Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

From the dates 25th August to 11th September 2019 The DRF supported the Maldivian Sihhath Initiative (MSI) in their eighth successive trip to the Maldives. Following on from their previous project in 2018, the MSI team returned to the Baa and Noonu Atolls to deliver training once again to remote island communities in the area.

During the 16 day project the MSI team visited three local islands (See below). The team had previously visited two of the local islands in 2016, where training was undertaken at local schools and the island health centres. Donations of emergency medical equipment was also made to each island health centre.

For this project, the team consisted of four UK based clinical tutors. Tutor trips were staggered so at any one point at least three tutors were available. On this occasion three tutors travelled out to the Baa Atoll for the first week of the trip with a fourth tutor joining in the final week.

Each course included a mixture of candidates, including school children, teachers, police, health centre staff and local council members. This ensured that we taught a snapshot of the community.

In addition to delivering first aid training, we revisited the health centres on Kudafari and Marfaru to ensure that equipment that was previously donated was still in good working condition and fit for purpose.
