whose generous support we could not continue to help our young people so effectively.

#### **Reserves Policy**

Sufficient amounts of unrestricted and restricted funds are maintained throughout the year to cover management and administration costs for a period of three months.

#### Statement of Trustees' responsibilities.

The Trustees are required by law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its results for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- a) Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- b) Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Charities Act 1993 and with applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- d) Prepare financial statements on a going business concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Notes to the Accounts for the year to 31 March 2019

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charitles SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charitles preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charitles Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

#### 1.2 Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their useful lives as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

25% pa straight line

Computers

33% pa straight line

#### 1.3 Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### 1.4 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed

#### 1.5 Value Added Tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

## 1.6 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
