<u>Trustees' Report</u> for the Year Ended 31 March 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the charity as set out in its governing document

The object of the Charity is to advance the education of the public by holding and administering funds for permanent and temporary teaching posts, and temporary research posts, in Buddhist Studies at Oxford University; by the administration of teaching and research activities in Buddhist Studies undertaken at Oxford University; and by agreeing arrangements for collaboration in respect of Buddhist Studies teaching and research with the University of Oxford (and Colleges, Faculties and Departments within it), and with other organisations involved in generating and diffusing academically sound information about the Buddhist Tradition.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the year.

This year the Centre has created a pioneering set of online courses delivering Pali teaching. There are now three levels available, with another one to be launched in the future. The first three deliver a comprehensive introduction to Pali, and by the end of them students are able to translate Pali texts themselves, with the help of study aids such as dictionaries. Uptake has been very promising, and the courses have been gaining very good reviews. This initiative enables the Centre to exponentially expand its teaching activities to anyone with an internet connection.

We also carried out an Advanced Pali Reading course in August 2018 for graduates of the introductory course. This helps them deepen their studies and translation skills.

The Pali Reading Club is an online teaching resource which gives graduates of both courses the chance to expand their studies by meeting online during the year to continue Pali translation.

The Academic Director gives personal individual Pali teaching both to students at the University and to other individuals.

The Centre continues to deliver lectures that supplement the University schedule. These are attended both by students and faculty at the University, along with members of the public. These lectures are also posted on our website so that anyone in the world with internet access can listen to them free of charge.

The library's catalogue is now available online, and the local public are able to become members, and borrow books.

The Academic Director gave an "Introduction to Buddhism" talk to students of the Institute of Education at the University. He also gave talks to various visiting scholars and education professionals who were interested in his approach and experience.

A visiting scholar, Yangten Tulku Rinpoche, was resident at the university in Hilary term 2019. The Centre assisted So-Wide (another charity) in this visit. Yangten Tulku Rinpoche gave lectures and helped students with their studies. His visit was very well received by students and staff.

The Centre also hosted two visiting academics from Taiwan. One from Tzu-Chi was here for several months carrying out research at the University; and one from Fo Guang Shan University who was here for one month carrying out research with the Academic Director.

The Centre continues to publish its Journal, with a strong commitment towards intelligibility whilst preserving academic rigour. Two numbers are published each year, in May and November.

This year the Centre started building its online catalogue of all Pali Buddhist articles available, as well as making the Richard Gombrich Archive of articles available on its website.

The Centre also gave two student grants this year, to assist students at the University in their research.

The main activities undertaken during the year to further the charity's purpose for the public benefit. In carrying out the activities above, the charity is fulfilling its purpose in supporting Buddhist Studies at Oxford, and disseminating the fruits of academia to the wider public. All courses are available to the public. They can also attend the lectures or view them on line via the web-site. The Chair of Buddhist Studies at Oxford, Professor Zacchetti, sits on the OCBS Board and is active in helping to guide activities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The short term and longer term aims and objectives.

The long term aims of the charity are to establish the Centre in Buddhist Studies permanently.

Teaching courses ensure the continuation of Pali scholarship in the West at a time when it is in decline. The framework for study provided by the Centre encourages an ongoing renaissance in Pali Studies.

In the short term, the success of the online on-demand courses has provided the opportunity to expand its teaching activities exponentially, whilst generating a small income for the Centre. This will be built on with the development of new courses with an even wider appeal - such as courses on the Buddha, and early Buddhism.

The Centre is developing the online course in Marathi and Mandarin versions, and plans to train teachers to deliver those courses.

The charity's strategies for achieving its aims and objectives in the future.

The charity is furthering relationships with several academic bodies to ensure that its plans can be brought to fruition. By careful planning, it is also seeking financial support from interested parties so that the projects can be fully realised.

The new online on demand courses have provided the Centre with a small income to supplement fundraising activities, and this will be developed with new courses being launched with a much broader public appeal.

How the activities undertaken during the year contributed to the achievement of the aims and objectives.

The launch of the online on-demand courses provides a huge leap forward in the Centre's aim of disseminating Buddhist scholarship to as large an audience as possible.

The Pali Reading Club builds on this, creating a growing community of people who are engaged in Pali studies in an active way.

The lecture series, and hosting of visiting scholars, and awarding of grants all support Buddhist Studies at Oxford, have helped OCBS move out into the wider community.

Resources used in the activities undertaken during the year.

The Centre has made extensive use of technology within the last year, exploring the easiest and richest ways to deliver teaching online. It has had great success with this, garnering praise for the setup of its courses. The Centre has used a large part of its resources to employ two members of paid staff, an Office Manager and an Operations and Development Manager; the Centre has offices rented from Wolfson College, Oxford University.

Social investment policies and how these contributed to the achievement of charity's aims and objectives during the year.

The Centre has provided reductions in its course fees to students with reduced financial means who have shown an aptitude for the work.

Lectures are provided free of charge on its website, and volumes of its Journal become open access after one year.

The contribution of volunteers during the year.

The Centre has benefitted from voluntary help in the cataloguing of its library, and in the administration of its journal, including expanding the readership by alerting major universities to its presence.

Its online ventures have also been supported by a lot of voluntary input from technical and teaching staff.

Dr. Paola Tinti continues her voluntary support on social media, increasing the reach of the Centre's activities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Grant making policies and how these contributed to the charity during the year.

The Centre awarded two grants of £500 each this year. These went to students at the University of Oxford, to assist them in their graduate studies.

The main achievements and performance of the charity during the year.

The Centre has held a wide and varied schedule of activities this year, furthering its goals in education, stimulating Pali Studies, and disseminating the fruits of scholarship to a wider public. Its move into on demand courses is a bold step in making its teaching activities more widely available. It has kept good financial reserves and is in a strong position to build for the future.

Fundraising activities during the year.

The Centre has a good relationship with several existing and prospective supporters, which it has cultivated during the year. An Annual Review is produced which lays out the achievements of the last year, along with proposed plans and financial realities.

The difference the charity's performance during the year has made to the beneficiaries of the charity.

Thanks to the Centre's operation, students and members of the public have gained access to educational activities that would not otherwise be available. Pali studies is receiving a lot of support: students both within Oxford University and abroad are being given the chance to deepen their knowledge.

Students at the University have gained valuable teaching experience, and members of the public have had the opportunity for a comprehensive introduction to the world of Buddhist Studies. Through the Journal, lecture series, teaching and other activities, the Centre has contributed and supported advancement in the academic discussion of Buddhism in the modern world.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
