<u>Chairman's Report</u> for the Year Ended 31 March 2019

This year has been a significant one for MiY (More in you). As well as being rebranded with a new identity the foundations have been put in place to see this charity start to realise its long awaited potential.

It has now been brought under the same directorship as that of Everyday Champions.

The vision of MiY is to see 1000 coaching centres established by 2050.

The mission of MiY is to create a platform for transformational conversations that positively impact our communities and society.

We want MiY centres to be a place where people can grow in Self-Awareness, Resilience, Confidence, Motivation, Accountability and Social Competence.

How will we succeed?

Our strategy is simple.

i) Coffee (connection)ii) Conversationiii) Coachingiv) Celebrate

We want every person we draw alongside to feel they they belong, that they are believed in and that they become the very best they can. Every human being should have people they can open up to about their lives. Sharing hopes, aspirations, challenges and frustrations is essential for a strong cohesive society and community.

From Coffee hut to Coaching Centre

MiY Coaching Centre is on the verge of being launched in March 2019 and in the next financial year we will be able to measure how effective we have been at implementing our strategy.

The MiY Coaching Centre will be based in the heart of Greenwich, London. It will host the following:

MiY Co-Lab - Flexible daily work space in a relaxed comfortable environment.

MiY Coaching - High quality personal development coaching

MiY Coffee - Fresh Volcano Coffee made by our baristas served everyday. Free to our community on Sundays.

MiY Community - Free coaching and coffee for our community at specific times. Hosting space for other organisations who are looking to benefit our amazing community.

We believe most people know they have more to give but don't know what it is or how to get it out

MiY is about creating coaching conversations over coffee to help people discover who they are and why the world needs their story using universal values and principles rooted in the Judeo-Christian faith.

MiY is about helping people in a variety of life situations including those specifically stated in our charitable objective by providing courses and coaching that allows them to take control of their lives and equips them to grow to become strong and healthy people.

MiY will aim to reduce social isolation and motivation poverty in the communities it serves. The objectives we are set up to serve as a charity often are the symptoms of deeper life issues that people can have. We aim to connect to people in our community to deal with the root causes connecting people to other local organisations, businesses and stakeholders that can help each person realise their own potential.

I am pleased to report on the following activity from 2018-19 and anticipate the growth and impact of MiY in the coming year.

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

## **Objectives and Aims**

The company's objects are to carry out any charitable purpose according to the laws of England and wales in such ways and in such parts of the united kingdom or the world as the directors from time to time may think fit for the benefit of the public ("the objects") and in particular, but not exclusively:

1. The relief of people who are in need by the provision of debt counselling and a debt management service.

2. The advancement of public education amongst young persons by the provision of facilities for safe and satisfying play, and such out of school activities as will inculcate good citizenship, at large with the object of improving their condition of life.

3. In the interests of social welfare, the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time activities for the public at large with the object of improving their conditions of life.

4. For the benefit of the public, the prevention of crime and the relief of persons who are the victims of crime, by co-operating with the police, local authorities, victim support and like statutory and voluntary agencies.

5. The relief of unemployment by the provision of training or retraining and in co-operation with the statutory agencies, the provision of work experience for young people.

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

### **Charitable Activities**

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit. During the period 2018-2019 the following activities and events have been organized:-

## General development:

MiY is ready to move into its own facilities in the heart of Greenwich that can best serve the objectives it is set up to obtain. The past few years have been a period of discovery and experimentation in how we can best add value to the communities we serve. We now have a clear identity, vision and strategy as has been laid out in the chairman's report.

The year ahead will be an important time of implementing the strategy whilst continuing to evaluate and plan according to the effectiveness of the activities we run.

In the coming year we will name a centre manager for the new building and appoint an co-ordinator to commence new initiatives and partnerships to help impact the community of Greenwich. Development will start to be co-ordinated with our other EC (Everyday Champions) sites in order for the MiY vision and vision to grow. We will undertake engagement with funders as well as developing our own income streams to ensure the sustained growth of the charity moving forwards.

Community care

Giveaways:

Through our EC volunteers we have given gifts to those living in deprived areas within the communities of Newark, Wellingborough, Greenwich and Swansea at Easter and Christmas. Well over 1000 homes were helped with a gift. In Wellingborough a regular provision of food parcels is now provided and this is being formulated into something that will grow and have an even bigger impact moving forwards. Funds were raised to help partner with Women's refuge in Newark and Wellingborough homeless forum at Christmas time which further strengthened connections with providers in the area.

## Grace Boxes:

We continue to run a project called 'Grace Boxes' which supports and cares for mothers who have experienced stillbirth of their children. Volunteers have worked in partnership with a local hospital. Many families got in touch to give their thanks for the gift as they were really touched by the gesture.

Demential Choir:

In Wellingborough one of the EC members has developed a Dementia choir. This enables those suffering with Dementia and carers to be involved in a creative activity that brings them together with others who are in the same season of their lives.

## Roc - Redeeming our communities:

Worked with planning committee and hosted at the Wellingborough facility 100 community stakeholders from churches, police, council, cocaine anonymous, alcoholic anonymous, social workers, fire service, high sheriff of Northampton and local councillors amongst others.

Coffee Hut:

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

### Charitable Activities

In London we have continued to give away free coffee and donuts to the community each week. As a result of the Coffee Hut we have had conversations with many people who have asked for help in their personal lives. Some examples are those with life controlling addictions, young people on the fringe of society, people new to the country who struggle with social isolation and single parents who lack a sense of community. Throughout this year Greenwich community has been focused on engaging with the community through Coffee hut. The aim of Coffee hut is engaged in meaningful conversations and serves free high-quality gourmet coffee to the community along with pastries. Every Sunday for at least 2 hours we have served 70 people on average every week having conversations with at least 2500 different people of all ages, backgrounds and socio-economic backgrounds. This has enabled us to identify and respond to needs and also inform future planning. We have listened to people and used questionnaires and feedback forms to gather information on the key areas they feel we can serve them best with what we have to offer.

From a new venue in the city centre Swansea have used the Greenwich 'Coffee hut' model to serve hundreds of hot drinks and snacks to passers-by. Due to its city centre location and opening on a Sunday morning many of those helped have been homeless and/or struggling with life controlling addictions.

#### Strategy formed:

From this feedback we have devised our strategy through the new facility we will enter into from April 2019. We have developed a database of people who wanted to stay in contact with both volunteer opportunities and to access services.

#### Impact coaching:

We opened up on Tuesday evenings over the summer period to allow people to access computers and watch our 'impact coaching.' From our questionnaires over the past year one of the key areas that they highlighted was a desire for them to be helped in understanding how they could impact society in a positive way. This led to us running a pilot scheme called 'impact coaching' which takes a coaching framework delivered by Gareth Morgan and running online webinars and in-house coaching and coffee. We learned a lot through this process and taking ideas forward into how we can offer this moving forward. One young man has now become a key volunteer in the charity as a result.

#### NLCC:

We work closely with a charity, NLCC (New Life Children's Centre) providing help, support and expertise in areas of care, teaching, and as of 2016, basic medical advice and support. Regular trips to the Gambia are run which take up to 30 people from the UK and give them opportunity to volunteer for a week at NLCC, but also to catch the vision of NLCC. This has resulted in more people in the UK recruiting sponsors, and more people sponsoring a child £15 per month or a teacher £25 per month. EC volunteers continue to support a local Charity Shop in Newark town centre which has been very successful and has already funded a building project at one of the school's sites, which opened in 2016. We planned and sent out a large number of workers from London, who, among other skills, brought medical and dental care and advice to the local Gambian clinic and schools.

NLCC builds and runs schools, church and healthcare in the Gambia, West Africa. Educating in excess of 1500 children every week, NLCC is helping to transform communities by investing in the next generation. The charity uses land belonging to MiY (More In You) Inc. to store containers which are regularly filled with donated goods then shipped to the country to help develop the fabric of the buildings and facilities for the children and teachers to benefit from.

## Compassion UK :

In 2015 we became partners of a charity called Compassion UK, which means we have committed to being involved and helping children gain sponsorship. Compassion is one of the world's leading child development and child advocacy organizations. Working mainly with the local church, they link a child living in poverty with a sponsor. Each sponsor gives their child access to education, health checks and the care of a local church-based Compassion project. We continue to promote awareness and opportunity for EC members and visitors from the local communities to get involved in sponsoring Compassion children.

Volunteer workers:

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### **Charitable Activities**

This year the Greenwich community and head office have benefited from one full time volunteer worker. We have been able to provide training and opportunities for these volunteer workers to gain skills and experience, we have provided accommodation and 'travel to work' expenses as part of the agreement, and in return we have benefited from the time, efforts, input and previous experience that the volunteer workers have invested over the past year. We have seen significant development in the areas they have focused on. They have since become part of the staff at EC, the mother charity of MiY.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial position

MIY in the year to 31 March 2019 had a net deficit of  $\pounds 6,793$  (2018 net surplus of  $\pounds 283$ ). Therefore the charity's negative reserves position has increased to  $\pounds 20,315$  from  $\pounds 13,522$ . This position is supported by its partner charity the Everyday Champions Centre and is discussed further in the Reserves Policy and Going Concern sections below.

#### **Reserves policy**

Our policy is to have 25% of the charities annual running costs in reserve. We have not yet achieved this although we are intentionally pursuing opportunities to increase income and build up reserves. We are still reliant on our partner charity Everyday Champions Centre, to support the work of MIY, and so have entered into talks with EC Directors about the future plans and opportunities to resource the work of MiY and build up reserves, through partnership and social enterprise that will outwork our objectives.

#### Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that the charitable company will continue to receive the support of its partner charity, Everyday Champions Centre, for the foreseeable future. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

We are looking at changing the structure of our charity to be more formally linked with Everyday Champions, as we partner so heavily.

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and registered charity. It is operated under the rules of its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 3 June 2009 and most recently amended 26 September 2010. It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to  $\pounds 1$ .

## **Risk management**

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

MIY is a charitable company limited by guarantee in England. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information page of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are detailed in the trustees report.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

## Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property	- 2% on cost
Computer equipment	- 33% on cost

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

## Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.
