#### **REPORT**

### TO THE DONORS AND SUBSCRIBERS OF THE BLACKPOOL LADIES' SICK POOR ASSOCIATION

This year has seen the need for us to evolve with the times and make better use of technology, when our Trustees warned that our investments were not performing as well, due to current financial climate. They felt it is essential to develop a Memorandum of Understanding to be completed by organisations before engaging with us. It will efficiently confirm that the person needing immediate help meets our criteria, such as being a Blackpool resident and will cover the safeguarding requirements. It was also decided, to enable us to support as many people as possible, that our main help would be food vouchers, thus allowing money to be freed up to pay other bills.

As with most Charities a lot of work is done in the background. We have had meetings with Children Centres, Hostels and support organisations. Completed reports like the Charity Commissions Annual Report. Our Treasurer works tirelessly to keep our accounts in order. Our Welfare Officer/s being on call 7 days a week, to give out food vouchers and organise essential items immediately. Meeting people to get new donors. Our Entertainments Committee organising fundraising events that bring in a large part of our income. Again these events don't just happen, it takes lots of meetings, sourcing venues, setting up rooms and organising entertainment.

The BIG difference with our Charity is that no one is paid for the work they do!

Our fundraising events started in August with a lovely Sunset Supper. September brought a very lucrative week in the Charity Shop, due to a lot of hard work collecting quality donations, setting up, serving and clearing up. One lady then did several car boot sales with the left over items and brought in another good amount. Later in the month was an enjoyable Afternoon Tea and Fashion Show put on by one of our members. Our Christmas Coffee Morning at the Cliffs Hotel was opened by our President the Deputy Mayor Cllr Kath Rowson. It had stalls with donated homemade cakes, raffle/tombola prizes and other friends bringing their stalls. The New Year brought our Burns Night Supper. This event is always sold out, as the food and atmosphere are so enjoyable.

September also saw Mrs Colette Ardron becoming the new Executive Committee Chairman taking over from Mrs Shirley Appleby, who had a very successful and well supported term of office. Shirley gave us our new mission statement.

"We support where we live"

We had sadness during the year with the passing of two former members, Mrs Margaret Staveley and Mrs Barbara Gribbon. These wonderful ladies gave many years dedicated service to our Charity.

One donation certainly gave the feeling it is all worthwhile. A lady who received help from us many years ago when she had no food, clothes or place to live was helped until things stabilised for her. Over the following years she worked to put herself through University, on passing became a Nurse then a Social Worker. She was so pleased to get that support at such a low point in her life. Now she is in a good place felt she wanted to give us a donation to help us help others in similar situations.

Gratitude like this continues to gives us the boost we need to carry on the wishes of our founders from over a 125 years ago.

#### Structure, governance and management

The trustees of the Association are fully responsible for the overall management of the Association and they meet regularly to manage its affairs.

The Charity Commission requires trustees, within their Annual Report, to sign a declaration that during the year there were no serious incidents or other matters that may impair the activities, beneficiaries, property, work or reputation of the Association and that should have been brought to the attention of the Commission but have not. (sections 11 and 48 Charities Act 1993).

The trustees actively review the major risks which the Association faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at their current levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions

The trustees have also examined operational and business risks faced by the Association and confirm that they have established systems to identify, mitigate and duly report any significant risks.

The future responsibility for recording any serious events or the potential problems will lie with the Secretary of the Association in liaison with the Chair of Trustees.

The Trustees confirm that there have been no serious risks identified or brought to their attention during the year

Under the trust deed the association has the power to make investments as the trustees see fit.

#### Review of the Year

The Trustees express their sincere thanks to:-

- all members past and present of have given the charity practical support
- the financial supporters without whom our efforts would be severely limited
- those potential members who might join us in the years ahead to enhance and maintain the work of the charity

The year has been difficult for a variety of reasons:-

- the demands on the association's resources were greater than the income by a significant amount
- Mr Graham Goldstone-Creasey resigned as Treasurer in May 2018 and has yet to be replaced
- Mrs Joan Jones and Mrs Joan Pickering resigned as Welfare Officers at the start of March 2019

Thanks go to all three officers for their hard work and commitment to the organisation.

The Trustees met four times during the year and two of the meetings were attended by Directors of Gore Browne our Investment Managers (GBIM Ltd). During the year the Trustees reviewed the investment policy and concluded no changes were necessary.

The value of our investment portfolio increased by £7,787 from £400,105 to £407,972.

The Trustees have agreed that it is important that Association maintains, as far as possible, the value of our investments as the returns which they provide (£13,309) is an important part of the income required to fund the support offered to clients. In this respect the Trustees would like to express appreciation to our Investment Advisors (Gore Brown Investment Management Ltd) who keep a careful watch on our portfolio and attend meetings of the Trustees to personally deliver their advice and support.

The Trustees started to review the governance of the Association and the action's necessary to meet the requirements of the Charity Commission. Working has been undertaken to develop policies and procedures setting out the basic rules as to how we conduct our business and manage our assets.

The Trustees remain grateful to those members of the Entertainments Committee who this year generated a splendid £11,079 (2017-18 £11,488), as a result of their hard work and efforts. A Spring Lunch has been organised for 5th April 2019 and payments of £1,191 have been made in respect of the event.

The Association is grateful to the many donors who support our good work. We continued to benefit from the John Slater Foundation and Glasdon Staff Giving Scheme. This year the Russell Haldene Trust made a donation of £3,000. The charity also benefits from many other personal donations. To all of them, both corporate and individual, we are most grateful.

During the year we provided support to the sick and poor of Blackpool to the tune of £32,012. The majority of this (£22,010) was in the form of food vouchers and fuel payments with the balance (£10,002) in the form of material help with household items and living costs.

#### Plans for future periods

The economic climate will continue to make huge demands on the local Council, NHS Services and the many other support agencies in the Borough. The Association will do their best provide instant and short term support from those in urgent need that are referred to them. The Association intends to introduce a Memorandum of Understanding for agencies in 2019-20 to ensure an acceptable level of professionalism and integrity is sustained in respect of support given to clients.

The Trustees will seek to meet the requirements of all relevant legislation and adopt good practice wherever possible.

The Association continues to seek opportunities to provide wider support both of a financial and practical nature.

# YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH 2019 NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Charities Act 2011.

#### **Fund accounting policy**

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 11.

#### **Incoming resources**

Voluntary income including donations and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

#### **Resources expended**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### **Governance costs**

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

#### **Support costs**

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

#### Investments

Fixed asset investments are included at market value at the balance sheet date. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and their market value at the start of the year, or their subsequent cost, and are charged or credited to the statement of the financial activities in the period of disposal.

Unrealised gains and losses represent the movement in market values during the year and are credited or charged to the statement of financial activities based on the market value at the year end.
