# **Section B**

# Structure, governance and management

Description of the charity's trusts

Type of governing document

The Group's governing documents are those of the The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and The Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

How the charity is constituted

The Group is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts.

Trustee selection methods

The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

The Group is managed by the Group Executive Committee, the members of which are the 'Charity Trustees' of the Scout Group which is an educational charity. As charity trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities. This includes the registration, keeping proper accounts and making returns to the Charity Commission as appropriate.

Policies and procedures adopted for:

The Committee consists of 4 independent representatives, Chair, Treasurer, Secretary and Subscription Secretary together with the Group Scout Leaders, individual Section Leaders, parent's and supporters representatives and meets every month.

Members of the Executive Committee complete 'Essential Information for Executive Committee' training within the first 5 months of joining the committee.

This Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of the appointments and is responsible for:

The maintenance of Group property;

The raising of funds and the administration of Group finance; The insurance of persons, property and equipment; Group public occasions;

Assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adult support;

Appointing any sub committees that may be required;
Appointing Group Administrators and Advisors other than
those who are elected.

# Structure, governance and management (continued)

### Risk and Internal Control

The Group Executive Committee has identified the major risks to which they believe the Group is exposed, these have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate against them. The main areas of concern that have been identified are:

Damage to the building, property and equipment. The Group would request the use of buildings, property and equipment from neighbouring organisations such as the church, community centre and other Scout Groups. The Group has sufficient buildings and contents insurance in place to mitigate against permanent loss.

Injury to leaders, helpers, supporters and members. The Group through the capitation fees contributes to the Scout Associations national accident insurance policy. Risk Assessments are undertaken before all activities.

Reduced income from fund raising. The Group is primarily reliant upon income from subscriptions and fundraising. The group does hold a reserve to ensure the continuity of activities should there be a major reduction in income. The Committee could raise the value of subscriptions to increase the income to the group on an ongoing basis, either temporarily or permanently.

Reduction or loss of leaders. The group is totally reliant upon volunteers to run and administer the activities of the group. If there was a reduction in the number of leaders to an unacceptable level in a particular section or the group as a whole then there would have to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section. In the worst case scenario the complete closure of the Group.

Reduction or loss of members. The Group provides activities for all young people aged 6 to 18. If there was a reduction in membership in a particular section or the group as whole then there would have to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section. In the worst case scenario the complete closure of the Group.

The group has in place systems of internal controls that are designed to provide reasonable assurance against material mismanagement or loss, these include two signatories for all payments and a comprehensive insurance policies to ensure that insurable risks are covered.

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects The Scout Group is indebted to a significant number of adult volunteers who give their time freely and at no cost to the Group. These include Leaders in the Sections, members of the Group Executive and a number of Contribution made by volunteers Supporters who assist the Group on as as required basis.

Public benefit statement

The Group meets the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria under both the advancement of education and the advancement of citizenship or community development headings.

Summary of the main achievements of All Sections of the Scout Group have delivered a varied, the charity during the year adventureous and fun programme of weekly meetings, activities and camps throughout the year. The Scout Troop has increased it's numbers significantly during the year and overall Group numbers are up after a dip in the mid-year period leading to a decline in year on year revenues from mebership subscriptions. Costs have remained largely under control and some savings have been made. Repairs and maintenance costs of nearly £9000 in the year were higher than expected largely due to the need to resurface the driveway from the road. Fundraising income was down on the previous year to just over £3500 net and this must be addressed in the coming year if further membership fee increases are to be avoided.

# Reserves Policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the charitable activities of the group should income and fundraising activities fall short. The Group Executive Committee considers that the group should hold a sum equivalent to 3 months running costs, circa £4K.

# Investment Policy

The Group's Income and Expenditure is required for day to day operations and as a consequence the Group does not have sufficient funds to invest in longer-term investments such as stocks and shares. The Group has therefore adopted a low risk strategy to the investment of its funds. All funds are held in cash using only mainstream banks or building societies.

The Group Executive regularly monitors the levels of bank balances and the interest rates received to ensure the group obtains maximum value and income from its banking arrangements. Occasionally this may involve using an account that requires a period of notice before funds may be withdrawn, before doing so the Group Executive considers the cash flow requirements.

Our Leadership numbers have taken a dip this year with younger leaders choosing not to return as often (due to their university courses) and it is with regret that I have to inform you Michele Dimmock has chosen to leave Beavers for personal reasons. We wish her well and hope that one day she may return. I would like to say a huge thanks to all the Leaders for their hard work and dedication to our youngsters and scouting. They give up an enormous amount of time to ensure that we are able to provide a varied programme of events.

Some sections are struggling to run due to the shortage of leaders and are having to close more often than they would like. We now require more section leaders, assistants or occasional helpers. Are you able to help, are you interested or know someone who is? Please talk to any of the leaders or myself and we will happily inform you of what is/is not involved. Thank you to those parents who have already volunteered to be an occasional helper. If we do not succeed in recruiting more leaders then we will have no alternative but to enforce a parents rota.

Thank you for all your support, especially those that attend or help with our fundraising. I have to say that, as usual, I am very disappointed with the uptake of parents who attend our fund-raising events. For any scout group to run efficiently it relies on support at fundraising events, without it we will at, sometime in the future, have to increase subscriptions substantially! With this in mind I would point out that we currently have a Cheese and Wine event in July and a live music evening in September. Please support these, it is very demoralising when the events are not supported.

Most fund raising is organised by a dedicated Executive team who are always looking for more help. If you feel that you could help with the Executive committee (the team that keeps the Scout Group above water), even on an ad hoc basis please either see me or our Chairperson. In the past twelve months we have had the following fund raising events, Afternoon tea, Cheese and Wine evening, a quiz night, a Senior Citizens Christmas meal, clothes collections to name just a few.

I know that I say this ever year but my thanks go to all the Leaders, young and old, to the supporters/helpers of the group. Staged activity badges including Community Impact, Hikes, Nautical Skills, Swimmer and Time on The Water have also been given out. Five Beaver Scouts have also ben granted the highest badge award, The Chief Scouts Bronze. To gain this they must hold all the Challenge Badges and at least four Activity Badges.

We have had a Pirates Sleepover with the District (thank you to the all the Leaders that took our Beavers, I was unable to go due to an operation). The sleepover managed to cover Camp Crafts and a visit to the Walled Garden at Leasowes. I am told that a lot of fun was had by all. Unfortunately, we haven't been able to have another sleepover due to illnesses sustained by the Beaver Leaders. We started a bug hotel this year and will continue to add to it. ### **TROOP REPORT 2018 – 2019**

Yet another busy year for the Troop as our numbers reached 40 Scouts which is challenging for so many lively 11 to 14 year olds in the main hall at the Scout Centre.

The Scouts completed many badges and awards including the Air Researcher Badge following a trip to Cosford and a STEM activity day with the RAF, the Chef badge, Communicator, Pnternational, physical Recreation, Hikes Away, Nights Away and Musician activity badges.

A project to identify WW1 war graves in Halesowen and Cradley cemeteries and to document the stories of those soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice enabled the Troop to complete the Local Knowledge activity badge. We cleaned and tidied-up the graves just before Remembrance and produced some poster boards which were displayed in the churchyard during the parade and service. We even made a recording of a couple of WW1 songs — definitely not available at any good music stores!

We also completed a number of activities around inclusivity and the highlight was the Scouts receiving some training and becoming Dementia Friends. Following on from this the Scout Centre is now officially a Dementia Friends Information Point and we will be undertaking more activities around this subject as part of our continuing Community Impact programme.

More recently the Scouts have also completed work on survival skills and this culminated in a recent survival camp where the Scouts built and slept in their own shelters and cooked entirely on open fires using foil trays and minimal utensils.

Three Scouts completed their Gold Chief Scouts Awards – well done to Ross, Emily and Milly. They, together with several other Scouts have recently 'moved on' to Explorers and we wish them well in their future Scouting careers.

Four Scouts and two Explorers also completed the Endurance 40 Challenge which requires them to navigate a 25 mile (40 kilometre) route in the Chiltern Hills in Buckinghamshire within 14 hours. Our team completed the route in just over 8 hours – very impressive and it throws down a real challenge to our team for next year.

Because of time pressures and conflicting commitments on our Leaders we did not manage a Summer Camp in 2018 but we did have a very successful weekend sailing in Leicestershire, a weekend completing the Expedition Challenge, a night hike and sleepover, several activity days and a very enjoyable day out at a Jamboree On The Air / Jamboree On The Internet day event in Oxfordshire.

As always, none of this happens without the continued commitment and enthusiasm of our team of adult volunteers. Special mention this year must go to Sarah Jane and Steven who joined us towards the end of 2017 and who have taken on a growing role in the life of the Troop. It is great to have some 'younger blood' on-board to keep us more mature Leaders on our toes!
