STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Sandwell Young Carers is a company limited by guarantee (registered number 3835055) which was incorporated on 2nd September 1999 and achieved charitable status on 12 June 2000 (registered number 1081084).

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019 - CONTINUED

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

As set out in the charity's Articles of Association new trustees are appointed by the board of trustees after applying to the company in the form required by the trustees and after being approved by the board of trustees.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees undergo an orientation day to brief them on legal obligations under charity law, the content of the charity's constitution, the committee and decision-making processes and the recent financial performance of the charity. During the induction day they meet key employees and other trustees. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the understanding of their role.

Organisational structure

Sandwell Young Carers is organised so that its management committee of trustees meet regularly to manage its affairs and formulate policy.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the charity's services rests with the charity Chief Executive Officer. The charity Chief Executive Officer is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. The charity Chief Executive Officer also has responsibility for the day to day operational management of the charity, individual supervision of the staff team and ensuring that the team continue to develop their skills and working practices in line with good practice.

The charity Chief Executive Officer reports to the board of trustees on a bi-monthly basis.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The charity has secured funds to support the short breaks programme, residential breaks, support work, promotion and awareness raising, and in part the administrative costs, building running costs, and management and administrative salary costs for the coming year and beyond.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Purposes and aims

Sandwell Young Carers' objects and principal activities are to provide support for children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years of age whose health, education and lives are affected as a result of having to care for a dependent family member.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us to ensure that our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The Achievements for 2018/19 were;

To gain long term sustainability the charity continues to work to its business plan, inclusive of, fundraising, making use of the charity's assets, the ongoing review and evaluation of the charity's structure, and developing partnerships with local groups to increase recognition and support to individual young carers, donations of funds, gifts and goods.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019 - CONTINUED

• The securing of funds to Promote Awareness, and enable Support and Recognition of young carers living in the Borough of Sandwell.

Thus, making it possible for young carers to enjoy a healthy, safe childhood that prepares them well for adult life, to reach their full potential, and be on the path to success.

The funding was secured to provide a service that worked to support the reduction in inequalities faced by young carers that arose as a result of their caring responsibilities. The service worked with health, education and social care professionals within the statutory sector, the Children's Trust and the Third Sector to promote the identification and appropriate support of young carers.

The service designed and worked to a marketing strategy that ensured schools, health, voluntary sector and council services, other relevant agencies and the general public were made aware of young carers, the caring role they undertake, and the impact this may have on them and their family's life.

• The securing of funds to provide a programme of Positive Activities that enabled young carers to take a break from their caring roles, seeking support and 'have a childhood'.

The Short Breaks Service provided a programme of positive activities that gave young carers the chance to meet with other young people who are young carers to undertake a range of experiences, have fun, to have a break from caring, achieve positive outcomes and raise aspirations.

The service provided a range of opportunities that enable young carers to come together, build friendships and provide mutual support to each other by their engagement in positive activities

• The securing of funds to continue the development of a Specialist Support Work Provision.

The Support Work Service continued the existing work with young carers and their families, and incorporated parent support to ensure a holistic approach that served to guide and advise parents with a disability or experiencing ill health. The Parent support guided parents in accessing care packages that reduce the caring roles and responsibilities carried out by their child, and subsequently enabling the young carer to take part in activities of their choice.

The Service also worked directly with individual young carers to increase their school attendance and attainment, by offering advocacy in school, and out of school homework and study support sessions. Further work took place in integrating young carers in to their local community by building on their confidence and social skills through group and one to one support, working with community leaders to raise empathy and understanding around being a young carer and engaging and committing to local community-based activities.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The charity will continue to work to its Business Plan, creating a sustainable future, and developing on other areas of need for young carers.

The objectives for 2019/20 are;

Young Carers Mental Health

Having caring roles and responsibilities at such a young age can have a detrimental impact on a young carer's well-being. We will work in partnership with young carers to look at ways to recognise ill health and seek the correct support at the appropriate time.

Young Adult Carers

There are no longer services supporting young adult carers in Sandwell. We will commit to securing funds to work in partnership with careers services, schools, colleges and universities, and employers to raise awareness and identify support for NEET young carers and young adult carers aged 14-24 years. To identify hidden young carers and young adult carers and assist them with the transition from being a young carer to becoming a young adult carer so that young carers and young adult carers can return to their education, and commence the journey in achieving improved attendance and attainment.

Building Capacity

We will continue to develop and build on the organisation's capacity by addressing staff retention and engagement, Board recruitment, and identifying a cloud-based client relationship management system that will keep a secure, digital, dynamic record of our contacts with clients, which enables GDPR compliance for holding personal data and case management system.

Social Work Practice Placements

As part of the charity's sustainability programme we will work in partnership with universities to identify social work student placements and create work programmes where they can achieve successful placements whilst identifying and supporting young carers.

Community Awareness

There are more than 2,000 young carers living in Sandwell. We will raise awareness of their needs, campaign for change, support professionals and leaders, and work to ensure that young carers get the support and opportunities for the future that they deserve.

The charity will continue to identify and support young carers aged 5-18 years of age through a programme of one to one and group support, advocacy, workshops, accredited courses, homework sessions, integration into the community, youth and play sessions, residential breaks, holiday schemes and day trips; building confidence, social skills and resilience, providing a chance to have fun and be a child.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

INCOME

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

EXPENDITURE

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - at varying rates on cost

Improvements to property - 10% on cost

Fixtures and fittings - 50% on cost and 33% on cost

Computer equipment - 33% on cost

TAXATION

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

FUND ACCOUNTING

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 "Basic Financial Instruments" and Section 12 "Other Financial Instruments Issues" of FRS 102 to all of its financial statements.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

PENSION COSTS AND OTHER POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
