The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and financial statements for the year ending 31st March 2019.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a Company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1 April 2004 and registered as a charity on 5 October 2016. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, amended by special resolution on 17 August 2016. In the event of the charitable company being wound up members are required to contribute £1 each only.

The charitable company is governed by a board of trustees, who are responsible for setting the strategic direction of the organisation and for establishing policy. The board is authorised to appoint new trustees to fill vacancies arising between AGM's. Trustee's are selected and trained following careful consideration of skills and experience required to fulfil the role.

Objectives and activities

The charity's principle objective is for the benefit of women affected by issues of isolation, distress, violence and abuse and from the ethnic miniority communities in Rotherham or elsewhere.

To advance the following objects:

- 1) The relief of poverty, distress and suffering
- 2) The advancement of education
- 3) The promotion of social inclusion for the public benefit among the beneficiaries who are socially excluded on the grounds of their social and economic position, by providing:
- a) Education and Training
- b) Confidence and capacity building activities
- c) Social and recreational facilities in the interests of social welfare.

In furtherance of these objects the company may educate or raise awareness of the wider public in issues affecting the beneficiaries.

In conducting their business and undertaking these activities the trustees have considered, and are confident that they have complied with, the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Related Parties

Apna Haq Ltd is a fully affiliated member of Women's Aid Federation of England.

Financial Risk Management

As with many voluntary groups the major risk, likely to affect future performance, is that of finance to support the activities offered. Funding bids are submitted to possible funders but with competition from other groups of funders who wish to fund specific areas of work funding is limited.

Achievements and Performance

Another year has gone by where Apna Haq continues to consolidate its existing work and develop its new work. I am extremely pleased with the report that has come out of our strengths based review undertaken by Imkaan for us, as it has captured our strong rights based feminist approach to our work as black women supporting other black and ethnic minority women within our communities.

This has seen us implement the much needed lamplight data base system. This has meant installing the new system, and then ongoing staff training to review the implementation. Of course there has been increase in work load due to getting used to the new system but the staff team have worked through it well. We are excited about being able to pull off our new monitoring information's from this system when we do our annual planning cycle.

This year's reflections show how we are continuing to branch out into the interrelated issues that are impacting so much on the lives of our women and children. So as well as continuing with our focus of supporting women and their children on domestic violence issues we also have continued to develop our work on sexual violence and abuse as well as continuing to provide voice and influence at a local, regional and national level.

I was appalled this year of a case of a service user who needed to get to a refuge for herself and her children. She was refused to be offered a refuge space for herself and her children by 8 different refuges across the country. What was the refusal based on? well they only asked 2 questions, 1. Her name and 2. Her immigration status. And these 2 pieces of information they felt gave them the right to make a decision that she was not eligible for a space in their refuge.

On the same day a further 2 refuges took a different approach. On establishing her name and her immigration status they then asked her a few further questions which helped them to establish that she was entitled to gain a space at the refuge. What was it that helped the initial 8 refuges to make their minds up so quick that she was not eligible, it was the fact that she had an African sounding name and an immigration status they were unfamiliar with. So instead of asking further questions that would have enabled them to establish that she had a right to refuge, they refused her.

This experience showed me that racism and its impact is alive and kicking and impacts the lives of black and ethnic minority women from our communities on a daily basis. Thus I am pleased to say that we continue as an organisation to raise issues of racism in all its forms as it impacts on the women and children we support.

Unfortunately, we are not able to do much about the increased workload due to the changes in the benefits systems and the particular issues of women applying for universal credit. I am aware that the staff team have been proactive on this issue and met with local and South Yorkshire representatives raising these issues, but these currently remain unresolved. We can but continue to raise these issues.

This year again Apna Haq had a leading position within the Million women rise march as our CEO was a lead banner holder for the front of the march denting the silent block i.e. representation of the women murdered in the past year. This year it was a joint initiative with Sheffield women's hub.

Achivements and Perfomance continued

It is important for us to engage as it provides an opportunity for our women to leave their homes and to engage on a national level, raising their voices and showing that together we can build solidarity.

I am also particularly pleased to see the continued developments in our sexual violence work. Our relationship with the national centre excellence on child abuse has enabled us to get our much visioned train the trainer in issues of sexual violence within BME communities. To know that we know have 10 women who have completed their diplomas awarded to them through Apna Haq on this issue makes me immensely proud.

We have continued to monitor our finances through our board meetings and financial reports submitted there and have been able to identify underspend which we will renegotiate with the Lotteries staffing to be able to re profile the spend.

Our referrals remain the highest levels from with the South Asian community but as this reflects the local population and we know that we have built relationships with various other Bme communities we continue to foster these relationships with a view to continued trust building that will lead to more women from these communities coming forward.

Finally, we have had a really exciting line up of community events this year with the drama, the poetry writing, the book launch and the Paintings exhibition. This alongside our work with Rotherham United who have offered women a range of different sporting opportunities means that we have been able to provide a rich and varied programme for women to engage with that has built on their individual interests and opened many new horizons for others.

The drama this year was just as powerful and then sadly due to the New Zealand bombings made even more powerful. The service users are incredible strong and powerful role models and ambassadors for taking out the messages into our communities that violence and abuse whether from within families or communities or whether from state organisations is not acceptable.

Investment policy

The charitable company's investment powers are set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association and allows the company to invest funds not immediately required in investments, securities and property, subject to such conditions as may be required by law.

Reserves policy

The free reserves target required for dissolution contingencies is £87,397. This includes staff redundancy costs of £47,719 and three months staff salary and running costs of £39,675. The staff and running costs are currently covered by funding via the Big Lottery Fund. The free reserves of the charity as at 31 March 2019 is £46,143.

The trustees are aware of the shortfall and are confident that they can increase the reserves during the next six months.

Financial Review

The financial statements are set out in pages 6 to 14.

In common with other charities of a similar size and nature, the charity has limited resources and its ongoing operations are currently dependent on short-term funding from grant providers. The three year funding received from the Big Lottery Fund will come to an end in December 2019.

During the year the charity generated incoming resources of £175,170 (2018: £197,683).

The trustees remain extremely grateful for the generosity of all out grant providers (detailed in note 13 to the accounts) and other supporters of the charity.

Total expenditure during the year was £177,099 (2018: £153,047), resulting in a deficit of £1,929 (2018: surplus £44,636)

The total funds at the year-end, including Fixed Assets stand at £89,812 (2018:£91,741). This includes restricted funds of £43,669 (2018: £48,459).

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities - Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and effective from 1 January 2015 - (Charities SORP (FRS102)). The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have also adopted Charities SORP (FRS102) Bulletin 1 and taken advantage of the cashflow exemption.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Going concern note

The accounts are prepared on a going concern basis, the charity's major funder, the Big Lottery Fund is due to come to an end in December 2019. The Trustees are in the process of applying for funding from a range of different funders including the Big Lottery Fund, The Henry Smith Charity and Tudor Trust. They should be in a postion to know the outcomes of the bids by October 2019. The Trustees are aware of the need to increase reserves and are working in partnership with a number of BME women's organisations to raise the level of unrestricted funds. A dissolution plan is in place should sufficient funding not be secured.

Incoming Resources

All material incoming resources have been included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income, when any performance conditions attached are met, when it is probable that the income will be received and when the amount can be measured reliably.

Grant income is deferred if the period the monies relate to is specified or indicated by the funder.

Resources Expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised as a liability is incurred. The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly resources expended are shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

Cost of raising funds includes all expenditure incurred to raise funds for charitable purposes, including costs of all fundraising activities and cost incurred in seeking donations, grants and legacies. Expenditure on charitable activities includes all resources applied by the charity in undertaking work to meet its charitable objectives.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets are capitalised if the cost is greater than £250. Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of all tangible fixed assets over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Computer and Equipment 33% straight line

Support cost allocation

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include the cost of governance and administrative payroll costs. Given that support costs are less that 5% of total costs, they are allocated directly to expenditure on charitable activities.

Fund Accounting

Incoming resources that may be applied for the charities general purposes are treated as unrestricted incoming resources and are credited to the unrestricted funds. Where a donation or grant is required to be used for a specific purpose, the amount concerned is treated as restricted income and is credited to the appropriate restricted fund.

Taxation

The Charity is registered with HMRC for Corporation Tax. It is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities only.
