Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Objective and activities

The Kingsborough Centre (formerly known as the Kingsborough Family Church) thrives continually on her vision to add value to lives through her various activities and events. The Church organisation keeps making a positive impact in the lives people in Hillingdon borough and in the entire West London region. By the God's grace we have been in existence for 15 years and anticipate that many more lives would be transformed and impacted, especially since the recent end of affiliation with the RCCG network from end of June 2018.

The overall vision of the church, also known as Vision 247 (Taking the Land) continues to generate ideas by members, however a 12 weeks period of Sabbatical was called from Sunday 15th July 2018 to retreat, retrain and reposition Kingsborough Centre ready for expected future impact. The sabbatical enabled the individual, the families and the church as a whole to contextualise Vision 247 in the light of play our role to see it fulfilled. A member of the church with a strong political vision campaigned and contested for counsellorship was adequately supported from Kingsborough Centre, while others were also encouraged to develop interest. The Hillingdon Food bank continue to expand and reaching out to many more people in crisis across the borough. On the other hand the Coat of Many Colours Nursery went through a trial time, that almost let to the closure of the Hayes branch as a result of the loss of its leased property. However in a miraculous manner, a new property was found to relocate the nursery. The planning permission that was initially reject at the council was later granted on appeal, allowing for the purchase of permanent premises for the Hayes to be completed and the renovation starting in earnest.

1. Pursuit of God

As a core objective of Kingsborough Family church, the pursuit of God cannot be emphasized enough. It is important for church members and congregants spiritual growth and remains the bed rock towards ensuring that the core reason for existence of the church is achieved. To that effect, half night vigils have been made a regular feature of the church once a month whereby the church meets to primarily pray, with the Friday prayer meeting also being strongly encouraged. Sunday services as well as midweek services remain key to further encouraging the pursuit of God. The Sunday services and special events, during which on occasions Kingsborough host special men and women of God who bring to the house God-inspired messages and are specially themed, provide further enlightenment on the word of God and has also been useful in aiding Kingsborough Family Church's objective that congregants pursue God in their daily lives. Pastor Femi Atoyebi, Rev. James Solomon, Reverend Faith Agbor, Bishop Wale Akinyande and Pamela Maynard are some of the men and Women of God to have been hosted at Kingsborough Family Church this financial year.

2. Excellent Service to God

Service to God is one that cannot be short of excellence. Thus as an objective of Kingsborough Family church we continue to strive to achieve this in our activities. Not only because it is a demand from God but also because it is an avenue of standing out in the community as a church with a spiritual and community focus and as such will aid our efforts in reaching people in the community who have not yet been won to Christ. We strive for excellence not only in church operations and activities but also through community projects. To that effect, the opening of the new branch of Coat of Many Colours nursery in Hayes highlights our service of excellence to God. The effort involved in setting up this branch of the nursery and ensuring that it was to the standard of excellence as we continue to demand of ourselves is evident in the registration of the nursery by OFSTED.

The Coat of Many Colours Nursery in Hayes in addition to that in Uxbridge, brings to two the number of Branches of Coat of Many Colours owned By Kingsborough and demonstrates that with child care as a major need in most communities in the United Kingdom, our community is one that will continue into the foreseeable future to ensure that such a need is not lacking in our community. The birth of Love Your Street (LYS) community initiative as launched during the in-house conference as yet another community initiative is indicative of Kingsborough Family Church's continuous foray into the community through the maintenance of existing projects and seeking new projects as it maintains its relevance in the community by meeting needs. Love Your Street (LYS) while a relatively new Project compared to Kingsborough Family Church's existing projects as Hillingdon Foodbank, and Coat of Many Colours Nursery.

3. Dwell in love with all men

This third objective of Kingsborough we believe has been achieved through regular attendance/participation of various inter-denominational church group meetings in the community as festival of Life, Good Women's Fellowship, Ordained Ministers conference, Churches Together in Uxbridge (CTU), Hillingdon interfaith Network etc.

Impact people around us gracefully.

In opening up attendance to various ministry events to members of the community, people in the community have been impacted gracefully. Bubbles, Hadassah, Kingsmen, Relate, Emerge and the children ministry have held events over the course of the year during which the community was invited to attend. The singles seminar organized for Relate, the Children's Christmas party, and Youth End of Year gig to mention a few of events organized by the singles, children and Emerge ministries were huge successes and recorded attendances especially from people in the community who were not necessarily church members. New member receptions and Back to church season further provided yet another platform to impact people around us gracefully through our activities of inviting the community to join in in attending church regular and special events.

Charitable activities

A fresh start theme was adopted to review the operations of the church, especially during the sabbatical period. Throughout the time, rather than our regular services where undiluted word of God is preached and taught by leaders in house, external guest Ministers were invited to sharpen the focus of the church and to challenge us in crystallizing the journey ahead. Some of the guest ministers that God used during this our service year are: Dr Albert Oduwole, Pastor Femi Atoyebi, Rev Yemi Adedeji, Pastor Ojesina, Prophet Johnson Akinfewa, Bishop Wale Akinyande and Pam Maynard. By November 2018 connections were made with Rev. Sam Adeyemi of Day Star Christian Centre, Nigeria and Dr Vincent Valentyn of the Kingdom Lifestyle Ministries, Cape Town, South Africa; were both identifies as mentors and covering for the Church in the evolving new dispensation, amongst the many other men and women

of God who have pledged their loyal support and counsel to the church. In early November 2018, we were able to attend for the second year in a roll, The Excellence Leadership Conference in Nigeria; while later in the same month Dr Vincent Valentyn came over to us in London and did an Apostolic Summit conference for the church. Apart from the development above, our Sunday services, midweek services, departmental meetings, ministry events and prayers remained ongoing, encouraging the pursuit of God.

FISEP - Our core value system, continue to help shape the objective of The Kingsborough Centre, working hard in order to achieve the set goals of our activities. Soul winning has be reframed into the heart of the church plan, with every little resources within our reach through our community projects like The Coat of Many Colours Nursery, Distinction Night and the Hillingdon Foodbank. Jesus did not only preach to poor, He also fed the poor.

1. Community Impact

Over the course of the year, there were various impactful ministry events which were held and which were also open to members of the community. The ministries of the Kingsborough Centre include, but not limited to - Bubbles (for new mothers), Hadassah (for women), Kingsmen (for men), Relate (for singles), Hangout (Youths/Teenagers) and the Children ministry. A few of the events organized by the church and her ministries include: 1 Hadassah's Positive Parenting 2 - Spoons 4 - Cooking, Hands 5 - Loving

- Marriage series & Marriage Academy
- Student Graduation & Feast
- Distinction Night
- Kingsmen Outbound Connect To The Gathering
- Christmas Banquet & Carol Service

These events were huge successes and recorded attendances both from church members and from people in the community who were not necessarily church members.

Impact: These programs have increased people's faith in God as there was so much impartation, divine encounters and insights into life; families receiving wisdom on how to live, children well taught the wisdom of God, Professionals waking to the realisation that with God they can attain a greater height and a lot of business ideas received and put into practice.

2. Distinction Night

Following our desire to generate interest in prayer, worship and the manifestation of God's power in the church, distinction night which is a quarterly program was created in October 2018. It is a worship and prophetic prayer night that lasts for 4 hours with invited worship ministers.

Impact: It has been a night of God's visitation, deliverance, salvation, healing all to the glory of God.

3. Hangout Group

The hangout group which is the youth/Teen's church of Kingsborough have a leader who ministers to them every Sunday, but sometimes they attend the main church depending on the service like Super Sunday, Night Vigils/Distinction Night. They had an outreach event during last summer in Brunel University where they reached out to the students especially the foreigners, gently welcoming them into the system, giving them some moral support and introducing them to church.

4. Christmas Hampers

The Kingsborough Centre through The Hillingdon Food bank initiative again gave out Christmas hamper donations to families in crisis in the community.

5. Bulletin for West London

The Kingsborough centre continues to issue the West London Christian bulletin to various stakeholders in the Community. Every month key events (past and future) are highlighted and to bring awareness to over 600 organisations and individuals across West London.

6. Radio station

The Kingsborough Centre Radio Station is progressively and continuously reaching people everywhere on Saturday mornings. It combines music, a mixture of topics and has featured various guests and lively discussions.

7. Walk of Witness

This was a community initiative where churches came together in April 2018 to walk together during Easter, stopping in strategic places to pray for the specific area. Kingsborough Centre also presented a drama skit on that day in the town centre.

8. Volunteers and Staff Appreciation Dinner

All staff and volunteers of the organisation were treated to our annual special Christmas evening. It was an evening of people from various ethnicities being honoured for their service to the organisation. Several awards were handed out to both staff and volunteers. There was lots of food to eat and the evening was filled with fun, laughter including music, dancing, games and quiz.

Impact: It was an interesting and colourful party, people from various ethnicities came together to have fun and know that they are appreciated and loved. It also allowed staff and volunteers who would generally work in different places to meet each other.

9. Children's Christmas party

We also had Christmas party for the children; Parents dropped their children and picked them up after a few hours. The children played with their friends and other children from the community. There was food, they performed a full length drama and they were all given Christmas gifts.

Impact: It afforded the children the opportunity to make new friends. The children showed the love of God to the community and their non-Christian friends. The parents had some time of rest knowing that the children were in a safe environment.

10. Monthly Vigils and Prayers/Prayer Meetings

Night vigil is held every 3rd Friday of the month where we all the church members gather to pray; the church introduced conference call prayers where members call a Free phone number so that we can continue to pray together since February 2017 which is still very effective. Team Leaders call in every Wednesday mornings at 5am to pray and fast as well as meet physically on Sundays at 8am to pray. In addition, they meet every 1st Saturday of the month from 7am -9am for a breakfast meeting where they hand in their departmental reports, pray and dine together as well as discuss team strategies.

Impact: These joint forums have encouraged individuals to stand personally in faith, grow with the support from others, learn how to pray and develop a stronger personal relationship with God. At the same time people feel that their challenges are being shared by a church that cares. The testimonies from the vigil have in turn encouraged others to come.

11a. Sunday morning Life

This is a time we dig deep into the word of word God before the main service every Sunday. The church congregation being divided into age groups of 18 - 24; 25 - 34; 35 - 44; 45 & over. At this time, people have the opportunity to share their scriptural views and concerns which would be generally addressed by everyone and more insight by some Pastors and Minister in our midst. We also play some life experience video clips for everyone to watch and develop their individual opinions which would be referred to the scripture and thereby applying it to our daily lives. Some Sunday mornings we do programs like: Platform of Influence where we invite guest speaker in a certain area of discipline who would share ideas/nuggets and help people discover their passion or area of influence and how they can develop it. Sunday Business School - This is an entrepreneur workshop where the guest speaker would share on how to be successful in your business. Sofa Sunday - This is held only in months with 5 Sundays and this is an open floor for the congregation to ask questions in relation to general life concerns or world events.

11b. Workers' meeting

This is a monthly meeting hold every first Sunday of the month (Super Sunday) to review and measure the effectiveness, efficiency and passion of all the workers or volunteers; and also an opportunity to highlight the achievements and challenges of the month. More importantly, it would be an opportunity to gather and support one another in prayer and encouragement.

Impact: This group has given opportunity for new leaders to develop and enhance their knowledge of the word of God, since they would be teaching it to others. It has helped the worker to be responsible and live a Godly life. It equally provided a forum for the congregation to receive knowledge, advice and practical tips on real life issues, how to be a successful entrepreneur and have good business acumen e.g. how to write a business plan/proposal, starting a business, dealing with employees, interviews techniques, and management of funds.

12. Social media presence and website attraction

The church via social media engages our current projected members, we utilise Facebook, Twitter, instagram and YouTube to reach both locally and globally. We also send out monthly e-bulletin (Connect Card) to inform our members of upcoming events at church. We have seen some increase in our YouTube Channels views. We also promote our post on Instagram and Facebook to gain maximum exposure in the Hillingdon area to reach potential members for the Church & Nursery.

Structure, management and governance

Kingsborough Family Church is a charitable company limited by guarantee, a part of the Redeemed Christian Church of God founded in 1952; Kingsborough registered as a charity on 25 February 2004 and incorporated 17 August 2005. It was established under a Memorandum of Association, which defines its objects and powers, and is governed by that and it's Articles of Association. In addition, there are detailed Regulations made under the Articles and Trust deed.

Kingsborough is open to anyone that complies with the criteria for membership. In addition the Trustee Board is responsible for managing organization as outlined in the Articles of Association and the Trust deed. The Board of trustees is constituted as follows:

Financial review

The Trustee Board is supported by a management team and staff of a number of employees organized into two core departments. These are as follows:

"Kingsborough staffs have continued to oversee the day to day running of the church's administration, services and managing resources. This board has ensured that the churches decisions are consistent with its policies and regulations underlying its existence.

" The Coat of many Colours Nursery staff who oversee the day to day running of the nursery's health and safety policy, Ofsted regulations and national standard, food and hygiene and well being of the children. The Nursery continues to operate profitably as a result, and its long term growth appears to be on a sound footing.

Purchase of Property

The premises 192 Church Road, UB3 2LT was purchased.

This ownership of its own premises was a major achievement for the Kingsborough centre as this had been a planned desire for several years.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is 4 New Windsor Street, New Windsor Street, Uxbridge, Middlesex, UB8 2TU, England.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Operating leases

Lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold property	-	Building element over 50 years
Motor vehicles	-	25% reducing balance
Plant & Machinery	-	25% reducing balance

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Financial instruments (continued)

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.
