OXFORDSHIRE YOUTH TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their report, along with the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in Note 1.

GOVERNANCE

Governing Document

Oxfordshire Youth is governed by a constitution dated 28 March 2013.

Organisational Structure

The Trustees are responsible for Oxfordshire Youth's governance. The present Trustees have a variety of backgrounds relevant to the work of Oxfordshire Youth. Leadership and day- to- day responsibility for the provision of services is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer.

Trustee Induction

New Trustees receive training arranged by and in conjunction with the Chief Executive. They are also given a pack containing relevant Oxfordshire Youth and Charity Commission documents.

Risks

The Trustees consider the principal risk faced by Oxfordshire Youth to be insufficient funds with which to operate effectively. It is also heavily reliant on the Chief Executive Officer.

OBJECTS

As per the constitution, Oxfordshire Youth's objects are "to act as a resource for young people and organisations working with young people within Oxfordshire, by providing advice and assistance and organising programmes of physical, educational and other activities as a means of:

- (a) Advancing in life and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals;
- (b) Advancing education;
- (c) Relieving unemployment;
- (d) Providing recreational and leisure time activity in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons".

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

We at Oxfordshire Youth know that young people matter. Young people are our future but they are also our present. There are many great youth organisations across Oxfordshire, many quite small and run by volunteers, that make an enormous contribution to the lives of young people across the county but are either struggling to survive or struggling to fulfil their potential. Organisations staffed by people passionate about ensuring young people in Oxfordshire get the best possible start in life whatever their background or circumstances. We exist for those organisations and for the young people whose lives they improve. Our mission at Oxfordshire Youth is to work collaboratively to build a resilient youth sector that responds to the changing needs of all young people.

Activities

Across this year Oxfordshire Youth pursued three key areas of work principal activities: Oxfordshire Youth's Sector Support which includes a membership offer, Building skills for life including Young Leaders Programme, Voice - Oxfordshire Youth's youth committee and VOXY - The Voice of Oxfordshire's Youth; and Mental Health and Wellbeing including mental health Training and Youth in Mind conference.

Membership

Oxfordshire Youth membership is available to all voluntary organisations working with young people aged 8-25. Membership provides a highly subsidised range of support services including high quality training, networking events, guidance, a range of youth activities, DBS service and more. The value of Oxfordshire Youth membership is best expressed by Watlington Youth Club: "We wouldn't be where we are now without Oxfordshire Youth! We would not have been open! Oxfordshire Youth helped us with our policies, our procedures and even ran sessions when we had no youth workers. Their support has been incredible."

Voice

Voice is a network of 13-19 year olds from Oxfordshire Youth member organisations. Run and led by young people, Voice plans two county wide events every year, supports Oxfordshire Youth's Annual Conference as well as providing a youth voice of influence for our programmes and delivery.

Young Leaders

Oxfordshire Youth's Young Leaders programme is the first of its kind to offer a Level 2 Award in Leadership and Team Skills, accredited by the nationally recognised Institute of Leadership and Management (ILM), for young people 14+ years old. The programme takes place over a residential weekend where young people take part in activities such as raft building and rock climbing while undertaking leadership workshops. After the residential weekend the young people return to their youth groups, communities or schools where they then run an activity or take responsibility for something new. We deliver a minimum of two programmes a year for our member organisations to access and we launched a new offer to schools and businesses.

VOXY

Oxfordshire County Council's vehicle to support the voice of young people in Oxfordshire. VOXY council meet 4 times a year and run 2 events/campaigns a year inviting other young people to engage in key topics that affect them. Oxfordshire Youth are commissioned as a lead partner to support the young people's development and to promote the work of VOXY to the wider sector.

Mental Health Training

In February 2018 Oxfordshire Youth began rolling out mental health training in schools across Oxfordshire. An Introduction to Children and Young People's Mental Health Training was designed by Young Devon in partnership with Young Mind and is endorsed by Exeter University. The training provides a framework for thinking about mental health, including information about child and adolescent development, and information about both risk and resilient factors. We licence the training from Young Devon and have trained professionals in the youth sector from 20 organisations to deliver the training. Over 1000 adults were trained this year.

Youth in Mind

A new partnership between Oxfordshire Youth and Oxfordshire Mind producing a conference aimed at anyone working with children and young people throughout Oxfordshire. Youth in Mind raises awareness of the importance of mental health wellbeing for the county's children and young people while also strengthening links and networks between those already doing invaluable work in this area.

This year our first conference attracted over 500 delegates. 96% of whom said that they would like to see Youth in Mind become an annual event.

Our People

This year marked our 71st anniversary and featured a fundraiser hosted by our President, Lady Henrietta Spencer-Churchill, at Blenheim Palace raising more than £12,000 with almost all costs covered by sponsorship or donations. Thank you to the fundraising committee, Trustees and supporters, who worked tirelessly to coordinate the event. A special thank you is in order to all Oxfordshire Youth staff, volunteers, donors, funders and supporters for the past seventy-one years who have helped to improve the lives of countless young people across the county over the decades. Thank you for all that you have done.

The board has been strengthened and diversified. The Chair of Oxfordshire Youth Voice, a young person, now regularly attends Oxfordshire Youth board meeting to represent young people. Three trustees are under 25 and 40% of the board is female. All trustees are now required to undergo GDPR training, to undergo generalised safeguarding training and to be DBS checked.

Oxfordshire Youth benefits from a motivated, active and engaged board of Trustees. Many participate on committees or working groups outside of the board meetings including the Finance Committee (with thanks to Mark Dessain, Tim Martin, Mike Watkinson and Fiona Clarke), the Events Committee (with thanks to Felicity Dick, Sue Jackson, Darius Smith and Mike Watkinson) and the Strategy and Transformation working group including both Trustees and staff (with thanks to Margie Jarvis, Dominic Taylor, Fiona Clarke, Jodie Lloyd-Jones, David Cruchley and Magda Charlton). I am grateful for the tireless work of all Trustees in support of Oxfordshire Youth and for courageously pursuing change. The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Oxfordshire Youth also benefits from a highly skilled, committed and motivated staff team, whose collective passion to make a difference to young people lives, is what drives the charity forward. Thank you to the CEO Jodie Lloyd-Jones for her strong leadership and commitment to Oxfordshire Youth and to all of the staff, Partnership Manager Kate Armitage, Partnership Manager David Cruchley, Business Development Manager Magda Charlton, Events Producer Laura Sewell, Youth Leadership and Participation Officer Becky Critchley, Member Engagement Coordinator Roy Peach, Training Coordinator Hayley Reynolds, Fundraising Coordinator Kevin Game, DBS Administrator Elizabeth Greenlaw our Office and Finance Manager Lorna O'Connor for their continued commitment to Oxfordshire Youth. Plus, all of our freelance trainers and facilitators.

Public Benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Finance

The charity had a deficit for the year ended 31st March 2019 of £31,123 as against a surplus in 2018 of £25,972. Income received from contracts and grants increased to £290,084 (2018 £224,745) whilst donations were down at £27,090 (2018 £43,815). Thanks go to our volunteer events team for another excellent event at Blenheim Palace, raising £11,300 net. Total income for the year was £370,489 (2018 £316,922). Total expenditure for the year was £401,612 (2018 £290,950).

The financial marketplace for charities continues to be volatile. The fact that Oxfordshire Youth continues to deliver high quality work in difficult times is a credit to its staff, volunteers, supporters and mainly voluntary fundraisers. Our thanks go to our Independent Examiners Ross Brooke Ltd for their help in producing our financial accounts. A special thank you to our Treasurer, Mike Watkinson, for his expertise and continuing long-standing support of Oxfordshire Youth.

Reserves

Oxfordshire Youth aims to hold reserves of approximately 3 months running costs. Reserves would be held in order to meet any unforeseen future expenditure or any future shortfalls in income.

Oxfordshire Youth are currently working towards meeting the above target.

The Future

We know that to be at our best, to fulfil our mission, we must continue to grow and help others to grow too. Last year Oxfordshire Youth began an ambitious and exciting process of change and as a result Oxfordshire Youth benefits from staff roles that support organisational development and fundraising, effective systems and processes, use of modern technology and most importantly a better understanding of our work and the impact we have. Oxfordshire Youth is on a mission to become resilient in order to meet the needs and aspirations of young people and to build a resilient youth sector in Oxfordshire. Our purpose, our mission and our value are clear and we aim to focus on our three core areas of work: Sector Support, Building Skills for Life and Mental Health and Wellbeing and to create a sustainable financial model that enable us to continue the impactful work that we do in each of these areas.

1. Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's accounts.

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in compliance with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (FRS 102), and FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard, applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

The charity is a public benefit entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

(b) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

(c) Income

Income from donations is of a general nature and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income from charitable activities:

- Contract and grant income are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.
- Subscriptions are accounted for in the year to which they relate.

(d) Deferred Income

Deferred income includes all receipts and grants which relate to the period after the year end.

(e) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any Value Added Tax which is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

- Charitable activities comprise those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its services.
 It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such services and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial
 Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular
 activity are allocated directly, others are on a time apportioned basis as set out in Note 4
 (Support Costs).

(f) Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at historical cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided on a reducing balance rate which reflects the anticipated useful lives of the assets and their estimated residual values:

Plant and equipment 20% Fixtures and fittings 15%

(g) Contracts and Grants

Contract revenue and grants receivable are reflected in the accounts on the accruals basis.

The purposes of each restricted fund are summarised below:

Big Lottery funded project called Sustainable Communities - Three objectives: Volunteers have improved skills and confidence helping them to provide high quality youth club provision; Young people have improved well-being that will enhance their life chances; and Disadvantaged communities are able to provide sustainable good quality youth provision that promotes integration and community cohesion.

VOXY (OCC funded) – Oxfordshire Youth are a lead partner supporting the development of young people who are members of VOXY council - an OCC youth council that influences key decisions made by OCC.

Young Leaders Programme (Paul Hamlyn funded) – organisational development and development of the programme enabling capabilities for growth and expansion of trading income.

Mental Health Project Training (funded by Oxford Health through Response) To deliver mental health training to all schools in Oxfordshire.

Safeguarding training – (funded by OCC through OCVA) to deliver to safeguarding trainings to small groups that do not access the training through OSCB.

Youth in Mind (Awards for All BLF) our mental health conference for anyone working with children and young people – saw 500+ people attend an inspiring day.

Social Investment Business – investment in a communications and marketing role to support the organisation into trading.

Step Change – Investment in impact measurement and bringing a new CRM system into the organisation.

Transfers between funds

During the year a net transfer of (£32,329) (2018; (£2,156)) was made from restricted funds to unrestricted funds in respect of completed projects with residual fund balances. The Trustees confirm that all funding conditions have been met and residual fund balances are eligible to be transferred to unrestricted funds and spent on other purposes.
